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THE PROVISION OF PRIMARY SCHOOL PLACES IN SOUTH WILLENHALL

Report of the Secretary to the Committee

1. Purpose of the Report

The purpose of the report is to inform Members of the School Organisation Committee of proposals to change the pattern of primary school provision in South Willenhall. The report outlines the consultation that has taken place, and summarises the representations that have been received.

2. The Proposals

Walsall Council proposes to cease to maintain Clothier Street, Lakeside and Little London Primary Schools from 31 August 2006.

It is further proposed to open a new, two-form entry school from 1 September 2006; the new school to be built on the former Willenhall Motor Radiator Club Sports Ground site, Noose Lane, Willenhall.

3. What the Proposals are intended to Achieve

The proposals are intended to:-

- Increase school effectiveness, by providing a flexible and modern environment in which teaching and learning can flourish.
- Improve the opportunities available to children in the area served by the school.
- Raise standards of attainment, which are currently a cause for concern. All three schools achieve outcomes at KS2 below the floor thresholds of 65% in English and mathematics.
- Target resources at pupils by reducing Facilities Management costs.
- Remove 222 surplus primary places from the South Willenhall area.

4. Chronology

The need for reorganisation of the provision of primary school places in South Willenhall was recognised by Walsall Council some years ago and in the intervening period the Council undertook extensive consultation and sought PFI financial support for the proposed replacement school. In all, three PFI bids were made but these were not supported by the Government. Education Walsall took advantage of an opportunity of an alternative funding source, the Targeted Capital Fund, and the Government, having considered details of the proposal to close Clothier Street, Lakeside and Little London primary Schools

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and open a single replacement school, decided to make funding available to the Council subject to the approval of the associated statutory proposals.

The table below shows the timetable of events for the proposals under consideration, and a projected timetable for reorganisation, should the scheme be approved by the School Organisation Committee.

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The School Organisation Committee is required to make four decisions as follows:-

- to close Clothier Street Primary School from 31 August 2006;
- to close Lakeside Primary School from 31 August 2006;
- to close Little London Primary School from 31 August 2006;
- to open a new two-form entry Primary School on the former Willenhall Motor Radiator Club Sports Ground site from 1 September 2006.

A unanimous vote of the School Organisation Committee is required if the proposals are to be enacted or rejected. It is not possible for the School Organisation Committee to agree to some, but not all of the proposals. Should the Committee be unable to reach a unanimous decision on all of the proposals, they must all be referred to the Schools Adjudicator.

5. Demographic Analysis

The birth rate in South Willenhall has declined over recent years (Table 2). Analysis of live births and the associated take up of primary school places in Willenhall South shows that there will continue to be a large number of surplus places in primary schools.

The proposals for primary school re-organisation in South Willenhall are consistent with the 'Recommended Actions' in the School Organisation Plan approved by the School Organisation Committee for Walsall. They are also in accordance with the vision to bring about continuous improvement in pupil achievement and innovation to secure learning environments which enable all learners to realise their ambitions.

6. <u>Resource Issues</u>

The cost of the new school building would be met by an 80% capital grant from the Department for Education and Skills. The remaining 20% would be found from Walsall Council's New Deal for Schools formula allocation, over the period of the scheme. This would be an interim arrangement as the Cabinet gave support in principle to the earmarking of capital receipts to enable this specific scheme to progress, subject to confirmation of the value required for the scheme.

There are no recurrent costs associated with the proposal. Marginal costs may be incurred for a small number of children who may qualify for free home to school transport, under Walsall Council's policy.

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Recurrent revenue savings would include items detailed in Table 3 below.

7. Summary of Representations received

Thirteen representations have been received. As required, these representations and Education Walsall's observations on them are provided as Paper 5.

A petition with 1,250 signatures has also been received. The petition is supportive of the proposal that a new primary school should be created, but raises issues about the location of the school site.

8. Implications for Children travelling from Home to School

Distance from Home to the New School Site

It is inevitable that the movement of pupils from three school sites to one will result in new travel arrangements. For some families the distance between home and school will increase, for others it will decrease. The overwhelming majority of pupils live less than two miles away from the site proposed for the new school. Those who would live more than two miles away already attend a school other than the nearest school to their address by virtue of parental preference.

Entitlement to Free Transport

All pupils currently attending Clothier Street, Lakeside and Little London Primary Schools will be guaranteed a place at the new school. In line with Walsall Council's transport policy, free home to school transport will be provided for any current pupils who become entitled as a result of the move to a new site.

<u>Safety of Walking Routes to School</u>
 The walking routes to the site identified for the proposed new school
 (the former Willenhall Motor Radiator Club Sports Ground) are judged

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to be safe walking routes for children, accompanied as necessary by their

parents or a responsible adult. The provision of Crossing Patrol Officers and the introduction of traffic calming and other road safety measures will be subjects for discussion by the relevant planning authority, should planning consents be applied for.

Safety Issues

Interrogation of records at Walsall Council's Engineers Department reveals that there have been six reported accidents in the last three years on Noose Lane. There has been one reported accident outside Clothier Street Primary School in the last three years and two outside Little London Primary School. No accidents have been reported outside Lakeside Primary School.

Public Transport Availability

Some bus services which serve the South Willenhall area run close to the proposed site for the new school and would be available to families in the local area.

Service 528 (Wolverhampton via Woodend and Ashmore Park) runs on Fibbersley at 30 minute intervals. The vehicles providing the service are 'low entrance' buses which give easy access for prams or wheelchairs.

Service 525 (Wolverhampton via Bilston and Woodend) is an evening service running on Fibbersley every 60 minutes.

Service 171 (Walsall via Mossley) runs on Noose Lane, but it is an occasional service, and may not be available throughout the school year.

Discussions would be held with transport providers with a view to enhancing service provision if the proposed new school goes ahead.

9. Educational Merits of the Proposals

Attainment & Progress

In Clothier Street, Lakeside and Little London School there is considerable scope for further improvement in standards and levels of attainment achieved by pupils at the end of Key Stage 2. In all three schools, the percentage of pupils achieving Level 4 in English at the end of Key Stage 2 (2003), was low when compared with other schools. The percentage of pupils achieving Level 4 in the three schools ranged from 56% – 59% compared with a borough wide average of 72% and a national average of 75%. This places each school in the lowest quartile of attainment in the Borough. Similarly in Maths, two out of

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the three schools attained less than 60% against a borough wide average of 66% and a national average of 73%. When the results in English are considered alongside other contextual variables – for example the percentage of pupils known to be entitled to free school meals and the percentage of pupils with special educational needs, the three schools achieve levels below those expected when compared with the performance of schools across the Borough. In addition the 'improvement' measure shows that the three schools performed significantly below the LEA average (219) and the National Average (234). On this measure Clothier Street achieved 204, Lakeside 188 and Little London 175.

Table 4 shows the 2003 Key Stage 2 results in English, Maths and Science and compares those results against the Walsall average, the national average and the average achieved by schools in LEAs considered to be similar to Walsall (Statistical Neighbours).

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The results provide clear evidence of relatively low levels of attainment. The Office for Standards in Education (Ofsted) benchmarks the end of Key Stage results against all schools nationally and against similar schools nationally. The outcomes of the benchmarking process provide further clear evidence of relatively low levels of attainment. Perhaps not entirely surprisingly the results benchmarked against all schools nationally show performance for the 3 schools considerably below average and in some cases amongst the lowest in the country. However, many educational professionals believe that benchmarking against similar schools is a much fairer way of measuring relative performance. Even when compared with similar schools however, levels of attainment at Lakeside and Little London schools register within the lowest quartile and in some cases the lowest 5% of schools.

The three schools have been inspected by Ofsted at varying stages over the past four years. Clothier Street School was last inspected in 1999, Lakeside School in 2004 and Little London in 2000. Lakeside School was judged to be in need of special measures for the period 1999-2002, though it has since been inspected and removed from this category. Whilst commenting positively on a number of issues inspectors reported that in Lakeside School 'standards attained in the 2003 national tests ... were well below average overall'. The report goes on to note that 'although the children do well in their early years the standards they reach in key areas is still well below that found in other

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schools...standards are currently well below average in English, mathematics, science and ICT in Years 2 and 6'.

