Coventry MRF Project	Regional Materials Recycling Facility (Coventry MRF) is moving ahead with the signing of contracts and start of construction.
	Walsall Council will have a 19.6% shareholding in Sherbourne Recycling (wholly owned company by eight local authorities). Each council will provide capital for the MRF's construction and commit to a 'long-term' waste supply agreement, including all items collected from local residents for recycling.
	The MRF will be fully operational by Autumn 2023, this enables the Council to secure processing and disposal outlets for the recyclable materials that they are obligated to collect. It will provide a sustainable solution for maximising the benefits and reducing costs of processing local residents recyclable waste.
	Sherbourne Recycling will also support the Council's determination to improve Walsall's recycling rate of 40% with the aim of reaching the national recycling target of 65% for household waste by 2035.

HWRC & Transfer Station Super Site

Good progress is being made to deliver sustainable waste management solution for the long term in Walsall.

Our existing sites are in need of improvement, but do not have enough space to grow to meet future needs. The proposals give us the opportunity to:

- Provide more space, meaning residents will be able to recycle a wider range of items.
- Provide well designed, modern and easier to use facilities.
- Reduce the amount of Walsall's waste going to landfill and improve Walsall recycling rates.
- Introduce a facility for local small businesses to dispose of their trade waste responsibly.
- Introduce reuse shops at both sites. Residents can take unwanted items which can be up-cycled or repaired. - Residents can buy pre-owned, repaired and refurbished items cheaply.
- Generate renewable energy by installing solar panels on both sites.
- Build flexibility to react to future government policies

A planning application for the new site at Middlemore Lane is being prepared, including assessing a number of environmental matters to ensure that any potential impacts are minimised.

We held public information events during October 2021, where residents could find out more about the new facilities and speak to a member of the team. This period of engagement closed on Sunday 31 October 2021. There will be further opportunities to comment as part of the planning process going forward.

Waste

Tackling contamination:

Early days, but lots of work invested in driving contamination figures down. Trending at 14%, recent October out-turn has shown 2% reduction. A continuing reduction of this scale will deliver savings equivalent to employing 4 barrowmen for a year or the annual hire of 3 precinct sweepers.

Working to sustain and further reduce:

- Working with contact centre
- Crew development and training
- Improved communication and education with customer
- Work with SUEZ and Casepak on quality control at transfer station

Bulky Waste Service

Residents continue to be able to arrange for 3 items to be collected for £10.

Household Waste Recycling Centres continue to operate 7 days a week. CCTV provision allows the service to monitor and maintain access and ensure safe working practices on site.

Bin stickers – successful application of 105,000 bin stickers to green wheelie bins across the borough to promote recycling and reduce contamination.

Grounds

Grass cutting - All mowing crews now working off an improved mapping system. Following problems with contractors fulfilling commitments on highway weed treatment, operations completed any outstanding work using in house teams. Looking at long term solution of carrying out such tasks with existing workforce.

Line marking solutions - Trialled new robot sports pitch line marking machine. This can reduce time spent marking pitches by up to 50%.

Safety on banks - New remote controlled spider mower for cutting grass banks is being utilised reducing the need for operatives to work on inclines.

Trees – Tree planting arranged for 2021 autumn season to deliver manifesto pledges.

Town Centre Planters: 40 double cube planters and 10 x 3-tier planters installed in Park Street, Bridge Street and St Paul's. In addition over 50 barrier baskets installed in and around the Arboretum. All part of a temporary seasonal summer project.

Protection from traveller incursions: Trip rails, bunding and other measures have been installed to secure green spaces. Installed around 4,000 metres of steel trip rail and soil bunding to deter UEs on 7 sites across the borough.

Street Cleansing

Delivery of manifesto pledges to improve cleansing standards:

- Non-static barrowmen service now operates across 18 wards.
- Additional resources have been allocated to keep Walsall TC clean with an extra precinct sweeper and additional barrowman.
- Hawking to address pigeon problems in town centre
- Weed spraying continues to take place. In-house service delivery at short notice in September 2021 to address ongoing problems with contracted services. An in-house delivery model is being devised for 2022/23 to improve service delivery, standards and reliability.
- Town centre deep clean carried out in Autumn. 14 nights hot washing paved areas in Walsall Town centre to remove chewing gum and pigeon faeces.

Schools sweeper naming and livery competition

Walsall council invited the young people of the borough to come up with names for our hard working sweepers.

- Win a free clean for their school playgrounds
- A certificate and sticker
- A photo with their sweeper when they are fully branded

Fleet services a) Work progressing with Agilisys to deliver automated booking/on-line solutions, progressing well b) Explored the purchase of electric quad bike for in house highway spraying. In addition have trialled electric chain saws, strimmers and hedge cutters. Allotments: **Healthy Spaces** 12 Allotment sites leased, with 10 more progressing. Team Borough-wide allotment consultation complete 30/09/2021, results are currently being analysed. • £260K capital awarded for allotment boundary improvements – tender out, works due to start in December. **Fishing Pools:** Development work taking place with groups on sites, lease being drafted with support from Legal. **Holiday and Food Programme (HAF):** Successfully delivered HAF programme throughout the Summer Holiday. Further sessions to take place over XMAS. Programme has drawn in just under £27K of extra funding Play equipment upgrades: New equipment installed at KGV, Palfrey Park, Willenhall Memorial Park and Walsall Arboretum **Black Country School Games:** Successfully delivered the event at Wolverhampton University (£5K external funding), further £9.5K for sports specific competitions. **Obesity Funding:** Awarded £15,449 to deliver activity up to 31 March 2022 **Bloxwich Towns Fund:** Awarded £1.8M for green space improvements and £350K for allotments. Projects to be developed to draw down funding. It will also target areas of peat and engage farmers in carbon sequestration activities. Furthermore, it will develop a detailed Green Investment Prospectus: including stakeholders, market and trading opportunities.
