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Main Changes - Legislation

- Criminal Records Bureau (CRB) and Independent Safeguarding Authority have been merged to provide a more 'streamlined' checking service, known as the Disclosure and Barring Service from the 1st December 2012.
- The Rehabilitation of Offenders Act 1974 (ROA), (Exceptions) Order 1975 still acts as the gateway for access to the DBS service and lists those occupations, professions & positions considered to be exempt from the ROA provisions.
- Still two types of disclosures (standard and enhanced) which is dependant on the nature of the position that the candidate or post holder have applied for or hold.



Impact of the Changes in Legislation

- The legislation surrounding children in the main remains unchanged except for the fact that it has to be frequent unsupervised access.
- The "specified place" category is determined by the DBS and includes schools, children's home and childcare premises
- DBS checks for staff or volunteers working with vulnerable adults are only required, if providing personal care, power of attorney, social work, transportation and managing their personal money.
- Elected Members are no longer eligible to undergo DBS checks for this particular role, however if they have another role such as a school governor these roles are still eligible at present.



Changes in Procedure

From 17th June 2013 –

- DBS certificate is only issued directly to the individual applicant.
- Introduction of subscription service increasing portability (self registration).



Mitigation of Associated Risks
