
Latest Barometer



- Walsall has had a 31% decrease in new cases in the last week, bringing the weekly number of new cases down to 582
- Trends are reducing with a rate currently at 203 per 100,000 population
- The ranking for Walsall has increased to 238
 out of 309 (where rank 1 is the highest rate in England)
- The weekly positivity has decreased this week to 8.0%, which is slightly above the regional and national rates.
- Walsall's vaccination uptake remains higher than the region and our booster uptake is currently similar to the region.



Latest Barometer



- Hospital inpatient numbers have decreased to 92 confirmed COVID inpatients.
- The Omicron BA.2 sub-variant made up 62.8% of those cases tested for variant type.
- 10 new confirmed outbreaks currently recorded for Walsall

Vaccination – Key Points

- The 18 29 age group has the highest number of unvaccinated individuals in Walsall (~13,400).
- Walsall South 1 PCN has the lowest uptake in Walsall, even in older age groups (50-59 year olds). South 2 PCN also has relatively low uptake.
- Pleck, Palfrey, St. Matthews, Birchills-Leamore and Blakenall have the highest number of individuals still unvaccinated.



Overall, good vaccination coverage in Walsall, with uptake graduated through age groups.




Latest Vaccination Uptake by Age

- Across all age and ethnic groups, wards in the South and West of Walsall have the lowest uptake of even a single dose of a Covid-19 vaccination.
- Uptake is particularly low in Pleck and Blakenall, followed by Palfrey, St.
 Matthew's and Birchills-Leamore.

Targeted Vaccinations in 2 Walsall Wards










Overview - Walsall Target Wards





Main objective was for the National Surge Rapid Response Team (SRRT) to support in the planning and operational delivery of vaccine uptake, particularly amongst 18-29 year olds, with the **aim of increasing first, second** and **booster dose uptake in the Birchills-Leamore and Blakenall Wards**; with specific focus on addressing issues of vaccine hesitancy.

Breakdown of Delivery



Leafletting

 Approximately 10,381 households leafletted out of 12,669 total households across the 2 wards (81.9%)

Door to Door Engagement

- Total Doors Knocked: Estimated 4,795 (46.2% of households leafletted in targeted areas)
- Interactions: 1,946 i.e. door opened, but didn't provide further tangible comments (40.6% of total doors knocked)
- Total Door Step Conversations: 1,927 (40.2% of total doors knocked/ 99% of doors opened)
- 46 post-vaccination interviews (2.4% of door step conversations)



Targeted Vaccination Work – Comms and Engagement

- Working with the SRRT and CCG colleagues a comprehensive communications and engagement strategy and activity plan was developed and delivered.
- The Walsall Comms Cell, made up of local partners, agreed and coordinated proactive, timely messaging to the community via well-established communication channels.
- Highlights of the activity included,
 - A joint media release with BCWB CCG
 - We published and widely shared two videos from the Portfolio Holder and Director of Public Health on the activity taking place
 - · Targeted social media adverts were produced and posted
 - Designed and printed leaflets (see image right), banners and posters were distributed. Feedback from UKHSA was these were eye-catching and the use of the map was effective for volunteers to initiate conversations and actions
 - We circulated messages from trusted figures in the community including headteachers and GPs
 - Walsall College emailed messages to 11,000 students and 850 staff





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Lessons Learnt

There are multiple reasons why the residents of Walsall have/have not chosen to get the vaccine and future initiatives should take that into consideration when engaging with the community.

Additional Resources the LA may wish to consider for similar projects

- Dissemination of targeted comms material via leaflets, and investing in other face-to-face engagement as these
 were the most stated triggers to attend the vaccination clinic throughout the deployment
- A large proportion of residents stated they were 'too busy' to attend the pop-up, so finding out alternative ways that will encourage the busy population to attend will prove beneficial in the long run.

Stakeholder actions

- **Better insight through relationship building with the 18-29 community**, particularly to gain understanding of their thoughts and concerns. A large proportion of this cohort did not provide further comment when liaising with the SRRT team, suggesting more work needs to be done to establish bridges of trust and safe spaces for transparent communication
- Continue to build community involvement with trusted voices in the community. They can act as a point of contact for concerns raised surrounding vaccine safety and fertility for example. There is also a vast amount of distrust for the government/NHS and the vaccine in Blakenall, therefore conducting community talks, seminars and forums may prove beneficial
- CCG/specialist NHS involvement to dispel potential myths and misinformation

Communications Strategy

Working with our partners, Walsall Council continues to adopt a joined up communications approach for the Borough to share and amplify information and guidance.