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Significant benefits for educational opportunity.

- DfES Guidance on Asset Management Planning notes the influence school buildings can have on a child's learning environment, and consequently on aspirations and standards of achievement.
- The new building would be fit for education in the 21st Century, taking account of increased use of information and communications technology.
- Flexible spaces inside the building would allow for the use of more innovate methods of teaching and learning and simplify the delivery of whole class and small group learning.
- The creation of the new school would enable a dynamic and sustained effort to raise pupil attainment at Key Stage 1 and Key stage 2, where currently achievement is below the Walsall and National averages.
- The proposed site is extensive, and will include enhanced outdoor sports facilities.
- The new school would have a barrier free environment, simplifying the inclusion of children with mobility or sensory difficulties.
- The proposals would create a school for 420 pupils. This is a sustainable number and would generate a sufficient budget to enable the Headteacher and Governors to engage in meaningful medium and long term planning.
- There would be no need for the vertical grouping of year groups.
- The Headteacher and Governors would have more flexibility in appointing staff with specialisms across the curriculum.
- There would be an improved career structure for staff.
- Facilities Management costs would be kept to a minimum, maximizing resources spent in the classroom.

10. <u>Recommendation</u>

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Members of the School Organisation Committee are recommended to approve the proposals.

There should be a presumption to:

 reject proposals for the closure of rural schools and sites unless the case for closure is strong and the proposals clearly in the best interests of educational provision in the area (paragraph 52 of Section 1);

reject proposals for the closure of a maintained nursery school, unless the case for closure is strong, the
proposals are clearly in the best interests of local children and families, and the LEA can show that it has
properly evaluated all the options (paragraph 59 of Section1).

In addition, the Adjudicator should not approve proposals for the closure of a denominational school where the relevant church SOC group had voted against its closure and it is clear that the closure, in conjunction with any related changes, will reduce the proportion of such denominational places within the LEA, unless it is failing or severely undersubscribed (paragraph 30 of Section1).

1. The main objectives of the proposals:

The main objective of the proposals is to close Clothier Street Primary, Lakeside Primary and Little London JMI Schools and to open a replacement purpose-built 2 form entry community primary school with 26 full-time equivalent nursery places.

Clothier Street, Lakeside and Little London Primary Schools have high levels of surplus places and buildings which are in poor condition and are unsuitable for the breadth and delivery of the curriculum in the 21st century.

There has been a significant and sustained fall in the number of pupils attending the three schools. Overall, the number of pupils fell by 23% between 1997 and 2004. If the schools were full, Clothier Street and Lakeside would each have 210 pupils and Little London would have 315 pupils giving a total of 735. In January 2004, the number of pupils on roll at the schools totalled 507. The fall in numbers means that, overall, a third of the places could be considered to be surplus. The level of surplus places at Clothier Street is 21%, 42% at Lakeside and 29% at Little London. These high levels of surplus places have been in existence for some years. Pupil numbers are expected to stabilise at the current lower levels over the next few years.

Condition expenditure of £1.7 million has been identified as necessary over the next five years. This excludes the provision of replacement buildings for Clothier Street (wooden main building and a mobile classroom unit) and Little London (five buildings the oldest of which dates from 1883). Both schools' key suitability issue relates to the need for a new building.

The proposed reorganisation of the provision of primary school places in the area is intended to:-

- Increase school effectiveness, by providing a flexible and modern environment in which teaching and learning can flourish.
- Improve the opportunities available to children in the area served by the schools.
- Raise standards of attainment.
- Target resources at pupils by reducing facilities management costs.
- Remove 222 surplus primary places in the South Willenhall area.

1. The main objectives of the proposals:

The main objective of the proposal is to open a purpose-built 2 form entry community primary school with 26 full-time equivalent nursery places. This new school would replace Clothier Street Primary, Lakeside Primary and Little London JMI schools which have high levels of surplus places and buildings which are in poor condition and are unsuitable for the breadth of curriculum delivery.

Clothier Street, Lakeside and Little London Primary Schools have high levels of surplus places and buildings which are in poor condition and are unsuitable for the breadth and delivery of the curriculum in the 21st century.

There has been a significant and sustained fall in the number of pupils attending the three schools. Overall, the number of pupils fell by 23% between 1997 and 2004. If the schools were full, Clothier Street and Lakeside would each have 210 pupils and Little London would have 315 pupils giving a total of 735. In January 2004, the number of pupils on roll at the schools totalled 507. The fall in numbers means that, overall, a third of the places could be considered to be surplus. The level of surplus places at Clothier Street is 21%, 42% at Lakeside and 29% at Little London. These high levels of surplus places have been in existence for some years. Pupil numbers are expected to stabilise at the current lower levels over the next few years.

Condition expenditure of £1.7 million has been identified as necessary over the next five years. This excludes the provision of replacement buildings for Clothier Street (wooden main building and a mobile classroom unit) and Little London (five buildings the oldest of which dates from 1883). Both schools' key suitability issue relates to the need for a new building.

The proposed reorganisation of the provision of primary school places in the area is intended to:-

- Increase school effectiveness, by providing a flexible and modern environment in which teaching and learning can flourish.
- Improve the opportunities available children in the area served by the schools.
- Raise standards of attainment, which are currently a cause for concern at two of the existing schools.
- Target resources at pupils by reducing facilities management costs.
- Remove 222 surplus primary places in the South Willenhall area.

7. Statement indicating how the proposal would contribute to enhancing the diversity and quality of education and the extent to which parental preference would be met.

The proposal would retain the existing diversity of provision in this area of South Willenhall. It would contribute to the raising of standards by establishing a single, more viable 2 form entry school with improved levels of specialist staffing to cover the curriculum range, and facilities designed for curriculum delivery in the 21st century. With the decline in birth rates, it is anticipated that the new school will be of a sufficient size to enable parental preference in the area to be met.

8. Additional Information:

a) the objectives which the local education authority or promoters intend to set to further the aims of inclusiveness and partnership working;

The design of the school will provide a flexible and barrier free learning environment, allowing children with a wide range of learning needs to be educated efficiently and effectively together.

The school will have sufficiently flexible accommodation to facilitate partnership working as recommended in the Children Bill (2004). There will also be the opportunity to develop a Children's Centre on the site.

9. Proposed admission arrangements and over subscription criteria:

Walsall Council's admission arrangements and over subscription criteria for community schools will apply to the new school. The current over subscription criteria are provided below in order of priority.

- a) Children in Public Care (looked after children)
- b) Children who have a brother or sister already in attendance at the school when the application is made
- c) Children for whom a place at the school is essential on medical or social grounds as supported in writing by a medical practitioner or social worker

 d) Distance between the home address and the school as measured in a straight line, with priority given to those living closest to the school

10. Finance – A breakdown of the costs of the establishment of the new community primary school and details of how it is proposed to fund the proposals

The estimated capital cost of the proposed new school is £3,188,522. The DfES has agreed a Targeted Capital Fund allocation of £2,550,818 subject to approval of the associated statutory proposals. The balance of £637,704 will be met from Walsall's NDS Modernisation Allocations over the period of the project. This would be an interim arrangement as the Cabinet gave support in principle to the earmarking of capital receipts to enable this specific scheme to progress, subject to confirmation of the value required for the scheme.

11. SEN Information -

 a) information as to whether the school will have provision which is recognised by the LEA as reserved for children with special educational needs, and is so, the nature of such provision and the proposed number of pupils for whom such provision is made;

The new school will not have provision reserved for children with special educational needs in the first instance.

b) details of the proposed policy of the school relating to the education of pupils with special educational needs

The proposed policy of the new school will be in line with Education Walsall's recently developed Policy Framework for special educational needs. The framework has been drawn up after extensive consultation with headteachers and other partners. The new school building will provide a barrier-free environment and will be able fully accessible to physically challenged pupils, unlike the existing three schools.

