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BUDDYING PROJECT BEECHDALE PRIMARY SCHOOL AND CROFT COMMUNITY PRIMARY SCHOOL 2005/6.

Rationale

The need for this social cohesion programme has never been more necessary in light of recent terrorist events. The two schools are very committed to bring together the two communities which we serve, in whatever small way we can. The two communities have as many similarities as differences, i.e. both are perceived to hold very traditional values, and to be somewhat insular.

To date the two schools have already successfully run some joint lessons, bringing Muslim and non Muslim pupils (and staff!) together, and forming strong links between the schools. We wish to build on this good practice, this term with our years 4 and 5 cohorts.

Content

The content of the programme will consist of joint lessons, taking place alternately at each school. The lessons will be planned by teachers and will be part of the PSHE and arts curriculum. The pupils will need to be transported between schools. In addition, we would organise extra curricular activities i.e. joint sporting events.

Costings

16 seater minibus @ $\pounds 60.00$ per session (travelling from Beechdale to Croft and return), 18 lessons in total over year = $\pounds 1080$

As above but for after school sports events: 6 events over year @ $\pounds 60 = \pounds 360$ Refreshments for pupils during social interaction time: $\pounds 150$ Resources for art lessons: $\pounds 250$ Prizes and awards: $\pounds 150$

Total = \pounds 1990 between two schools.

Annex 3

St Matthews / Birchills / Leamore - Local Neighbourhood Partnership (LNP). Request- Beechdale Bayou Project.

Background.

During 2003, the Local Authority undertook a consultation exercise as part of the process of the Boroughs Playing Pitch Strategy (PPS), resulting from this consultation was a proposal to address the lack of sporting provision within the Beechdale area, in particular football.

Following various meetings it became apparent there was a strong case for developing a Football Foundation Bid in the Beechdale area (the football foundation is one of the National Lotteries funding streams).

The case can be summarised as:-

- Lack of acceptable local facilities and ancillary provision.
- Identified sporting deprivation as identified in the approved Playing Pitch Strategy for Walsall.
- A vibrant infra structure of local teams supportive of such an initiative.
- Supportive social indicators /demographics for the area in order to support any formal bid.
- Initial support of the Football Foundation to submit a bid.

The question of whether there is a case for development of a bid to fund new capital and revenue project in the area, and the initial ingredients to support a powerful bid to the Football Foundation are not the case. Although there will be issues to be addressed in the long term, and these will be exposed during the writing of any submitted bid and will need to be addressed and resolved if a successful bid is to be submitted. Typically these will be issues of management arrangements, effective business planning, securing of match funding etc..

Item for consideration.

The project is at a concept / feasibility stage , and funding needs to be secured to allow an effective feasibility study to be undertaken. This will determine any final decisions and shape any submitted bid (if the feasability determines that a bid can be progressed) in order to ensure the quality of decision making in preparing a bid. It has to be stressed that a feasibility study may also detremine reasons why the project cannot move forward, but an effective process needs to be undertaken.

There is currently a lack of available fianance to support an initial study, financial support is required to undertake the following tasks:-

• Commission architects drawings.

- Development of an initial capital budget.
- Environmental and land surveys (i.e. contamination)
- Secure planning approval.
- Compliance with legal and lottery requirements for such as facility (management, insurance etc.)

Without the ability to fianance such work, the project remains at the concept stage, and the preparation of such a project cannot begin. If fianance was made available in order to fund such initial development work, and should the outcomes of the study be favourable. Then an effective consultation exercise can be developed with partners, stakeholders within the parameters of the bid and the outcomes of any initial decisions and constraints, such as planning for example.

Therefore this paper request financial support to develop the initial preparation of the bid, and a contribution of £6,000 is required in order to fulfil the necessary work

The intention is to create and build a community lead purpose designed football and training facility that will enhance the area, Provide for structured and recreational sport as well as recognised training and other qualifications in sport. It is envisaged that the community, schools and other partners would utilise such a facility, with the majority of funding being made available from the Lottery.