- Public health data and insight, including segmentation of the audience by age and demographic continues to be used to inform the development of campaigns and to target communication and engagement effectively.
- The interpretation and the localisation of messages is very important. The support from the COVID-19 champions and other trusted voices in the Walsall community has proved to be effective.
- Messaging relating to the Government's 'Living with Covid Plan' have been shared across a wide range of channels, including websites, social media, newsletters and through traditional media outlets.
- The Walsall Comms Cell (previously known as IMT Comms cell) has moved to fortnightly meetings. These will
 now be used to agree and coordinate key messages, share insight and maximise communication channels on
 partner priorities, as well as sharing information relating to COVID-19.
- The **communication priorities** continue to be the promotion of responsible and safe behaviours and to encourage the take up of vaccinations to help reduce the transmission of COVID-19 in the Borough.



Highlights: Communication and Engagement

- Walsall Council continues to take a proactive approach to Government announcements and changes to guidelines.
- Following the latest announcements regarding the Governments 'Living with COVID plan' and the removal of universal testing, several proactive releases have been published and circulated.
- Residents continue to look to the Council as a trusted source of information. Evidence shows us that people continue to turn to our Public Health experts for advice and guidance which is provided proactively and promptly.
- National resources continue to be localised to make them more relevant to the population of Walsall and to stand out on digital and social media channels.



Moving forward

- There is still a key role for the Council in reassuring people and enabling safer choices.
- Communications to staff, elected members and to residents will continue to clearly communicate future changes to guidance whilst encouraging responsible and safe behaviours.
- Should there be a need for us to **step up our efforts** there are communication and engagement plans developed and ready to be implemented.
- The Council will continue to build trust within Walsall communities so we continue to be seen as a trusted source of information and an organisation that responds in a timely way to answer questions and to challenge any emerging myths.
- Influential figures such as politicians, business leaders and figures from cultural and religious life in the Borough have the ability to set an example for others to follow and maintaining good relationships with these key individuals and groups remains a priority.



5 – 11 Year Old Vaccinations

- The COVID-19 vaccines are safe and effective. 2 doses are being offered to children aged 5 to 15 to give them the best protection against COVID-19.
- COVID-19 is usually mild in most children, but it can make some children unwell. 1 dose of the COVID-19 vaccine gives good protection against your child getting seriously ill. But 2 doses gives stronger and longer-lasting protection against future COVID-19 variants.
- Vaccinating children can reduce the risk of COVID-19 infection to your child and those around them.
- An appointment is required for this age range and parents and carers can book appointments online via the National Booking System or by calling 119.
- The Saddlers Vaccination Centre now located at the former Urgent Care
 Centre on Bridgeman Street offers appointments outside of school hours,
 with dedicated support and specially trained staff in place to cater for the needs
 of vounger children.





COVID-19 Vaccination Spring Booster

- Walsall residents aged 75 years and older, residents in care homes for older people, and those with weakened immune systems are now being offered a spring booster of the COVID-19 vaccine.
- This spring booster is being offered as a precaution to those at extremely high risk, most of whom received their first booster around 6 months ago.
- COVID-19 is more serious in older people and those with a weakened immune system. Protection from the vaccine may be lower and may decline more quickly in these people.
- If the number of infections increases over the spring / summer, this booster should help reduce their risk of being admitted to hospital with COVID-19.
- Appointments can be booked online via the National Booking System or by calling 119 or residents can call into one of the walk-in centres in Walsall.

Evergreen Offer – It is never too late!

- It is never too late to come forward and get 1st / 2nd or booster vaccine
- Anyone who gets COVID-19 can become seriously ill or have long-term effects (<u>long COVID</u>). The COVID-19 vaccines are the best way to protect yourself and others.
- Research has shown the vaccines help:
 - o reduce your risk of getting seriously ill or dying from COVID-19
 - reduce your risk of catching or spreading COVID-19
 - protect against COVID-19 variants
- Across the Black Country and West Birmingham there are over 100 vaccination sites. These range from local GPs and pharmacies to community venues and large vaccination centres.
