





Number of Children Looked After in Walsall (12 Month Rolling)





Length of Time placed at home on full care orders












Demographic data has been taken from the 2018 mid-year population estimates. A higher proportion of children looked after are from BME backgrounds compared to the Walsall Child and Young Person population. The current children looked after population has continued to increase since January – from 601 to 641 at the end of December 2019. The current rate per 10,000 remains below that of our statistical neighbours but is still considerably higher than the 2018/19 England and West Midlands averages. We currently have 39 children placed at home on full care order, this has decreased from 55 at the end of guarter 1 2019/20. 23 of the 39 have been placed at home for over a year. Work is continuing with the courts to revoke care orders for children who are placed at home where appropriate.







Trends for placements with in house foster carers continue to remain strong, currrently Walsall has 300 in house foster carers, this is lower than the 2017-18 figure of 321. Walsall has 176 independent fostering agency placements, this is higher than the 2017-18 outturn of 150.

Just over 12% of Walsall's CLA are placed 20 plus miles from their home address and 7.6% of the CLA population have had 3 or more placements within a year. 65 of Walsall's CLA are placed in a residential setting these include children's home, residential accommodation or NHS/Health establishments providing medical or nursing care.

The proportion of CLA where a statutory visit has been undertaken to timescale in accordance with the child's plan is 90.3%, with 86.2% seen within 6 weeks of the previous visit or coming in care.

94.7% of reviews have been undertaken within timescales. This is higher than the 2018/19 out-turn of 91%. 96.7% of current children looked after have had a review within the last 6 months. 1.2% (8) children currently have overdue reviews.

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

The proportion of CLA reviews where the child's views were recorded (this is where the review took place and a "PN" code has been selected)



The child's views were recorded at 100% of CLA reviews. This is comparable to 2018/19 and higher than 2017/18. In 2019/20, 55.9% of children attended their review. This is lower than the out-turn of 58% in 2018/19. The number of children experiencing a change of social worker has increased compared to the previous year. The number of CLA who have remained with the same social worker for the past 12 months is 183 compared with 201 last year.

The proportion of ePEP's completed at the end of the autumn term is 92.0%, The percentage of ePEP's that have been rated as good in terms of quality is 69%, with 31% rated as requiring improvement. CLA overall absence, Persistent Absence and Unauthorised Absence are currently all below both Statistical neighbour and England averages. The percentage of CLA attending Good or Outstanding schools is 75%, whilst this figure rises to 97% for Early Years pupils.



Methodology

Attainment in English and maths (9-5) From 2017, this measure looks at the percentage of pupils achieving a grade 5 or above in both English and maths. Pupils can achieve the English component of this with a grade 5 or above in English language or literature. There is no requirement to sit both exams.

Attainment 8 - Attainment 8 measures the average achievement of pupils in up to 8 qualifications including English (double weighted if the combined English qualification, or both language and literature are taken), maths (double weighted), three further qualifications that count in the English Baccalaureate (EBacc) and three further qualifications that can be GCSE qualifications (including EBacc subjects) or any other non-GCSE qualifications on the DfE approved list.

Progress 8 - Progress 8 - Progress 8 aims to capture the progress a pupil makes from the end of key stage 2 to the end of key stage 2 to the end of key stage 4. It compares pupils' achievement – their Attainment 8 score – with the average Attainment 8 score of all pupils nationally who had a similar starting point (or 'prior attainment'), calculated using assessment results from the end of primary school.




Strength and Difficulties Questionnaire (SDQ)



SDQ Complete and Recorded

The percentage of children looked after with an initial health check and dental checks has fallen. It is anticipated that this will increase as data continues to be loaded onto system throughout the year. Significant work has been undertaken, and continues to be taken in partnership with health to improve the processes and accuracy of data recording in relation to health assessments and to ensure that children and young people receive their assessments on time. The proportion of SDQ's completed and recorded has continued to decrease. Currently 76.9% of children looked after have completed an SDQ within the last 12 months and the average SDQ score is 13.7, this is lower than quarter 2 where the average SDQ score was 14.0. Work is being undertaken to understand the decrease in the SDQ's being completed and recorded. 104 children currently have an SDQ score that suggests there is cause for concern in their emotional and mental well-being based on the answers they gave to the questionnaire



The percentage of care leavers in education, employment or training for the 19-21 and 19-25 cohorts is in line with last years out turn. 83.86% of care leavers are available to work - excluding those not available for the labour market (NALM) due to illness, disability, pregnancy or being a young mother or because they are in custody. 17 of Walsall's care leavers are currently in custody. The proportion of care leavers in suitable accommodation remains stable at 90.5%. The proportion of care leavers in touch with the council is currently at 94.6%, which is below the 2018/19 out turn of 97%.

* Of the 7 care leavers with a status of 'Unknown', there are 4 Qualifying children and young people over the age of 17 who are no longer looked after. "Qualifying" young people have returned to the care of their parents for a continuous period of more than 6 months, or have special guardians or were privately fostered. Many do not require a service and there is limited information known about them.




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

In 2018/19 35 were children were adopted. 22 children have been adopted so far in 2019/20. Children are waiting slightly longer in 2019 than in 2018 between receiving court authority to place and finding a match - this is currently at 227 days compared to 211 days in 2019. 60% of Children wait less than 14 months between entering care and moving in with their adoptive family. This is lower than in 17/18 but higher than in 16/17. Between April and December, 20 Children have ceased to be looked after due to special guardianship orders and 26 due to child arrangement orders.