12. Staffing -

Details of the proposed staffing of, and the balance of specialisms at the new community primary school

The staffing establishment will include a headteacher, a deputy and assistant headteacher and coordinators for Foundation, Key Stage 1 and Key Stage 2. The staffing of the new school will be determined by the Temporary Governing Body. As it is to be a two form entry, there will be sufficient teaching staff to ensure that specialisms cover the breadth of the curriculum. The Temporary Governing Body will be encouraged to maximize the opportunities provided by workforce re-modelling in the appointment of non-teaching staff, to increase opportunities to provide individualised learning for pupils.

13. Curriculum -

How the proposed curriculum at the school will meet the requirements of the basic curriculum (as defined in section 352 of the Education Act 1996. This includes religious education as appropriate, the National Curriculum)

The curriculum in the new school will be based on Walsall's Primary Curriculum Policy (revised June 2004). It will reflect the National Primary Strategy and embrace the principles laid out in the DfES paper 'Excellence & Enjoyment'. The school will make full use of modern learning technology, including ICT, Interactive White-Boards and other ideas generated through the Classrooms for the Future initiative.

The development of the curriculum will be supported by Walsall's Primary Strategy Consultants. Walsall's arrangements for monitoring, challenge, intervention and support would initially place the school at Phase One for School Improvement advice. (Phase One provides the most intensive support.) It is anticipated that the school would rapidly move to Phase Three or Phase Four of the Monitoring, Challenge, Intervention and Support policy, providing results at Level 4 of the National Curriculum that are equal to, or better than the Walsall and National Average.

Initial targets for pupil attainment in literacy and numeracy will be set with the Headteacher (designate) of the new school, based on PANDA data from Clothier Street, Little London and Lakeside primary schools, which will close upon the opening of the new school. Arrangements will be made to include the school in an appropriate local Benchmarking group.

Religious education at the school will be provided in line with Walsall's Agreed Syllabus for Religious Education (revised and re-launched May 2004).

The new school will have access to help from the Music Support Service for the development of creative and performing arts.

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1. CONSULTATION PROCESS

- 1.1 A consultation document on the provision of primary school places in the area of South Willenhall served by the Clothier Street, Lakeside and Little London Primary Schools was issued by Education Walsall on 27 February 2004. The consultation period ended on 2 April 2004.
- 1.2 This document sets out the issues relating to the provision of primary school places and current and projected surplus capacity in South Willenhall and explains why reorganisation of the provision of primary school places in the area is necessary. It also provides a range of options to reduce the number of school places in the area and includes possible sites for consideration should it be decided to provide a replacement school.
- 1.3 The consultation document and consultation response form were issued to all parents, staff and governors at Clothier Street, Lakeside and Little London Schools and were circulated to all stakeholders and neighbouring authorities. The documents were also made available to the general public and were posted on Education Walsall's website.
- 1.4 Three consultation meetings were held at each of the schools for parents, staff and governors. Further meetings were offered to schools and this resulted in a followup meeting with the staff at Clothier Street Primary School.
- 1.5 Staff from Education Walsall also attended a meeting of the Friends of Willenhall Memorial Park which gave an opportunity for wider public discussion of the issues associated with the reorganisation of primary school places in the area.
- 2. REASONS WHY REDRGANISATION OF PRIMARY SCHOOL PLACES IS NECESSARY
- 2.1 There are four main reasons why it is necessary to reorganise the provision of primary school places in the area. These are:
 - falling rolls
 - surplus places
 - curriculum issues
 - condition and suitability of school buildings.

Falling Rolls

- 2.2 There has been a significant and sustained fall in the number of pupils attending the schools; overall, numbers fell by 23% between 1997 and 2004 because of a fall in the number of births. The birth rate is expected to continue at its present low level and therefore pupil numbers are expected to stabilise over the next few years.
- 2.3 If the schools were full, Clothier Street and Lakeside would each have 210 pupils and Little London would have 315 pupils, giving a total of 735. In January 2004 pupil numbers were 162, 122 and 223 respectively, giving a total of 507. The fall in numbers means that, overall, a third of the places at the schools are not filled.

Surplus Places

- 2.4 Where schools have a large number of surplus places, the Secretary of State expects proposals to be brought forward to bring the supply of school places more in line with the demand for places. This is to ensure effective deployment of public resources made available to the Council by the Government and the local community.
- 2.5 Details of surplus places at Clothier Street, Lakeside and Little London are provided in the table below.

2.6 These high levels of surplus places have been in existence for some years and this has created a difficult situation for schools to manage. It is now essential that action is taken to address the issue.

Curriculum Issues

- 2.7 Schools with small numbers of pupils face many pressures. Schools receive most of their funding (approx 80%) on the basis of pupil numbers and small schools are not usually viable financially. Schools' greatest expenditure is on staff and as the number of pupils decreases, schools may have to reduce the number of staff and reorganise classes. In some cases, it may be necessary for schools to lose one teacher a year over several years. The classes must also be taught in groups covering 2 or even 3 year groups.
- 2.8 If the number of teachers decreases, it becomes more difficult to ensure that a school is viable educationally. The delivery of a broad and balanced curriculum becomes more difficult as individual teachers become responsible for more curriculum areas and more year groups. In these circumstances it becomes extremely difficult to raise or even maintain standards.

Condition and Suitability of School Buildings

2.9 The condition and suitability of the existing school buildings is a cause of major concern. Condition expenditure of £1.7 million has been identified as necessary over the next five years at the schools, merely to deal with urgent issues of condition. This sum excludes the provision of replacement accommodation for Clothier Street School (wooden main building and mobile classroom) and Little London School (five separate buildings, oldest built in 1883). Almost no wooden schools remain in use nationally. This £1.7m investment would bring no benefit in terms of addressing the difficulties associated with surplus places or the suitability of the buildings for curriculum delivery in the 21st Century and would not make the buildings accessible by those with physical needs.

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- 3.1 A reduction in the number of school places in the area needs to be effected and could be achieved in a number of ways;
- 3.2 Option 1: reduce the number of places at Clothier Street, Lakeside and Little London schools.

It would be necessary to reduce the accommodation at each school, in order to do this. This would not address financial viability issues or building stock issues and it is likely that at least one school would need to close during the next few years. Curriculum viability would also be a problem.

3.3 Option 2: reduce number of places in the area by closing either Clothier Street School or Lakeside School and re-building a new school to replace Little London and one of the other two.

Overall, there would be enough places for all pupils but significant investment in the buildings would be required and it would be necessary to vacate the school buildings and disperse pupils elsewhere whilst extensive works were carried out. Also, once a new improved building was in place, replacing two of the schools, the numbers at the third school are likely to reduce even further, hence leading to an unplanned closure.

3.4 Option 3: close Clothier Street, Lakeside and Little London Schools and open a single replacement school.

This would enable a state of the art learning environment up to 21st century standards to be provided and would create a viable school.

- 3.5 These possible options would all address the issue of surplus places in the area but only the last one would result in educational provision that is sustainable in terms of pupil numbers and is viable educationally and financially.
- 3.6 The consultation process also included consideration of possible sites should it be decided to proceed with an option to provide a replacement school.

Site Options

- 3.7 The following possible sites were identified prior to the consultation process:
 - · Existing school sites
 - > Clothier Street Primary School
 - > Lakeside Primary School
 - > Little London Primary School
 - Willenhall Memorial Park Extension
 - Fibbersley.
- 3.8 Other sites were proposed during the consultation and these are considered in Section 5 of this report.
- 3.9 The selection of a site for a new school is a major decision and is governed by a number of constraints. These include Government guidance on the size of school sites, community accessibility and the availability of land. An appraisal of the sites listed above has been undertaken. Although each site has some advantages and disadvantages as a possible site for a new school, some sites are more suitable

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than others. A map showing the sites is included in the consultation document provided as Appendix 1.

