# **RE: Walsall Partnership Quarterly Report**

# 1. Purpose

This briefing note informs the Panel of progress on a range of issues, led by Walsall Partnership, all of which arise from the Local Area Agreement (LAA). They include:

- Forecasts of the level of Performance Reward Grant likely to received from the old LAA
- Performance for the first half of 2008/09 for the new LAA
- Progress in agreeing targets with Government Office West Midlands (GOWM) where it was not possible to do so before sign-off
- Development of Target Action Plans (TAPs)
- Steps taken in aligning Area Based Grant to the delivery of the LAA

# 2. Background

Walsall's LAA was signed-off in June 2008. It contains 25 main indicators and 5 local indicators agreed with Government as a balanced approach to delivering activity to meet local needs as set out in the Sustainable Community Strategy while at the same time reflecting the national policy context.

The new LAA supersedes the previous agreement apart from 19 'stretch' targets which have Performance Reward Grant (PRG) allocated to them. These will continue to form part of the LAA's performance management arrangements until their final outturn is known. Section 3 forecasts levels of PRG Walsall can expect if current performance is maintained.

Performance management arrangements have been improved as the new LAA has been developed with the need to track implementation of activity contributing to improved outcomes being recognised. Greater clarity over roles and responsibilities has also been introduced to ensure that interventions to rectify failing performance are made as soon as they become apparent. Section 4 provides a summary of the performance of the LAA to date.

At sign-off targets for 16 of the main indicators were still outstanding. In the majority of cases this was because Government did not have sufficient information to enter into target setting negotiations. The LAA process allows for annual 'review and refresh' and Government saw the first refresh as the opportunity to complete the target setting negotiations. Section 5 outlines the current position with regard to target setting negotiations.

Delivery of the LAA is being managed through Target Action Planning for each of the 25 targets, or groups of targets where appropriate. The TAP process involves identifying a lead agency to engage all relevant parties to review current evidence and trends; to map

current activity and funding; identify priorities, best practice and performance gaps; undertake an options appraisal; and finally define future activity. Progress in producing TAPs is set out in Section 6.

The long term ambition is that the LAA and accompanying TAPs will guide the alignment of Partner resources behind the delivery of the LAA. Progress towards the first phase, Area Based Grant alignment, is set out in Section 7.

# 3. Performance Reward Grant Forecasts for the Old LAA

The old LAA contains 19 'stretch' targets which will trigger Performance Reward Grant (PRG) depending on performance at April 2009 (or the nearest date after that for indicators which outturn at different times of the year). The level of reward is based on a sliding scale which starts at 60% of the difference between the 'without stretch' and 'with stretch' target for each indicator.

Appendix 1 shows performance against the 19 stretch targets and forecasts the amount of PRG Walsall is likely to receive.

Nine indicators have performed consistently well throughout the life of the LAA. In addition a) the final year outturn on the percentage of pupils obtaining five or more A\*-C grades including English and Maths is expected to reach its stretch target; and b) growth in VAT registered businesses in on target but outturn data is subject to considerable reporting delays. On this basis PRG will be £4.92m.

That said, PRG is difficult to predict for two indicators:

- Supported admissions of older people to permanent residential and nursing homes, per 10,000 population, aged 65 or over. The outturn for 2007/08 was on target to achieve PRG but quarter 2 this year has drifted. If PRG is to be achieved some inyear recovery is required.
- The difference between the number of people in employment, who are aged between 16 and 64, expressed as a percentage of all people between those ages in the West Midlands, minus the same percentage in Walsall. This is currently on target but the method used for measuring the indicator is subject to wide sampling variations.

Given the uncertainty around these PRG could be reduced to £3.15m.

## 4. LAA Performance for the First Half of 2008 / 09

At this stage of the LAA it is not possible to get a comprehensive picture of performance. For over half of our indicators targets have not been agreed and for those that have many are out-turned annually. Appendix 2 shows RAG ratings for the first half of this year for indicators where targets have been agreed and where it has been possible to assess inyear performance.

The indicators of greatest interest to this Panel are shaded.

# 5. Progress in Agreeing Outstanding Targets

Appendix 2 also shows indicators where targets are still to be agreed and outlines the reasons. In most cases Walsall is awaiting further information from Government. GOWM are confident that all targets will be agreed by the end of March 2009.

# 6. Development of Target Action Plans

The LAA targets have been grouped together under the headings of the Sustainable Community Strategy (SCS). This will enable activity to be identified which is delivering against a number of targets.

Further workshops are being arranged for the other targets.

A number of TAP pro formas have been developed in order for activity to be commissioned.

## 7. Steps Taken in Aligning Area Based Grant to the Delivery of LAA Targets.

Through the TAP process, resources are requested to be identified – either mainstream or external – from all organisations who are delivering activity to achieve the targets. This will enable identification of duplication of activity and whether savings can be made.

Walsall Council agreed to consider those targets which are utilising any of the Area Based Grant (ABG) for the TAP process first. This would provide transparency in how the Council is using this funding and the performance of the target.

Cabinet agreed for the TAP process to be undertaken in four stages, as follows:

- 1. Alignment of Area Based Grant to Local Area Agreement Timescale: December 2008
- 2. Mapping of National Indicator Set and Sustainable Community Strategy Outcomes Timescale: April 2009
- 3. Identifying Partner Resources Timescale: July 2009
- 4. Alignment of Partner Resources Timescale: December 2009

TAP pro formas have been completed for all ABG funding streams for financial year 2008 / 09.
