Consultation overview

Context

1. 0-19 Early Help Locality model

- Following approval from Cabinet a period of statutory consultation started on the 27th October. This consultation sought the views on plans to review the arrangements for Children's Centres to align and integrate services as part of the development of a Children's Services 0-19 'Early Help Partnership' locality model.
- The outcome of this statutory consultation is outlined in the Cabinet report dated 8th February 2017 and as a result Cabinet approved
 - o The development and the delivery of a 0-19 Early Help Locality model
 - The undertaking of a competitive procurement process to determine the most suitable provider for the delivery of 0-19 Early Help Services including Children's centre in Central and South locality.
- 2. Development of the specification for the delivery of 0-19 Early Help Services including Children's Centre in Central and South locality.
- During the statutory consultation services user in the Central and South gave valuable views on what they wanted to see as part of the service delivery in their locality. These views were considered as part developing the tender. This included:
