Information to accompany notice of hearing

Rights of a Party

- Subject to Regulations 14(2) and 25 *, a party may attend the hearing and may be assisted or represented by any person whether or not that person is legally qualified.
- At the hearing, a party shall be entitled to -
 - (a) in response to a point upon which the Authority has given notice to a party that it will want clarification, give further information in support of their application, representations or notice (as applicable);
 - (b) if given permission by the Authority, question any other party; and
 - (c) address the Authority.

(* Regulation 14(2) states "The Licensing Authority may exclude the public from all or part of a hearing where it considers that the public interest in so doing outweighs the public interest in the hearing, or that part of the hearing, taking place in public." Regulation 25 states "The Authority may require any person attending the hearing who, in their opinion, is behaving in a disruptive manner to leave the hearing and may -

- (a) refuse to permit that person to return; or
- (b) permit him to return only on such conditions as the Authority may specify.

but such person may, before the end of the hearing, submit to the Authority in writing any information which they would have been entitled to give orally had they not been required to leave").

Non-attendance of a party at the hearing

- (1) If a party has informed the Authority that he does not intend to attend or be represented at a hearing, the hearing may proceed in his absence.
- (2) If a party who has not so indicated, fails to attend or be represented at a hearing, the Authority may -
 - (a) where it considers it to be necessary in the public interest, adjourn the hearing to a specified date; or
 - (b) hold the hearing in the party's absence.

- (3) Where the Authority holds the hearing in the absence of a party, the Authority shall consider at the hearing the application, representations or notice made by that party.
- (4) Where the Authority adjourns the hearing to a specified date, it must forthwith notify the parties of the date, time and place to which the hearing has been adjourned.

Procedure to be followed at the hearing

- At the beginning of the hearing, the Authority shall explain to the parties the
 procedure that will be followed and shall consider any request by a party for
 permission for another person to appear at the hearing.
- The hearing will usually be conducted in public, although the Sub-Committee may exclude the public from all or part of a hearing where it is considered expedient.
- The hearing will take the form of a discussion led by the Authority and crossexamination will not normally be permitted unless the Authority considers that cross-examination is required for it to consider the representations, application, or notice, as the case may require.
- The hearing will proceed as follows:-
 - 1. The Chair to open the meeting, introducing Members and officers to all parties, members of the public, explain the nature of the application and the procedure to be followed.
 - 2. The applicant or their representative; relevant Authorities or their representatives; objectors or their representative to introduce themselves to the Sub-Committee.
 - 3. The Chair to ensure everyone has a full copy of documents for the hearing and to deal with any preliminary issues that may affect the hearing, for example, an application for an adjournment to consider fresh or late evidence.
 - 4. The Licensing Officer to tender a report to the Sub-Committee, outlining the application, any relevant representations and relevancies to the Local Authority licensing policy statement and statutory guidance.
 - 5. The Sub-Committee or other parties to seek points of clarification from the Licensing Officer on his report, if necessary.
 - 6. The responsible Authorities, or their representatives, to make relevant representations in relation to the application.
 - 7. The applicant and other interested parties to ask questions of the responsible Authorities in relation to their representations.
 - 8. Sub-Committee Members to ask relevant questions of the responsible Authorities in relation to their representations.
 - 9. Interested parties to be invited, if they wish to, to make relevant representations to the Sub-Committee.
 - 10. The applicant or person representing them to ask questions of the interested parties in relation to their representations.

- 11. Sub-Committee Members to ask relevant questions of the interested parties in relation to their representations.
- 12. The applicant, or their representative, to present their case to the Sub-Committee.
- 13. The responsible Authorities, or their representatives, to ask questions of the applicant.
- 14. The interested parties, or their representative, to ask questions of the applicant.
- 15. The Sub-Committee to ask questions of the applicant.
- 16. The Chair to invite any parties making representations, and the applicant, to briefly summarise their case, if they wish.
- 17. The Chair will check that the parties have said all that they wish to.
- 18. The Sub-Committee will then decide on the matter in private and all persons, except the legal advisor and the Committee administrator, will withdraw from the hearing.
- 19. All the parties will then be recalled and the decision of the Sub-Committee will be delivered, including any conditions placed on the licence (if granted) and the licensing objective that they relate to.

Determinations

- In most cases, the Sub-Committee will make a determination at the conclusion of the hearing. In all cases, the determination will be in writing, giving reasons for the decision.
- The Sub-Committee will consider its final decision in private, accompanied by the Legal Officer and the Committee Clerk. Any legal advice given to Members of the Sub-Committee will be repeated by the Legal Officer to the parties when the decision is announced publicly.

Action following receipt of notice of hearing

- (1) A party shall give to the Authority, within the period of time provided for in the following provisions of this Regulation, a notice stating -
 - (a) whether he intends to attend or be represented at the hearing;
 - (b) whether he considers a hearing to be unnecessary.
- (2) In a case where a party wishes any other person (other than the person he intends to represent him at the hearing) to appear at the hearing, the notice referred to in Paragraph (1) shall contain a request for permission for such other person to appear at the hearing accompanied by details of the name of that person and a brief description of the point or points on which that person may be able to assist the Authority in relation to the application, representations or notice of the party making the request.
- (3) In the case of a hearing under -
 - (a) Section 48(3)(a) (cancellation of interim authority notice following police objection); or
 - (b) Section 105(2)(a) (counter notice following police objection to temporary event notice),

the party shall give the notice no later than one working day before the day or the first day on which the hearing is to be held.

- (4) In the case of a hearing under -
 - (a) Section 167(5)(a) (review of Premises Licence following Closure Order);
 - (b) Paragraph 4(3)(a) of Schedule 8 (determination of application for conversion of existing licence);
 - (c) Paragraph 16(3)(a) of Schedule 8 (determination of application for conversion of existing Club Certificate); or
 - (d) Paragraph 26(3)(a) of Schedule 8 (determination of application by holder of Justices Licence for grant of Personal Licence),

the party shall give the notice no later than two working days before the day or the first day on which the hearing is to be held.

(5) In any other case, the party shall give the notice no later than five working days before the day or the first day on which the hearing is to be held.

Right to dispense with hearing if all parties agree

- (1) An Authority may dispense with holding a hearing if all persons required by the Act to agree that such a hearing is unnecessary, other than the Authority itself, have done so by giving notice to the Authority that they consider a hearing to be unnecessary.
- Where all the persons required by the Act to agree that a hearing is unnecessary have done so in accordance with Paragraph (1), the Authority, if it agrees that a hearing is unnecessary, must forthwith give notice to the parties that the hearing has been dispensed with.

Withdrawal of representations

A party who wishes to withdraw any representations they have made may do so -

- (a) by giving notice to the Authority no later than 24 hours before the day or the first day on which the hearing is to be held; or
- (b) orally at the hearing.

APPLICATION FOR A PREMISES LICENCE REVIEW UNDER SECTION 51 OF THE LICENSING ACT 2003

King George V Wallows Lane Walsall WS2 9BZ

1.0 Summary of Report

- 1.1 For members of the licensing sub-committee to determine an application for a premises licence review, in respect of King George V, Wallows Lane, Walsall, WS2 9BZ
- 1.2 The review application is made by West Midlands Police, a responsible authority under the terms of the Licensing Act 2003.
- 1.3 The application cannot be determined under officer delegated authority.

2.0 Recommendations

2.1 That the licensing sub-committee having regard to the submitted review application and any relevant representations, determine what steps if any, it considers appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives.

The subcommittee may decide that the review does not require it to take any further steps appropriate to promote the licensing objectives. In addition, there is nothing to prevent the sub-committee issuing an informal warning to the licence holder and/or to recommend improvement within a particular period of time

- 2.2 The steps, set out in section 52(4) of the Licensing Act 2003, are to:
 - modify the conditions of the premises licence (conditions of the licence are modified if any of them is altered or omitted or any new condition is added) either permanently or for a period not exceeding three months
 - exclude a licensable activity from the scope of the licence, either permanently or for a period not exceeding three months
 - remove the designated premises supervisor,
 - suspend the licence for a period not exceeding three months;
 - revoke the licence.

3.0 Background information

- 3.1 Admiral Taverns Piccadilly Limited have been the premises licence holders for King George V since 16th November 2016. The current premises licence including the operating schedule and premises plan is attached as **Appendix 1**
- 3.2 Mr Raman Singh was nominated as the Designated Premises Supervisor (DPS) for King George V by Admiral Taverns Piccadilly Limited on the 15th February 2017.
- 3.3 In order to assist members of the Committee and those attending the Hearing a street map of the locality of King George V is provided at **Appendix 2**.

West Midlands Police

- 3.4 An application from the Chief Constable of West Midlands Police to review the premises licence for King George V was received by the licensing authority on 18th January 2021. The grounds for the review (section C of the application) relate to three of the statutory licensing objectives
 - the prevention of crime and disorder,
 - public safety,
 - the prevention of public nuisance

The representation sets out a chronological sequence of events between January and December 2020 indicating the failure of the DPS Mr Raman Singh to operate the premises in line with three of the four licensing objectives

Examples of the incidents investigated by the Police include

- Customers attempting to enter the premises after closing time.
- A vehicle ramming the premises whilst individuals were inside both the vehicle and the premises.
- Alleged fights at the premises
- Allegations of the premises being operated outside of its permitted hours having 'lock ins'.
- Allegations of noise and disorder form customers leaving the premises
- Fighting and disorder occurring outside of the permitted operating hours of the Pub and involving persons at the pub and a local car wash.
- Failure by the DPS following reasonable requests to provide recordings of incidents at the pub via the CCTV system.
- Incidents involving persons being at the premises in breach of Coronavirus restrictions and Mr Singh being issued with a Fixed Penalty Notice for the breach.
- 3.5 The representation clarifies that the Police believe they have exhausted their engage, explain, encourage national procedure for dealing with noncompliance. They believe Mr Singh acted independently from Admiral Taverns and wilfully ignored the advice and encouragement given by both West Midlands Police and Admiral Taverns. They also believe Admiral Taverns as Premises Licence Holder failed to control their tenant leading to the licensing objectives being undermined.

A copy of the review application is provided at **Appendix 3**.

- 3.6 In accordance with prescribed regulation, following the submission of the review application officers arranged for a premises licence review notice to be displayed for 28 consecutive days at the premises and on the council's website.
- 3.7 The period for further written representations (of either a positive or negative nature) to be submitted from other responsible authorities and 'other persons' closed on 15th February 2021.
- 3.8 On the 18th January 2021 the licensing authority received a response from the Home Office to say that they have no record of any Immigration Offences against the premises and so will not be making any representations.
- 3.9 On the 27th January 2021 the licensing authority were in receipt of an application to Vary the DPS from Admiral Taverns. The application was made to remove Mr Singh as the DPS for the premises. At present there is no DPS in place for the premises. A copy of the application is attached as **Appendix 4**.

Environmental Health

- On the 9th February 2021 the licensing authority received a representation from John Harvey on behalf of Walsall Council's Environmental Health Service. The representation was made on the grounds of the prevention of crime and disorder and public safety.
- 3.11 The representation details investigations the Environmental Health Service have conducted as a response to complaints that the King George V was operating in contravention of Regulations intended by Government to control the spread of coronavirus. The representation shows the Council and Police working together to try and ensure the responsible persons at King George V complied with said regulations. The representation and appendices highlight the failure of the DPS Mr Raman Singh to comply with the advice provided by both organisations. Appended to the Representation are the following documents.
 - 1. A Public Health report on the impact of Coronavirus.
 - 2. A copy of a letter dated 1/4/2020 sent to the responsible person at King George V asking for the person to contact Environmental health due to complaints being received regarding alleged breach of COVID regulations.
 - Copies of a Prohibition Notice (and covering letter) dated 31st
 December 2020 served on Admiral Taverns Piccadilly Ltd under the Health Protection (Coronavirus, Restrictions)(All Tiers)(England) Regulations 2020 as amended. The Notice requires the responsible person to
 - Close any premises or part of the premises in which food or drink are provided for consumption on the premises and
 - ii. Cease providing food or drink for consumption on its premises.
 - 4. Copies of a Prohibition Notice (and covering letter) dated 31st December 2020 served on Mr Raman Singh under the Health Protection (Coronavirus, Restrictions)(All Tiers)(England) Regulations 2020 as amended. The Notice requires the responsible person to
 - iii. Close any premises or part of the premises in which food or drink are provided for consumption on the premises and
 - iv. Cease providing food or drink for consumption on its premises.
 - 5. A list of nine complaints received in relation to the premises between 30th March 2020 and 16th September 2020. A copy of the email and documents are attached as **Appendix 6**.

Community Protection

3.12 On the 12th February 2021 the licensing authority were in receipt of a representation from Kirsty Steward on behalf of Walsall Council's Community Protection Service.

The representation supported the review application made by the Chief Constable and was made on the grounds of Prevention of Public Nuisance. The representation states that between 15th July 2020 and 19th August 2020 twelve noise nuisance and antisocial behaviour complaints were made about the premises by thirteen local residents. The complainants were concerned about noise and anti-social behaviour from persons leaving the premises, revving cars, loud music from speakers and noise from sporting events shown on a television near the garden area of the premises.

- 3.13 Two residents recorded the noise nuisance they were suffering from on a Noise App used by the Community Protection service for noise nuisance complaints. Between 14th August 2020 and 18th September 2020, 28 recordings of noise nuisance and antisocial behaviour were uploaded to the App for review by Community Protection staff. A copy of the representation is attached at **Appendix 7.**
- 3.14 No further representations have been received from any of the other responsible authorities or other persons.
- 3.15 The Licensing Authority is able to confirm that there are no annual fees currently outstanding for the premises.

4.0 Resource Considerations.

- 4.1 **Financial:** Any decision taken by the Licensing Authority may be appealed to the Magistrates' Court. The Licensing Authority would have to bear the costs of defending such an appeal.
- 4.2 **Legal:** Any application for review received by the licensing authority must be relevant to the promotion of the licensing objectives namely: Prevention of Crime and Disorder, Public Safety, Prevention of Public Nuisance, Protection of Children from Harm.

In determining the review application the licensing sub committee must have regard to:

- The need to promote the four licensing objectives.
- Representations made.
- Relevant sections of the Licensing Act 2003.
- Relevant sections of the statutory guidance issued under s.182 of the Act.
- The licensing authorities' policy statement.

4.3 Paragraph 10.28 of Section 182 Guidance issued under The Licensing Act 2003 states:

The 2003 Act does not require a designated premises supervisor or any other personal licence holder to be present on the premises at all times when alcohol is sold. However, the designated premises supervisor and the premises licence holder remain responsible for the premises at all times including compliance with the terms of the 2003 Act and conditions attached to the premises licence to promote the licensing objectives.

In determining the review application the sub committee can take such steps as it considers necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives:

- Take no further action.
- Modify the conditions of the licence.
- Exclude a licensable activity from the scope of the licence.
- Removal of the designated premises supervisor (if applicable).
- Suspend the licence for a period not exceeding three months.
- Revoke the licence.

In deciding which of these powers to invoke, it is expected that licensing authorities should so far as possible seek to establish the cause or causes of the concerns that the representations identify. The remedial action taken should generally be directed at these causes and should always be no more than an appropriate and proportionate response to address the causes of concern that instigated the review.

Where the sub committee takes the step to modify the conditions of licence or exclude a licensable activity, it may provide that the modification or exclusion is to have effect for one such period (not exceeding three months) as it may specify.

The licensing authority may decide that the review does not require it to take any further steps appropriate to promoting the licensing objectives. In addition, there is nothing to prevent a licensing authority issuing an informal warning to the licence holder and/or to recommend improvement within a particular period of time. It is expected that licensing authorities will regard such informal warnings as an important mechanism for ensuring that the licensing objectives are effectively promoted and that warnings should be issued in writing to the licence holder.

However, where responsible authorities such as the police or environmental health officers have already issued warnings requiring improvement – either orally or in writing – that have failed as part of their own stepped approach to address concerns, licensing authorities should not merely repeat that approach and should take this into account when considering what further action is appropriate (11.18 Guidance).

Where the applicant for review, holder of the premises licence or any other person who made relevant representations in relation to the application is aggrieved by the decision of the licensing authority, appeal is to magistrates court where the reasonableness or otherwise of the decision will be tested.

Where authorised persons and responsible authorities have concerns about problems identified at premises, it is good practice for them to give licence holders early warning of their concerns and the need for improvement, and where possible they should advise the licence or certificate holder of the steps they need to take to address those concerns. A failure by the holder to respond to such warnings is expected to lead to a decision to apply for a review. Co-operation at a local level in promoting the licensing objectives should be encouraged and reviews should not be used to undermine this cooperation.

4.4 Licensing authorities should look to the police as the main source of advice on crime and disorder as stated in Section 182 of the guidance issued under the Licensing Act 2003. Section 2.5 of the guidance also states:

"It will normally be the responsibility of the premises licence holder as an employer, and not the licensing authority, to ensure that the managers appointed at the premises are competent and appropriately trained. The designated premises supervisor is the key person who will usually be responsible for the day to day management of the premises by the premises licence holder, including the prevention of disorder"

- 4.5 Public nuisance is given a statutory meaning in many pieces of legislation. It is however not narrowly defined in the 2003 Act and retains its broad common law meaning. It may include in appropriate circumstances the reduction of the living and working amenity and environment of other persons living and working in the area of the licensed premises. Public nuisance may also arise as a result of the adverse effects of artificial light, dust, odour and insects or where its effect is prejudicial to health.
- 4.6 Paragraph 11.24 of the guidance states:

A number of reviews may arise in connection with crime that is not directly connected with licensable activities. For example, reviews may arise because of drugs problems at the premises, money laundering by criminal gangs, the sale of contraband or stolen goods, the sale of firearms, or the sexual exploitation of children. Licensing authorities do not have the power to judge the criminality or otherwise of any issue. This is a matter for the courts. The licensing authority's role when determining such a review is not therefore to establish the guilt or

innocence of any individual but to ensure the promotion of the crime prevention objective.

4.7 Paragraph 11.25 of the guidance states:

Reviews are part of the regulatory process introduced by the 2003 Act and they are not part of criminal law and procedure. There is, therefore, no reason why representations giving rise to a review of a premises licence need be delayed pending the outcome of any criminal proceedings. Some reviews will arise after the conviction in the criminal courts of certain individuals, but not all. In any case, it is for the licensing authority to determine whether the problems associated with the alleged crimes are taking place on the premises and affecting the promotion of the licensing objectives. Where a review follows a conviction, it would also not be for the licensing authority to attempt to go beyond any finding by the courts, which should be treated as a matter of undisputed evidence before them.

Licence holders have a responsibility to ensure the safety of those using their premises, as a part of their duties under the 2003 Act. This concerns the safety of people using the relevant premises rather than public health which is addressed in other legislation. Physical safety includes the prevention of accidents and injuries and other immediate harms that can result from alcohol consumption such as unconsciousness or alcohol poisoning

- 4.8 It is envisaged that licensing authorities, the police, the Home Office (Immigration Enforcement) and other law enforcement agencies, which are responsible authorities, will use the review procedures effectively to deter such activities and crime. Where reviews arise and the licensing authority determines that the crime prevention objective is being undermined through the premises being used to further crimes, it is expected that revocation of the licence even in the first instance should be seriously considered.
- 4.9 **Staffing:** Nothing arising from this report.

- (c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
- (d) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner;
- (e) dispensing alcohol directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of disability).
- **2.** The responsible person must ensure that free potable water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.
- **3.** (1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.
 - (2) The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licence must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy.
 - (3) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either—
 - (a) a holographic mark, or
 - (b) an ultraviolet feature.
- 4. The responsible person must ensure that—
 - (a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it

is available to customers in the following measures—

- (i) beer or cider: ½ pint;
- (ii) gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and
- (iii) still wine in a glass: 125 ml;
- (b) these measures are displayed in a menu, price list or other printed material which is available to customers on the premises; and
- (c) where a customer does not in relation to a sale of alcohol specify the quantity of alcohol to be sold, the customer is made aware that these measures are available."

 - (ii) the personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence:
 - (d) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and
 - (e) "value added tax" means value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994.
- **3.** Where the permitted price would not be a whole number of pennies, the permitted price shall be taken to be the price rounded up to the nearest penny.

4. Where the permitted price on a day ("the first day") would be different from the permitted price on the next day ("the second day") as a result of a change to the rate of duty or value added tax, the permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day.





Please state the ground(s) for review (please read guidance note 2)

These premises are a licensed hotel, a bar area on the ground floor and 6 bedrooms rooms above that operate under a Premises License. The Premise Licence Holder is Admiral Taverns who have a working relationship with the Designated Premise Supervisor in the form of a Pre-purchase agreement. The licensable area on the ground floor has a number of rooms, a large garden/patio area which backs onto residential properties and during lockdown has been open for take away meals.

The grounds for this review come from repeated failures of the DPS to work within the confines of the premise license, the boundaries of statutory nuisance together with his mismanagement of procedures throughout the Covid pandemic. This has been through the premises not following the regulation, which is a criminal offence, but also breaching the extensive guidance designed to help premises operate in a Covid secure manner. This has happened to a level that it is placing an increased risk of infection to the staff, customers attending, officers that need to enforce and the wider community. The Premise Licence Holder has been kept informed of the DPS's actions but to date offences are still occurring.

West Midlands Police can only see that this has been done for the purpose of profit and financial gain for the club at a time when other premises, both locally and nationally, have been abiding by the rules in spite of the financial hardship this has caused them.

The Covid 19 Pandemic has had a global impact with over 2 MILLION fatalities. The UK has seen a significant impact with a comparatively high level of deaths per 100,000 of population. It has seen significant hardship with three national lockdowns, tiering systems that impact on different regions designed to restrict social interaction. This has been done to try and defeat the pandemic and allow normality to resume as quickly as possible. Actions that have occurred at this premise only delayed that further to the continued detriment of others.

The infection rate in Walsall has varied throughout 2020 which has resulted in them sitting in different tiers at different times. This will be identified as we go through the time line of events.

WMP have exhausted the engage, explain and encourage elements of the nationwide 4 E approach. It is clear that the Designated Premise Supervisor is working independently to Admiral Taverns and is either wilfully ignoring what WMP and Admiral Taverns are saying or at worst neglectful as to how the premises should be operated.

This pattern of behaviour is undermining the Public Safety, Crime and Disorder and Public Nuisance licensing objectives.

The events which have led to this enforcement action are described below, in chronological order.

For ease, all regulations and guidance will be supplied as supplementary evidence before the hearing.

Police received a call from staff at the venue on 26th January 2020 stating customers whom they had ejected were trying to get back in. On 28th January a telephone conversation took place between PC Tolley and Mr Singh regarding 19 incidents between October and the current date. Most of these incidents occurred on a Saturday evening into Sunday morning. Measures including the employment of door staff where agreed.

On 13th March the police receiving an anonymous letter, given to them by local MP Valarie Vaz regarding anti-social issues connected to the King George V. On checking with Walsall Council Community Safety team they confirmed they had also received several letters of complaint going back to 2019.

On 20th March PC Tolley spoke with the Area Manager for Admiral Taverns, Neal Barnes to make him aware and followed it up with a further call.

On 3 August police receive a report of a vehicle ramming the premises with males in and outside the premises.

On 7th August a fight outside the pub was reported. On officers attendance no one present was making themselves known

On 9th August at 02:59 intelligence received stated that the pub was still open and trading which is outside the permitted hours on his Premise Licence.

On the 13th August the Licensing Officer started to receive correspondence and video footage of noise complaints and disorder at the King George V.

On 15th August a further disorder incident with customers leaving the venue at 01:28. When the Licensing Officer spoke with Mr Singh he replied "I'm just trying to make a living". The Licensing Officer advised that it is his responsibility to ensure he dispersed his customers in an orderly manner. This is undermining the crime and disorder, public safety and public nusiance licensing objective.

21st August 2020 a meeting was held between Raman Singh, Kirsty Steward, Community Protection Officer, Walsall Borough Council and Jennifer Mellor, Walsall Police Licensing Officer at the premises. The reason for the meeting was due to the number of noise complaints, crime and disorder incidents occurring at the venue when customers where leaving venue and the reports of licensable activity carrying on passed the permitted hours. A number of recordings from neighbours evidencing statutory noise nuisance Mr Singh confirmed that there has been occasions during the first lockdown, the venue had been open, selling alcohol and playing recorded music outside the permitted hours.

On 25th August a further licensing visit took place with Mr Singh, his mother and Kirsty Steward after further noise complaints and report of a fight. It was established Mr Singh had been showing a boxing fight on the TV screen inside with his customers watching from outside which had resulted in the excessive noise. CCTV was checked on Mr Singh's mobile phone at 23:45 hours but no fight was evidenced. We have since discovered the main CCTV is an hour out and this was viewed on Mr Singh's mobile, officers were therefore not shown the correct footage for the time

requested.

The licensing officer continued to receive noise complaints throughout August until on the 12th September intelligence was received of people still in the pub at 03:30 that evening. Police Licensing Officer was able to view a Walsall Council Anti-Social multi head camera which evidenced the car park full at 02:06 and a number of persons leaving the venue at 02:30 and a van leaving at 03:17. Footage has been downloaded

Due to this incident on 14th September Neal Barnes Area Manager was called to discuss the ongoing issues and non-compliance. Mr Barnes agreed to speak with Mr Singh. Police also received an email from a Manager at a neighbouring council to say they had visited and were not asked to Track and Trace and there was no social distancing within the venue. Mr Barnes was made aware of this correspondence.

On 16th September the Licensing Officer and Mr Barnes spoke again. Mr Singh had told Admiral the lock ins were in the past and were a few months ago. After giving Mr Barnes the dates he said he would phone him again. The Licensing Officer suggested setting up a meeting to discuss in person at the venue

On 19th September Police attended due to an incident of disorder occurring at the car wash next door to the King George V. When the Licensing Officer was back on duty she viewed the council ASB camera. At 01:32 12 males can be seen leaving the pub to become involved in the disorder. Further fighting continues at 01:36 and at 01:32 a car mounts the central reservation to cross the carriage, At 01:46 a further car reverses back down the carriageway and then at 01:46 police arrive, At 01:58 three males are seen leaving the King George V. This is undermining the crime and disorder, public safety, public nuisance and is outside of the hours permitted on this license.

On 23rd September an email was forwarded to Mr Singh from the Police Licensing Officer relating to changes in COVID regulations including the introduction of table service from the following Thursday.

On 15th October a meeting was held at the request of the Walsall Police Licensing officer. In attendance was Neal Barnes from Admiral, Raman Singh and a number of Walsall Council officers. We tried to view the CCTV on the main TV monitor but due to the time being incorrect, Mr Singh being evasive and the system crashing the police asked to see the previous weekends evening footage at any time as Mr Singh was unable to show officer many of the times requested. It was evidenced by all officers watching the monitor customers standing at the main bar, people being served together with a lack of social distancing or masks. This was at a time when COVID regulations stated table service only. Mr Singh was given advice and we left with Admiral Taverns left to offer further support.

On December 20th officers attended the pub and saw a glimpse of a light behind a curtain at one of the front windows. Officers heard numerous voices and music playing inside premises. One officer could see multiple people through a very small gap in the curtain but it was too small to tell exactly how many. It was clear however there were more than 2 inside premises. Officers knocked on the door and window but there no initial response. When officers did gain entry and a search made of the premises, there was no trace of any persons, however upon discovering a rear open door that leads to a side gate it is highly likely that they exited the pub as officers entered. Officers have since revisited the pub to view CCTV only to be told by Mr Singh, his system only records for two weeks. Admiral Taverns and the Licensing officer on the 15th October as detailed above, have viewed footage in excess of 2 weeks therefore suggesting the officers were correct in what they saw that evening.

On December 24th officers have been on patrols past the King George V pub and noticed downstairs lights on and vehicles parked up. As officers approached the front door they were greeted by staff who were very reluctant to let officers in, The DPS's mother initially held the door shut. As officers entered 8 persons in total in were in the bar, two staff, and 6 customers, of the 6 visitors, they were from 5 different households. Therefore a clear breach. Mr Singh was issued with a Fixed Penalty Notice and others dispersed. Persons were under the influence and had alcohol on the tables within wine coolers. There was a lack of social distancing and the wearing of masks of both staff and customers.

On 31 December 2020 Walsall Council served Prohibition Notices on Mr Singh and Admiral Tayerns.

WMP have worked in partnership with Walsall local authority to address the issues but the operators have disregarded guidance and support from both WMP and Walsall local authority.

For all of the reasons documented, WMP do not have the confidence in the operator and believe that the premise is not promoting 3 out of the four licensing objectives.

WMP have no confidence in the management of this premises which has shown a disregard to the licensing objectives for the sake of profit and financial gain. Admiral Taverns are the Premise Licence Holder however the evidence contained in this review suggests Admiral have a lack of control of their tenant as the breaches of their licence and the breaches in COVID-19 regulations and guidance has continued. WMP are seeking the revocation of this Premise licence or as a minimum, the removal of Mr Raman Singh, the Designated Premise Supervisor from this business.

During a national emergency King George V, Wallows Lane, Walsall, West Midlands, WS2 9BZ breached The Health Protection (Coronavirus Restrictions) (All Tiers) (England) Regulations 2020 Regulation 8 and Part 2 of Schedule 3. Paragraph 9(1) of these Regulations where on the 5th December the club had opened its premises, or part of its premises, for the sale or consumption of food and drink. The cases of infection in both the UK and Walsall remains high. This activity/gathering contravened emergency public health measures imposed to reduce the public health risks posed by the spread of COVID-19. It could also have resulted in the transmission of COVID-19 and subsequent illness or death

I JOHN JAMES HARVEY, employed by Walsall Metropolitan Borough Council, Civic Centre, Darwall Street, Walsall, WS1 1TP as an Environmental Health Officer. I have been a fully qualified Environmental Health Officer for 7 years. I am an authorised Officer to enforce provisions of the Health Protection (Coronavirus, Restrictions) (England) Regulations 2020 and The Health Protection (Coronavirus, Restrictions) (All Tiers) (England) Regulations 2020.

Due to the emerging pandemic of coronavirus and growing number of cases throughout the UK, the Secretary of state introduced The Health Protection (Coronavirus, Restrictions) (England) Regulations 2020 on the 26th of March 2020.

These regulations were made in response to the serious and imminent threat to public health, which is posed by the incidence and spread of severe acute respiratory syndrome coronavirus 2 (SARS-CoV-2) in England. These regulations prohibited the sale of food and alcohol for consumption on the premises.

On the 30st March 2020, Environmental Health at Walsall Council received a complaint via West Midlands Police regarding members of the public attempting to gain access to King George V, Wallows Lane, Walsall, West Midlands, WS2 9BZ whilst the UK was on its first coronavirus lockdown. In response to this complaint, on 1st of April 2020, a letter addressed to the responsible person at this premises was sent to inform them of the complaint and to draw their attention to legislation that prohibited them from trading as a pub at this time. The letter also advised that further monitoring could be undertaken by Walsall Council and/ or The Police in order to investigate allegations concerning the premises. A copy of this letter is attached in Appendix II.

The first lockdown was released in a staged approach with key sectors and industries returning at different times. On the 6th of July 2020, an amendment to the regulations allowed the hospitality sector to re-open.

Walsall Councils Environmental Health Department received a further eight complaints ranging from being open when they should not be, to poor social distancing, during the time period 28th April 2020 to 16th September 2020, the majority of which were unsubstantiated. A summary of the complaints received is given in Appendix II

On the 26th of September 2020, the government introduced , The Health Protection (Coronavirus, Restrictions) (Obligations of Hospitality Undertakings) (England) Regulations 2020 This law prevented groups of more than six persons sitting together within a licensed premises. It is also enforced a table only service whereby customers should be seated in a social distant manner at all times when at a licensed premises.

On 14 October 2020, the government introduced a three-tier approach across England, with legal restrictions varying according to government-defined tiers. Walsall was placed into tier two at this time (referred to in government statements as "Local COVID Alert Levels"Tier 2": The Health Protection (Coronavirus, Local COVID-19 Alert Level) (High) (England) Regulations 2020 (SI 2020/1104). The law specified that businesses that sell alcohol must serve all food and drink to customers seated at tables. Customers must order at the table, and must remain seated while eating and drinking.

On the 25th of October, Walsall Council Environmental Health Officers accompanied the Police on a joint visit to the King George V to assess covid compliance and security.

CCTV was viewed showing customers standing together at the bar, which was in breach of the Obligation of Undertaking Regulations. Advice was given to the Designated Premises Supervisor on customer distancing and appropriate Covid- 19 control measures. On the 5th of November, due to high levels of covid infection nationally, the Government introduced a month long national lockdown to prevent the NHS from being overwhelmed by the number of patients requiring hospitalisation. The Health Protection (Coronavirus, Restrictions) (England) (No. 4) Regulations 2020 were put into place. This again prohibited the sale of food and alcohol for consumption on the premises.

On the 2nd of December, when the national lockdown measures were removed, Walsall was placed into Tier 3 of The Health Protection (Coronavirus, Restrictions) (All Tiers) (England) Regulations 2020. This law prohibited the sale and supply of food for consumption on premises.

On the 29th of December 2020, West Midlands Police informed Walsall Council that Police Officers had observed a lock in that had taken place within the grounds of King George V, Wallows Lane, Walsall, West Midlands, WS2 9BZ. A witness statement provided by PC0876 Symon Bytheway indicated that alcohol had been served and consumed at the premises, which contravenes The All Tier Regulations. WALSALL COUNCIL PUBLIC HEALTH COVID-19 SUMMARY

At present we are experiencing a global Covid-19 pandemic and a national emergency with many deaths recorded and continuing to occur. With the advent of the new variant of the COVID-19 the cases of infection in the UK are increasing at an unprecedented and alarming rate. Illegal and irresponsible actions/activities such as those encountered when, during a national emergency, King George V breached The Health Protection (Coronavirus Restrictions) (All Tiers) (England) Regulations 2020 Regulation 8 and Part 2 of Schedule 3. Paragraph 9(1) of these Regulations where on the 24th December when it opened its premises, or part of its premises, for the sale or consumption of food and drink could have caused the spread of COVID-19.

It is important to note that Walsall was moved into Tier 4 on 31st December 2020 as the number of positive cases had continued to rise. There was a 35% increase in Coronavirus cases between 21st to 27th December 2020, meaning more than 900 people tested positive for the virus and the rate per 100K of the population was 312.

Walsall's cases are increasing. From 3^{rd} to 9^{th} January 2021 there were 2119 cases of COVID-19.

On 11th January 2021 Walsall's rate of COVID-19 per 100k of the population per week was 826 (almost doubled from previous week).

Between Thursday 5th November 2020 and 2nd December 2020, prior to the service of the Prohibition Notice, Walsall, along with England was subject to a second lockdown. National restrictions were imposed where everyone was required to stay at home, and only for a limited set of reasons could you leave the home including:

- For education;
- For work, if you cannot work from home;

- For exercise and recreation outdoors, with your household, support bubble or on your own with one person from another household;
- For all medical reasons, appointments and to escape injury or harm;
- To shop for food and essentials;
- And to provide care for vulnerable people, or as a volunteer.

The second lockdown was introduced as there was a significant increase in the number of positive COVID cases. Although the increases were initially among younger age groups, there was increasing numbers of older people with coronavirus in almost all areas of the country, including Walsall.

The number of hospitalisations started to increase, ultimately leading to a higher mortality rate. Without the lockdown and breaking the chain of transmission between person-to-person the numbers of people dying from Coronavirus would be as high as they were at the peak of the first wave of coronavirus back in April 2020.

Walsall Council Public Health COVID-19 Summary

Transition from National restrictions to alert levels (Tiering system)

The national restrictions (Lockdown 2) ended on the 2 December and Walsall was moved into Tier 3, the highest COVID-19 category at the time. This meant that the strict restrictions would still be in place including restrictions on meeting people outside, hospitality businesses such as pubs, cafes and restaurants only being allowed to offer takeaway or click and collect service and a rule of six outdoors being imposed.


During the national restrictions there was a reduction in however the virus continued to spread in the community. The move to Tier 3 demonstrated that the rate of infection in Walsall was still too high and the restrictive measures were required locally to make sure we reduce the spread further.

Walsall was moved into Tier 4 on 31 December as the number of positive cases had continued to rise. There was a 35% increase in coronavirus cases between 21 to 27 December, meaning more than 900 people tested positive for the virus and the rate per 100K of the population was 312.

Read the statement from the Director of public health on the Transition from national restrictions to Local COVID Alert Level Very High (Tier 3)

COVID-19 Data

- The rate per 100K was 308, significantly higher than the national and also regional average during this period
- In total 831 people tested positive for COVID-19 (20th to 26th December) a 25% increase compared to the previous week.
- At the time, positive case rates were on the increase as was positivity, with testing levels below the national and WM region.
- Those aged 30 to 44 years were the most prominent age groups testing positive at 29%
- The mortality rate in Walsall and the Black Country continued to increase
- The NHS was under significant pressure and Walsall Manor hospital remained extremely busy with pressure on ICU.
- The main transmission route in Walsall was household to household meaning people spending time indoors with people outside of their household or recognised support bubble. This was against Tier 3 restrictions
- The rate for Pleck ward was 308 per 100K of the population ranked 10th highest ward for that week.

On 15th July 2020, an email complaint from a resident was received by Walsall Council that since 4th July 2020, new management had reopened the pub and the noise had					

become really bad. The complainant described loud music, shouting and screaming in the rear garden and anti- social behaviour on the car park at the front of the building. They described a bass speaker which alegedly shakes the complainants house and was being used until the early hours of the morning, specifically Monday 13th July 2020 where the music had continued until 01:30. The complainant claimed that the customers were arriving at the end of the night and racing up and down the road, revving engines outside the pub and blocking his drive. They claim to have been threatened by someone from the pub when they were asked to move a car from the front of the drive.

On 24th July 2020, an email complaint from a resident was received. The complainant stated that since 1965 when they moved into their home, they had never experienced noise at night like they were reporting currently. They stated that the noise was going on until 02:45 in the morning from the back lawn of the pub. They stated this was disturbing their sleep at night as their home is very close to the pub's rear garden. They said that they had been told by another resident that they had written to the pub asking them for help but had decided to sell their house and move away because they had no response.

On 27th July 2020, an email complaint from a resident was received. They describe cars revving engines outside the front of the pub and cars speeding up and down the road. They also mention customer fighting outside the pub between 03:00 and 04:00, breaking lockdown regulations by letting in customers and state they had called the Police on multiple occasions.

On 3rd August 2020, an email complaint from a resident who stated that Police had been called to a disturbance at the premises around 3am that morning. Customers from the pub were allegedly smashing up cars with crates.

On 3rd August 2020, a telephone complaint was received from a resident stating that there was 20 to 30 people shouting and swearing in the street outside the pub.

On 7th August 2020, a telephone complaint was received by a resident complaining about the incident on 3rd August 2020 and also about loud music.

On 10th August 2020, an email complaint was received by a resident stating people drinking in the pub during lockdown, drinkers shouting in the pub garden and loud music which could be heard over their television. They claimed that the pub was regularly open until 3am. This complainant stated they had reported the problems to Crimestoppers but had received no feedback.

On 17th August 2020, a telephone complaint was received by a resident reporting chanting, swearing and loud talking from the pub.

On 18th August, a telephone complaint was received from a resident stating there was loud music until 03:00, people laughing and racing cars up and down the street.

On the 18th August, an email complaint was received at 01:30 from a resident stating the the pub was open still and having a 'lock in'. They stated there was loud music and 'general rowdiness' coming from inside the pub.

On 18th August 2020, an anonymous caller made a complaint about loud music until 02:00 to 03:00. No other details given apart from they were afraid to leave their details.

On 19th August 2020, a telephone complaint was received by a resident stating that the music from the pub is louder than their television and fan.

Of the 13 residents that called or emailed to complain about noise from the pub, 2 residents made recordings through The Noise App.

The Noise App was launched in April 2019 and is offered to Walsall Council residents to use as a way of gathering evidence in noise nuisance cases. The Noise App allows the user to record up to 30 seconds of sound from their handheld device from their home. The App records the user's address and position through GPS. The App provides an intelligence base in order to futher potential action by either Walsall Council or the Police.

The first resident from Wallows Lane sent one recording from 12:39 on 14th August 2020. It was of loud voices from the garden at the pub.

The second resident from Wallows Lane sent multiple recordings from 12th August 2020 to 18th September 2020 as follows:

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On the 21st Áugust 2020, I visited the pub with Jennifor Mellor from West Midlands Police to speak with the DPS Mr Raman Singh about the complaints received about noise and ASB. Mr Raman Singh agreed to ensure his customers were not making noise in the garden after around 23:00. Mr Raman Singh admitted that he had been open and played recorded music outside of permitted hours. Mr Raman Singh agreed to employ doorstaff who would be positioned near to the entrance to the garden to ensure noise levels were reduced and manage the customers when leaving the premises at closing time. Mr Raman Singh agreed to close the garden area at 00:30 and turn all music off at the same time.

All the above was confirmed by email to Mr Raman Singh from Jennifer Mellor.

On the 25th August 2020, I visited the pub again with Jennifer Mellor following a report of a fight at the pub in the garden on the 22nd August 2020. Mr Raman Singh said that there had been a boxing match on the television and the customers were watching the screen which was angled to be seen from the rear garden. He was advised to stop showing sports events from the television that is seen from the garden to avoid the noise from the customers shouting in the future. We checked the CCTV inside the pub from Mr Raman's Singhs mobile phone and confirmed there was no fighting that night, we could see the customer getting very excited in the rear garden which would match up with Mr Singhs explanation.

On the 15th October 2020, I visited the pub with Jennifer Mellor, West Midlands Police, Paul Rooney, Environmental Health and Anthony Stewart, Environmental Health to speak again with Mr Raman Singh about multiple incidents that had been recorded by the Walsall Anti- Social Behaviour camera positioned across the road from the pub. We requested to view footage from the CCTV and Mr Raman Singh stated he was having technical difficulty with the television. We didn't manage to see the dates or times requested from him and his CCTV time stamp showed to be over an hour different. We were shown a CCTV clip what Mr Raman Singh told was a recent Saturday night. We could not hear sound but it was clearly very busy and customers did not appear to be adhering to Covid Regulations.
