Executive Summary:

Regulatory Services and Streetpride are aware of the significance elected members give to keeping Walsall clean and also to making those responsible for polluting the Borough accountable for their actions through enforcement.

Appendix A is the Litter Action Plan that was taken to Cabinet on the 23rd January 2013 in response to the recommendations of the Community Services and Environment Scrutiny and Performance Panel on this subject. It has been updated with the actions taken to date.

Appendix B is an annual report on the work of the enforcement teams within Environmental Health and aims to show the positive steps that have been taken in the respect of enforcement. It also highlights how both service areas have worked together and with partners to tackle these priority issues over the last year but also what more we will strive to achieve going forward.

Environmental crimes such as litter, fly tipping and dog fouling are a high priority for Walsall residents as they not only affect their health but can lead to a downward spiral of conditions in the local environment often referred to as 'broken window syndrome' that can lead to escalating anti social behaviour and crime.

As well as the social and health implications of these crimes cleansing services in Walsall which are undertaken by Streetpride cost in the region of £1.75m a year. Any reduction in the amount of environmental crime can only help in terms of the cosy to the Authority for continually cleansing the boroughs streets.

Regulatory staff cannot rely on any one method to resolve the many hundreds of requests they receive and have to choose from a range of negotiation and enforcement skills to ensure that these cases are dealt with appropriately. In the same way Streetpride are continually developing their practices and techniques to ensure the best possible value for money in terms of the cost of cleansing operations.

Reason for scrutiny:

The Environmental Scrutiny and Performance Panel established a working group to consider littering during the 2011/12. This was subsequently re-established by the Community Services and Environmental Scrutiny Performance Panel in 2012/13 to allow it to complete its investigations.

The Panel considered littering an important issue impacting upon the daily lives of residents and requiring considerable resource to ensure that streets, parks and town centres were well maintained and clean.

Close liaison and cooperation between Streetpride and Regulatory Services particularly guided by the priorities and hot spots identified by Area Partnerships is fundamental to improving the environmental health of the Borough.

Recommendations:

Subject to any comments members may wish to make that the report be noted.

Environmental impact:

Litter, waste, dog fouling all blight and pollute the local environment damaging natural resources but also making b the built environment less attractive. Any reduction in the amount of litter and other such waste can only lead to an overall improvement in the environment.

Performance management:

The report emphasises the commitment made to tackling environmental crimes and the level of resource and management being implemented to ensure it remains a high priority.

Environmental crime is an issue that affects all areas of the Borough and all sectors of society.

This can also include press releases and Council web site articles which coincide with litter patrols and Environmental Awareness events to be organised by cross service team. During Greenrock Estate Clean Up in February 2013 Enforcement Officers, Walsall Housing Group, Street Pride, the Police, Reassurance Officers and the Litter Hit Squad worked in partnership. Waste was cleared from the estate, pavements and roads were swept and the contents of 11 'contaminated' waste bins disposed of. Literature was distributed to residents who were advised about waste collection, fly tipping and littering.