3.10 Site Option A: build a new school on the site of one of the existing schools.

Ciothier Street Site

This site is approximately half the minimum size required for the proposed school and would not satisfy Government requirements for site areas.

Any development on the site would require closure of the existing building and the transfer of pupils to other schools in the area for up to 2 years.

Lakeside Site

Although larger than the other two school sites, this site is only approximately two- thirds of the minimum size required by the Government. Any development on the site would further reduce the undersized playing field area.

This site is the least centrally located in terms of convenience for all parents.

Development on the site would require the closure of the existing building and the dispersal of pupils to other schools in the area for up 2 years.

Little London Site

This is the smallest of the school sites and is approximately half the minimum size required in the Government's national standards for site areas. Adequate on-site playing fields could not be provided.

The school is within a conservation area; this would restrict any development and make it difficult to provide appropriate accommodation for pupils at the new school.

Although this school has the largest number of pupils, the site would be less convenient than one of the more centrally located sites for parents whose children attend Clothier Street and Lakeside Primary Schools.

Development on the site would require the closure of the existing building and the dispersal of pupils to other schools in the area for up 2 years.

3.11 Site Option B: build a new school on the site of Willenhall Memorial Park Extension.

This option would involve building in the corner of the site. The provision of new, purpose-built accommodation would address the considerable premises-related issues at the existing schools and provide a suitable learning environment for pupils in the 21st century.

This site gives an opportunity to create a facility in line with Government requirements for the size of school sites. It is envisaged that approximately 15,000 m² of land would be required for the school site. This area would enable the statutory minimum playing field requirement of 5,000 m² to be provided together with approx 1,000 m² of hard surfaced games courts - which would extend the

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range of sports activities available in the area for use by the community - a large area for informal and social activities and habitat areas. The building would be designed with a view to maximising the playing field area and other grassed areas and this would ensure that community facilities for sports outside the school day were enhanced.

The Willenhall Memorial Park Extension site is approximately 67,000 m² in size. If this site is chosen for a replacement school, no pitches would be lost, indeed, sports facilities available in the area would be enhanced by the provision of a fenced pitch and other games courts on the school site.

This site has the advantage of being centrally located relative to the existing schools and access could be provided from Noose Lane and Park Road. This site would be more accessible for all parents than the other sites.

Whilst this option would use part of the Willenhall Memorial Park Extension, there would be no impact on the pitches and it is planned to provide an additional fenced junior pitch for use by the school and the community.

Approximately 10,000 m² of the existing 67,000 m² of park land would be lost to the community as park land as it would be built upon. There would be an opportunity to enhance environmental education provision in the area by providing a specialist resource base when larger year groups have moved through the school. This facility would be available for use by other schools and community groups.

3.12 Site Option C: build a new school on the Fibbersley site.

This site is also suitable for the new school, however, it would not be as centrally located for all parents as the Willenhall Memorial Park Extension site.

The Fibbersley site is approximately 20,000 m² in size and is larger than is required to satisfy Government requirements for school sites. This would enable the statutory minimum playing field requirement of 5,000 m² to be provided together with approx 1,000 m² of hard surfaced games courts - which would extend the range of sports activities available in the area for use by the community - a large area for informal and social activities and habitat areas. The building would be designed with a view to maximising the playing field area and other grassed areas. There would be opportunities for community use of sports facilities outside the school day.

Use of this site would result in the loss of a football pitch and bowling green, however, a junior pitch and hard surface games courts would be provided for the school and some replacement facilities would be secured.

4. CONSULTATION RESPONSES

4.1 The consultation meetings provided a number of opportunities for parents, staff, governors and the wider community to discuss the issues relating to the need to reorganise the provision of primary school places in the area and possible options. At each meeting notes were taken of issues that were raised and the responses given to questions. At the time of writing the report, 68 written consultation responses had been received, of which 44 were from parents/staff at Clothier

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4.2 Numbers attending the consultation meetings are provided in the table below. In all cases a number of staff and governors were present at the parents' meetings. Schools were asked to consider whether further meetings were required and a further meeting was held with the staff at Clothier Street. A meeting was also held with the Friends of Willenhall Memorial Park at which 56 were present, including some parents.

- 4.3 Given the subject of the consultation, attendance at the meetings and the number of written response forms returned are comparatively low.
- 4.4 A wide range of opinions were shared and inevitably there were, in some cases, differences in views between the parents, staff and governors groups.
- 4.5 Although there was general acceptance of the reduction in pupil numbers which has occurred over the last few years many parents considered that this did not necessitate reorganisation as it was a benefit to the schools. Most parents stated that their children were happy at the existing schools and preferred no change to the current provision of school places. Concern was expressed about job security for staff.
- 4.6 At the Clothier Street meetings, there was little support for reorganisation and many were strongly against it.
- 4.7 At the Lakeside meetings, the prevailing view was to retain the status quo or to build a replacement school on an enlarged Lakeside site.
- 4.8 At Little London, the largest school, there was a general acceptance of the need for reorganisation and the provision of a replacement school although concerns were expressed about possible sites.
- 4.9 Much of the discussion at all of the meetings was focused on possible sites should It be decided to build a replacement school.
- 4.10 At each school it was suggested that their site be enlarged and used for a possible new school. In each case this would have significant implications for existing neighbouring land users and major financial and timescale issues would need to be addressed.
- 4.11 There was extensive discussion of the relative merits of the Willenhall Memorial Park Extension and Fibbersley sites. Concern was expressed about the distance to these sites, the volume of traffic on Noose Lane, the increased volume of traffic that would follow any development, the closeness to a large haulage depot, pollution

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from vehicle fumes, the proposed Metro line, the existence of deep ponds in the area, increased number of pedestrians in residential streets and many parents felt that it would not be safe to walk their children to school through the park. Concern was also expressed about the loss of open space that would be associated with any development, particularly with regard to the Willenhall Memorial Park Extension. These concerns were expressed very strongly at the meeting held with the Friends of Willenhall Memorial Park.

4.12 Analysis of the consultation response forms shows approximately equal levels of preference for both of these sites. The majority of responses from Clothier Street state that neither site is preferred. Responses from local residents indicate support for the Fibbersley site. Many respondents did not indicate a preferred site.

5. ALTERNATIVE SITES

5.1 A number of alternative sites were proposed at the consultation meetings and these are currently being evaluated. Initial indications are that these are unsuitable because of ground conditions, small size, or contamination.

6. RECOMMENDATIONS

- 6.1 The Cabinet is recommended to address the need for reorganisation of primary school places in the area of South Willenhall served by Clothier Street, Lakeside and Little London Primary Schools by approving the publication of statutory proposals to close Clothier Street, Lakeside and Little London primary Schools from 31 August 2006 and to open a single replacement school from 1 September 2006.
- 6.2 Regarding the site, having consulted upon and assessed all available options we would, on balance, recommend that Cabinet approve the use of the Fibbersley site as the site of the new school. The major reasons for this are:
 - (i) The parents group clearly felt that the Memorial Park site, whilst potentially environmentally more attractive for their children's school, would be very difficult to make safe. There is a perception that the park is used illicitly much of the time.
 - (ii) The alternative sites proposed during the consultation process were either unsuitable as a result of size or contamination problems or had existing land users. Changing current use, for example from housing, would require a very lengthy consultation process which would jeopardise the new build.

If however, Cabinet approve the recommendation consideration will have to be given to the following:

- (i) Security issues in the park. Many families will wish to walk through the park to reach the new site and this must be made an environment in which they believe they are safe.
- (ii) Traffic issues on Noose Lane must be considered and traffic calming measures possibly developed.

(iii) Consideration will need to be given as to how the development of the Aspray's site could impact on the school and arrangements made to ensure that there is no adverse impact.

RISK MANAGEMENT ISSUES

- 7.1 The DfES has allocated funding towards the cost of a scheme to provide a replacement school should the Cabinet decide to proceed with that option. The allocation is subject to the publication of statutory proposals before the end of May 2004 and the subsequent approval of the statutory proposals.
- 7.2 The existing school buildings are in poor condition and will require significant investment over the coming years. Such investment would not address the suitability issues at the schools.

8 SUMMARY

- 8.1 The need for reorganisation was first recognised some years ago when Walsall Council sought funding for the proposed replacement school through PFI (Public Finance Initiative). In all, three PFI bids were made and unfortunately these were not supported by the Government. Education Walsall has taken advantage of an alternative funding source, the Targeted Capital Fund, and the Government, having considered the reasons why reorganisation is necessary, has decided to fund option 3 subject to the completion of the statutory decision-making process.
- 8.2 Retaining the three existing schools is not a realistic option as it would not address surplus places, suitability and viability issues.
- 8.3 If action is not taken now, more far reaching proposals may be required in the future if the viability issues result in fewer pupils attending the schools.
- 8.4 Funding has been made available by the Government for the purpose of building a replacement school in order to address the issues outlined above; it would not be possible to use the funding to remodel/refurbish the existing school buildings. If the option of building a replacement school does not go ahead it is likely that the investment would be reallocated by the Government and that another area would benefit.

Consultation on the Provision of Primary School Places in South Willenhall in the areas covered by Clothier Street, Lakeside and Little London Primary Schools

Introduction

Education Walsall is undertaking public consultation on the provision of primary school places in South Willenhall.

The consultation period will last until 2 April 2004. No decisions will be taken by Walsall Council until 21 April 2004, following full consideration of consultation responses.

What is the purpose of the consultation?

The purpose of the consultation is to consider the issues relating to the provision of primary school places and current and projected surplus capacity in South Willenhall.

Why is the reorganisation needed?

Reorganisation of the provision of primary school places in South Willenhall is necessary for a number of reasons.

1 Falling Rolls

There has been a significant and sustained fall in the number of pupils attending Clothier Street. Lakeside and Little London Schools. Overall, the number of pupils attending the three schools fell by 23% between 1997 and 2004 and details are provided in Table 1 below. This fall in numbers occurred because of a fail in the number of births in the area and live birth figures lead to an expectation that the birth rate will continue at its present low level for the foreseeable future. Pupil numbers are projected to stabilise over the next few years, rather than continue to drop.

If the schools were full, Clothier Street and Lakeside would each have 210 pupils and Little London would have 315 pupils giving a total of 735. In January 2004 the number of pupils on roll at the schools totailed 507. The fail in numbers means that, overall, a third of the places at the schools are not filled and could be considered to be surplus.

2 Surplus Places

Each year, details of the number of pupils on roll at every school and the net capacity (a measure of school places based on the accommodation) are sent to the Secretary of State. Where schools have a large number of surplus places, authorities are expected to bring forward proposals to bring the number of school places more in line with the demand for places. This is to ensure effective deployment of public resources made available to the Council by the Government and the local community. The number of surplus places at Clothier Street, Lakesice and Little London is given in Table 3 below.

These high levels of surplus places have been in existence for some years and this has created a difficult situation for schools to manage. It is now essential that action is taken to address the issue.

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3 Curriculum

Schools with small numbers of pupils face many pressures. Schools receive most of their funding (approx 80%) on the basis of pupil numbers and small schools are not usually viable financially. Schools' greatest expenditure is on staff and as the number of pupils decreases, schools may have to reduce the number of staff and reorganise classes. In some cases, it may be necessary for schools to lose one teacher a year over several years. The classes must also be taught in groups covering 2 or even 3 year groups.

If the number of teachers decreases, it becomes more difficult to ensure that a school is viable educationally. The delivery of a broad and balanced curriculum becomes more difficult as individual teachers become responsible for more curriculum areas and more year groups. In these circumstances it becomes extremely difficult to raise or even maintain standards.

4 Condition and Suitability of School Buildings

The condition and suitability of the existing school buildings is a cause of major concern. Condition expenditure of £1.7 million has been identified as necessary over the next five years at the schools, merely to deal with urgent issues of condition. This sum excludes the provision of replacement accommodation for Clothier Street School (wooden main building and mobile classroom) and Little London School (five separate buildings, oldest built in 1883). Almost no wooden schools remain in use nationally. This £1.7m investment would bring no benefit in terms of addressing the difficulties associated with surplus places or the suitability of the buildings for curriculum delivery in the 21st Century and would not make the buildings accessible by those with physical needs.

What are the Options?

A reduction in the number of school places in the area needs to be effected and could be achieved in a number of ways.

Option 1

Reduce the number of places at Clothier Street, Lakeside and Little London Schools.

It would be necessary to reduce the accommodation at each school, in order to do this. This would not address financial viability issues nor building stock issues and it is likely that at least one school would need to close during the next few years. Curriculum viability would also be a problem.

Option 2

Reduce the number of places in the area by closing either Clothier Street School or Lakeside School and re-building a new school to replace Little London and one of the other two.

Overall, there would be enough places for all pupils but significant investment in the buildings would be required and it would be necessary to vacate the school buildings and disperse pupils elsewhere whilst extensive works were carried out. Also, once a new improved building was in place, replacing two of the schools, the numbers at the third school are likely to reduce even further, hence leading to an unplanned closure.

Option 3

Close Clothier Street, Lakeside and Little London Schools and open a single replacement school.

This would enable a state of the art learning environment up to 21st century standards to be provided and would create a viable school.

These possible options would all address the issue of surplus places in the area but only the last one would result in educational provision that is sustainable in terms of pupil numbers and is viable educationally and financially.

The need for reorganisation was first recognised some years ago when Walsall Council sought funding for the proposed replacement school through PFI (Public Finance Initiative). In all, three PFI bids were made and unfortunately these were not supported by the Government. Education Walsall has taken advantage of an alternative funding source, the Targeted Capital Fund, and the Government, having considered the reasons why reorganisation is necessary, has decided to fund option 3 subject to the completion of the statutory decision-making process.

Retaining the three existing schools is not a realistic option as it would not address surplus places, suitability and viability issues.

If action is not taken now, more far reaching proposals may be required in the future if the viability issues result in fewer pupils attending the schools.

Funding has been made available by the Government for the purpose of building a replacement school in order to address the issues outlined above; it would not be possible to use the funding to remodel/refurbish the existing school buildings. If the option of building a replacement school does not go ahead it is likely that the investment would be reallocated by the Government and that another area would benefit.

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Where would a new school be built?

A number of possible sites have been identified:

- Existing School Sites
 - Clothier Street Primary School
 - Lakeside Primary School
 - Little London Primary School
- Willenhall Memorial Park Extension
- Fibbersley

These are considered in detail in the site options section below. The final decision on the site will be taken by Walsall Council, taking account of consultation.

Site Options

The selection of a site for a new school is a major decision and is governed by a number of constraints. These include Government guidance on the size of school sites, community accessibility and the availability of land.

An appraisal of all possible sites in the area has been undertaken. Although each site has some advantages and disadvantages as a possible site for a new school, some sites are more suitable than others. A map showing the sites is attached.

All three of the existing school sites are available as they are currently used for education. However, whilst each is accessible by the parents of current pupils, none is centrally located and therefore accessible by the wider community. Frequently Asked Questions

What will happen to the children at the existing schools?

All children attending the three schools would be offered a place at the new school. Although the new school would only admit 60 pupils, there will be enough accommodation for all pupils currently attending the three schools. However, parents may, if they wish, seek a place at another school.

What will happen to the staff at the existing schools?

It is expected that the number of children in the new school would be similar to the current number across the three schools and that a similar number of staff would be needed. There is a legal requirement to advertise nationally all headteacher and deputy headteacher posts. It may be that some members of staff decide to seek retirement or a post elsewhere.

What will happen to class sizes?

Some classes in the new school may be smaller than at present, whilst others may be slightly larger. There would be less likelihood of mixed age classes. No infant class would exceed 30 pupils.

What will happen to the schools' Governing Bodies?

A shadow Governing Body would be set up to oversee the planning of the new school, including the appointment of staff. It is expected that the membership would largely be drawn from members of the three schools' governing bodies.


The existing governing bodies would continue to be responsible for their own school until the proposed closure date in August 2006.

Although this school has the largest number of pupils, the site would be less convenient than one of the more centrally located sites for parents whose children attend Clothier Street and Lakeside Primary Schools.

Development on the site would require the closure of the existing building and the dispersal of pupils to other schools in the area for up 2 years.

Option B – Build a new school on the Willenhall Memorial Park Extension Site

The option would involve building in the corner of the site. The provision of new, purpose-built accommodation would address the considerable premises-related issues at the existing schools and provide a suitable learning environment for pupils in the 21st century.

This site gives an opportunity to create a facility in line with Government requirements for the size of school sites. It is envisaged that approximately 16,000 m² of land would be required for the school site. This area would enable the statutory minimum playing field requirement of 5,000 m² to be provided together with approx 1,000 m² of hard surfaced games courts - which would extend the range of sports activities available in the area for use by the community - a large area for informal and social activities and habitat areas. The building would be designed with a view to maximising the playing field area and other grassed areas and this would ensure that community facilities for sports outside the school day were enhanced.

The Willenhall Memorial Park Extension site is approximately 67,000 m² in size. If this site is chosen for the replacement school, no pitches would be lost, indeed, sports facilities available in the area would be enhanced by the provision of a fenced pitch and other games courts on the school site.

This site has the advantage of being centrally located relative to the existing schools and access could be provided from Noose Lane and Park Road. This site would be more accessible for all parents than the other sites.

Whilst this option would use part of the Willenhall Memorial Park Extension, there would be no impact on the pitches and it is planned to provide an additional fenced junior pitch for use by the school and the community.

Approximately 10,000 m² of the existing 67,000 m² of park land would be lost to the community as park land as it would be built upon. There would be an opportunity to enhance environmental education provision in the area by providing a specialist resource base when larger year groups have moved through the school. This facility would be available for use by other schools and community groups.

Option C – Build a new school on the Fibbersley Site

This site is also suitable for the new school, however, it would not be as centrally located for all parents as the Willenhall Memorial Park Extension site.

The Fibbersley site is approximately 20,000 m² in size and is larger than is required to satisfy Government requirements for school sites. This would enable the statutory minimum playing field requirement of 5,000 m² to be provided together with approx 1,000 m² of hard surfaced games courts - which would extend the range of sports activities available in the area for use by the community - a large area for informal and social activities and habitat areas. The building would be designed with a view to maximising the playing field area and other grassed areas. There would be opportunities for community use of sports facilities outside the school day.

Use of this site would result in the loss of a football pitch and bowling green, however, a junior pitch and hard surface games courts would be provided for the school and some replacement facilities would be secured.

How can I make my views known?

Consultation meetings will be held for parents, staff and governors at each of the three schools and details of these are given below.

Frequently Asked Questions

What will happen to the children at the existing schools?

All children attending the three schools would be offered a place at the new school. Although the new school would only admit 60 pupils, there will be enough accommodation for all pupils currently attending the three schools. However, parents may, if they wish, seek a place at another school.

What will happen to the staff at the existing schools?

It is expected that the number of children in the new school would be similar to the current number across the three schools and that a similar number of staff would be needed. There is a legal requirement to advertise nationally all headteacher and deputy headteacher posts. It may be that some members of staff decide to seek retirement or a post elsewhere.

What will happen to class sizes?

Some classes in the new school may be smaller than at present, whilst others may be slightly larger. There would be less likelihood of mixed age classes. No infant class would exceed 30 pupils.

What will happen to the schools' Governing Bodies?

A shadow Governing Body would be set up to oversee the planning of the new school, including the appointment of staff. It is expected that the membership would largely be drawn from members of the three schools' governing bodies.

The existing governing bodies would continue to be responsible for their own school until the proposed closure date in August 2006.


What will happen to the existing school sites?



Lakeside Primary School

Staff Meeting

Tuesday 2 March 2004 at 4.00pm

PRESENT:

Trevor Edinborough, Susan Lupton and Stewart Snow - Education Walsall

Deputy Headteacher and staff

Trevor Edinborough gave a presentation, highlighting Education Walsall's duty to deal with schools with large surplus places and the problems at Lakeside, Clothier Street and Little London Primary schools. He stated that staff views would be reported back to the Cabinet and that notes of the meeting would be taken for this purpose.

Questions, Comments and Education Walsall Responses

Q. Why retain Little London?

Little London has space to accommodate pupils from one of the smaller schools. Some work is needed at the school but it has space.

Q. Falling school rolls as a result of the PFI Bids?

There is a lower birth rate across the borough, more acute in Willenhall South. This is the case nationally as well. There is more impact on the secondary sector than the primary sector regarding pupils moving from schools under threat of closure.

Q. Piece of land by Lakeside Primary under control of Walsall Council, access from Watery Lane

The planners had suggested two available sites named in the report. Consideration will be given to this piece of land as a possible site option.

Q. The Fibbersley site is further away

This site is closer to Clothier Street and Little London Primary Schools.

Q. There are safety issues about the Memorial Park Extension site

There would be separate access to the school from the park.

Q. There are concerns about childrens' safety

The views of people in the area are important and their needs should be taken into account.

Q. There are electricity pylons in the Park

The views of local people will be considered.

Q. There are plans to run the Metro across the park

Any plans for a Metro line will be taken into account in siting the new school.

Q. If the school sites are surplus, what happens to them?

Any decision on surplus land will be made by Walsall Council. The Council has made a commitment that money from the sale of land will be used for education purposes.

Q. What about the condition of Lakeside?

The Condition Survey has identified about £300,000 for urgent work on the school over the next 5 years.

Q. If there is housing, what about extra pupils?

People have an optimistic view of housing developments and the number of pupils generated by new housing. We are not aware of what future use of may be made of the school sites.

Q. The Fibbersley site has a conservation area.

People's views of sites are different. The proposed site at Fibbersley is the old radiator works site.

Q. How will staff be affected at the schools concerned? If Little London remains, will the staff at Lakeside and Clothier Street have to apply for posts?

If schools close there is potential for staff redundancies. At Manor Farm there were very few redundancies at the end of the process. A Personnel Team was attached to the school to support staff. Support can be created for families and pupils in terms of relocation.

Q. If Little London remains open, are the staff safe?

The staff would be safe at the school if it remains open and one of the other smaller schools closes.

Q. The surplus places at Little London could be filled by pupils from Clothier Street or Lakeside

If Little London remains as it is, it will not be affected by any other proposed closure. If there are more children on roll then staffing levels may increase. Ring-fencing could be considered for redundant staff from another school.

Q. If all three schools close and one new school opens, what happens?

Ring-fencing of vacancies would be considered, however no jobs can be guaranteed.

Q. Entry of 60 pupils per year group. There are some year groups above 60, what happens with these extra pupils?

As part of the bid, additional accommodation has been secured for the extra numbers. When they move out of the school, the accommodation can be used for other purposes. These are issues for the School Management Team. The temporary Governing Body and Management Team will construct the staff structure for the new school.

Q. Will there be consideration for a nursery class at the new school? This had not been referred to in the document.

There will be a 52 place nursery, with 26 morning and 26 afternoon places.

Q. There are more children in nursery at Lakeside at the moment.

There are more nursery places available than are being taken up, due to falling births. Need a strategy for Children's Centres, SureStart and Neighbourhood Nurseries to be included in any new development. Walsall Council are still firming up their strategy on Children's Centres. A decision on this is awaited.

Q. Lakeside has been admitting pupils who have moved from Little London

We have looked at the PLASC data for January 2004. It is not expected that there will be huge changes in numbers between now and April.

Q. Whatever proposal is agreed, everyone should be treated fairly.

People's view of fair will be different.

Q. Are there any plans to consult pupils?

Not at this point in the process, but this idea could be considered.

Q. If option 2 or 3 were considered, will the Headteacher be appointed before other staff?

The temporary Governing Body would appoint a new Headteacher, who would then be involved in staff appointments at the school.

Trevor Edinborough closed the meeting by thanking all staff for their attendance and stating that he would be happy to talk to staff again if necessary within the available timescale.

Governing Body and Deputy Headteacher

Trevor Edinborough gave a presentation, highlighting Education Walsall's duty to deal with schools with large surplus places and the problems at Lakeside, Clothier Street and Little London Primary schools. He stated that Governors' views would be reported back to the Cabinet and that notes of the meeting would be taken for this purpose.

Questions, Comments and Education Walsall Responses

Q. With regard to the Memorial Park extension, what will be the enhanced sports facilities?

As part of the development an additional pitch and hard area would be created for the school. These would be fenced off for school use. The facilities could be used by the community outside school hours.

Q. There is transport firm, Aspray which is situated opposite the proposed Fibbersley site. There are safety issues for parents and pupils. Aspray are looking to expand on their present site.

Issues regarding safety and access will be considered as part of the consultation process.

Q. The suggestion of Lakeside is not just to save Lakeside but as a potential site option for the new school. This option may be difficult to sell to parents from Little London and Clothier Street.

Consideration will be given to the land by lakeside as a possible site option.

Q. Pupil numbers are rising at Lakeside.

In overall terms, the numbers wanting places in the area are falling.

Q. The school site would be nearer to Lakeside, away from central Willenhall. Housing developments are being built on the edges not in the centre.

Dot maps are available highlighting where pupils are coming from.

Q. Are the figures available for the number of pupils attending schools outside the borough.

The dot maps showing the spread of pupil addresses are available. Other maps could be produced to show pupils attending other schools.

Q. This was all being said 2 ½ years ago. In the best interests of pupils and schools in the area the status quo should be maintained. When previous proposals were suggested the Governors supported them. The situation needs to be well managed. The school had been put in a difficult position previously, it has come out of special measures and has just had a brilliant OFSTED inspection. There needs to be an exit strategy for staff and pupils, all three schools are concerned about the future.

The review is not focused on standards and performance, it is being driven by falling pupil numbers in the area. The status quo is not an option, we need to move forward and resolve the issues for the schools in the area.

Q. Following the report to cabinet in May 2003, officers were due to meet with schools regarding the failed PFI bid. Governors were concerned at the lack of discussion. They thought there were other options to be considered but there weren't.

Apologies for this but it was felt that it was not useful to meet as there were no other options to be considered.

Q. Is the funding dependent upon new build?

The DfES have agreed the bid submitted by the Education Walsall to remove surplus places in the area. It depends on what decision is reached as to whether we draw the money down. The funding cannot be used for the refurbishment of existing buildings. We cannot leave things as they are now. We would be willing to hold extra drop-in sessions to gain the widest consultation possible.

Q. What will be the Exit Strategy.

We will build a team around the pupils and staff in the same way as happened at Manor Farm. Staff would be encouraged to be involved in the design of the new building. A temporary Governing Body will be established and a new Headteacher appointed. We want to retain good staff in Walsall. With regard to pupil numbers, this is more difficult. We will make it a process, a managed strategy. A positive culture for pupils.

Q. Is there Match funding from Walsall Council?

The Council have agreed to find the additional funding needed. It will be a decision for the Council to declare any of the school sites surplus. The Cabinet has made a commitment to allocate money from the sale of any surplus school sites for educational purposes.

Q. Will a child in the nursery at Lakeside be guaranteed a place at the new school?

The planned number of places in the new school would guarantee a place. There may be bulges in some year groups that have been factored into the numbers. The new school will have the appropriate number of places needed.

Q. How are the number of surplus places determined?

There is a DfES formula which is capacity driven, which measures capacity within schools.

Q. If Lakeside is allowed to carry on and following a good OFSTED Inspection the numbers on the roll will rise.

There still remains the problem of falling pupil numbers within the area.

Q. A prospective parent at Little London was not aware of these proposals and the consultation exercise.

We have focused on existing parents of children in school. Other parents and members of the community can be involved in these meetings. Surgeries and drop-in sessions can also be arranged.

Q. What size will the new school be?

The new school will be a two-form entry school (60 places per year group). We have secured the funding for this. There would be additional accommodation for the bulges in some year groups. This space would be used for other purposes at a later date. We would like to see this as an extended school. The new school will cater for existing pupils.

Q. What about falling pupil numbers.

The declining birth rate will flatten out the pupil numbers in the area.

The Chair of Governors closed the meeting and thanked the Education Walsall staff for the presentation.

Elaine Simpson opened the meeting and introduced the staff present. She stated that parental views would be reported back to the Cabinet and that notes of the meeting would be taken for this purpose.

Trevor Edinborough gave a presentation, highlighting Education Walsall's duty to deal with schools with large surplus places and the problems at Lakeside, Clothier Street and Little London Primary schools.

Questions, Comments and Education Walsall Responses

Q. Little London is in a conservation area, what is meant by this?

Part of the school building is in a conservation area due to the historic value of the clock.

Q. There is a lack of playing fields. It had been Council policy to sell off playing fields. If the park is used as a site will the playing fields be sold off?

There is no policy of selling off playing fields. Sports England will look very closely at any changes to sports fields, as a result it is very difficult to sell off land. We would need sufficient playing fields for the pupils at the new school.

Q. Will residents be involved in the consultation process?

There is a need to focus on schools and parents in the first instance. We would be happy to hold meetings with the wider community at a later date.

Q. The consultation document and response form were unclear. The wording seemed to imply that the school was closing and that a new site was being chosen.

Elaine Simpson apologised if parents thought the documents were unclear. Responses would be sent back via the schools, a post box would be set up for this purpose in each school.

Q. People feel angry, they feel that the decision has already been taken. There seems to be more emphasis on option 3.

This is not the case, no decision has been made. No emphasis has been put on any option

Q. Parents prefer smaller schools

Lakeside is built for 30 pupils in each year group, 17 pupils per year group is not viable. Governors have difficulties in staffing the school because of the low numbers.

Q. The small classes do work at the school and the school's budget is sound. The school is secure.

This is not the case, the budget is not sound, discussions regarding the future of the school have happened before, the school can't be secure. We have to reduce large surplus numbers, the DfES are saying this.

Q. Are you aware of the new housing developments on Aston Road and School Street.

The potential numbers have been looked at, they will not fill either Lakeside or the other schools.

Q. Could the funding for the new school be used to improve the existing school buildings?

Neither Little London or other school sites are large enough for a new 2 FE school.

Q. Is the funding only for a new school?

Yes, it may be decided not to draw down the money, this could be an outcome

Q. Could the money be used to refurbish the current schools?

The money cannot be used for any other purpose other than new build

Q. If a new school is built on a new site, who has ownership of the buildings and site?

The building and site will be owned by Walsall Council not Serco

Q. There have been some misconceptions about the sites.

The sites have been suggested by Walsall Planners not Serco. The sites have been considered previously under the PFI bids

Q. There are too many children for a two-form entry school.

The pupil numbers are stabilising down to a two-form entry school. There will be bulges in some year groups that can be accommodated.

Q. Will pupils be involved in the design of the new school. Could they be asked what they would like to see?

This is a good idea, there would be involvement from the community as well.

Q. House values will be affected

If a new school is built then there will be a separate process and planning issues will have to be looked at.

Q. What will happen if the land is sold off?

The disposal of land will be a Council decision. The Cabinet has said that any money from the sale of land will go to education use in Willenhall South.

Q. How will people get to know about the consultation process?

Information has been made available in libraries. Needed to get to parents in schools first. Meetings with parents were seen as first priority. Further consultation meetings will take place if needed.

Q. Will we see Cabinet report?

Cabinet will see the feedback from the parents. The Cabinet report will be sent to schools for distribution to parents

Q. There is a feeling that the decision has already been made.

Parental views will be taken into account before any decision is made.

Q. Environmental pollution from traffic at Fibbersley. The response form seems to indicate that a decision has been made.

Apologies for this impression. This is not the case. The professional view is to close the schools and open a new school. There is no preference regarding the site.

Q. What about St Giles and Albion Road/Elm Street?

The bid for the amalgamation of Albion Road/Elm Street failed.

Q. The money for building work at the school has been quoted at £350,000, what will this be spent on?

The work and costs have been identified through the Condition Survey

Q. The land behind Lakeside should be considered as a site

This will be considered as a possible site option. We will check with planners regarding its availability.

Q. If a new school is built, how far into the future do you estimate pupil numbers?

We can forecast pupil numbers for the next few years based on births and other data.

Q. Does the birth rate match our figures?

Yes, it does.

Q. Could you build upwards at the school?

Yes, but still need enough playing fields for the school. These are well regulated.

Q. What will be the size of the new school?

The school will be built as a two-form entry school, 420 full-time children on the roll. There is the possibility of the school attracting pupils from elsewhere.

Q. What is the timetable for building the new school?

The plan is for the new school to open in 2006. Before this a temporary Governing Body will be set up in order to deal with matters relating to the new school including the appointment of the new Headteacher and other staff.

Q. What is the position for staff?

Staffing levels are dependent upon pupil numbers. The main posts at risk are those of the Headteacher and Deputy Headteacher at each school.

Q. Parents are happy with the school, pupils are happy to stay here rather than move to a new bigger school with facilities.

It is our view that it is better to plan for the future rather than have the closure of the school at a later date.

Q. The Headteacher will have the staff he or she wants

This is not permitted in a transitional school

Q. Schools will lose children from the Willenhall area based on these proposals. This has happened before.

This situation could happen but children could be drawn back into a new school. The situation cannot remain as it is.

Q. A state of the art school sounds very exciting. If the new school is built on the park the last piece of green land between housing and industry will be lost.

These views will be included in the Cabinet report.

Q. There are only two potential sites not five as stated in the consultation document.

There are only two viable sites. The existing school sites are too small. The Lakeside land would be considered as a third option.

Q. Who has the final decision on the new school?

The decisions will be made by the School Organisation Committee on the new school. The decision on the site will be made by Walsall Council and through the planning process.

Trevor Edinborough gave a presentation, highlighting Education Walsall's duty to deal with schools with large surplus places and the problems at Lakeside, Clothier Street and Little London Primary schools. He stated that staff views would be reported back to the Cabinet and that notes of the meeting would be taken for this purpose.

Questions, Comments and Education Walsall Responses

Q - Why are the nursery numbers not included in the figures?

They are not required for PLASC or included in the measurement of school capacities.

Q – What about housing developments in the area?

All available information has been taken into account in looking at projected numbers.

Q - The report refers to pupil numbers stabilizing.

The birth rate trend is stabilizing at lower levels. There will be a further slight decline in numbers.

Q - Lakeside was originally built as a 3 FE school?

Lakeside is 1 FE and is large enough for 30 per class with seven class bases.

Q - Is the Clothier Street site large enough for a 2 FE school?

The presentation site is not large enough for a 2 FE school under current DfES regulations.

Q - There are too many children for a 2 FE school

Overall the numbers can be accommodated in a 2 FE school. There will be additional accommodation for the year groups with bulges. This accommodation can be used for other purposes at a later date.

UX

Sketch maps are available for the proposed Fibbersley and Memorial Park Extension sites, highlighting how a new school might look. Both sites are physically large enough for a new school and playing fields.

Q - Money in bank - enough for one 2 FE school.

Funding is available for one 2 FE school. This is what was bid for, there is no proposal for two 1 FE schools. The funding is only available for new build not refurbishment of existing buildings. We don't have to draw down the funding, there are a range of other options that can be considered. This is an opportunity to provide a 21st Century learning environment for pupils in the area.

Q - Will the Cabinet report be made available?

The Cabinet report is a public document, it will enter the public domain seven days before the Cabinet meeting. Copies of the report will be sent to schools before the meeting.

Q – How does the School Organisation Committee work?

The membership and role of the School Organisation Committee were explained to the meeting.

Q - Will parents' views be taken into account?

Views will be included in the body of the Cabinet report.

Q – Clothier Street has a smaller surplus in pupil numbers, it is being sucked into the problems of the other schools.

The schools in total have to be looked at in the area, schools can't be looked at in isolation.

Q – Are there falling pupil numbers elsewhere?

There are falling numbers in other schools. Dot maps are available to show the spread of pupils in the area. Reference was made to the three previous PFI bids for the Willenhall South area.

Q - Are there schools elsewhere with falling numbers?

This area is being looked at because of the large overall surplus. Other areas of the Borough will be looked at in the future.

Q - Will all children be offered places in the new school?

The existing pupils on roll will have a right to places in the new school. There is sufficient accommodation built into the plans for the new school to cater for the numbers.

Q – Staff live in the community, they are committed to the school and the community. Staff are very upset at the press coverage and the comments regarding the quality of education at the school.

Press coverage can and does differ from what was said. The review is not about quality or performance, we want to find best solution to resolve the problem.

Q – Nursery provision at the new school.

There will be nursery provision at the new school.

Q - How will the Governing Body be set up?

A temporary Governing Body will be established for the new school. The Governing Bodies of the existing schools will carry on until the schools close. The temporary Governing Body will work on setting up the new school and the staffing structure. We are mindful of bringing the community together. Pupils still deserve the best education they can get until the schools close.

Q – It is difficult for staff to be motivated if they think they maybe out of a job in the future.

We accept that these proposals will have an impact on morale. We will do everything to help staff through the process. Teams will be working with staff and pupils if needed.

Q – With regard to Lakeside, many things haven't happened as had been thought.

The situation has changed over time. Numbers are expected to decline, in the future, predictions are difficult built on current knowledge. We do not want to see an unplanned school closure.

We are very willing to come back again and speak to staff.

Governing Body and Headteacher

Trevor Edinborough gave a presentation, highlighting Education Walsall's duty to deal with schools with large surplus places and the problems at Lakeside, Clothier Street and Little London Primary schools. He stated that governors' views would be reported back to the Cabinet and that notes of the meeting would be taken for this purpose.

Questions, Comments and Education Walsall Responses

Q. Do we know how many pupils go outside borough.

We have figures of children going out and coming into Walsall. We are a net importer of children. We also have maps showing where children live in the Willenhall South area.

Q. Lakeside was under threat of closure a while ago. Children went to schools outside area.

Numbers have declined in area due to the falling birth rate in area and other reasons.

Q. A proposal is to build a 2 FE school, pupil numbers are too big for 2 FE.

One of the proposals is to build a new 2 FE school. Bulges in some year groups will be accommodated in the new school. This space can be used for other community purposes.

Q. Are the numbers registered for nursery for next few years available?

The demographic trends indicate that a 2 FE school will be large enough. There is flexibility built into the plans for the new school.

Q. I am worried as governor and parent about class sizes with numbers increasing from 30 to 35 in class.

These are school management and budget issues. There will be sufficient classrooms to provide normal class sizes in school. There will not be the situation of two classes for 85 children.

Q. There is a lot of house building in area on the old St Thomas More site and at Temple Bar. Is there the possibility of the school sites being used for housing developments?

Any decision on the school sites will be made by Walsall Council.

Q. It is not fair to ask young children to travel further to school. Many of the children in the area walk to school on their own. If the school moves it may be too far for parents to get children to school.

Distances will vary for individual pupils. Some live nearer to the proposed sites than the school they currently attend.

Q. Is the funding PFI?

No, the funding is match funded, DfES 80%, 20% from Walsall Council.

Q. We do not feel that this is proper consultation, we feel that people have made up their mind about option 3.

No decisions have been taken. The Cabinet will decide on what to do after the consultation process.

Q. It is felt that there are only 2 options for sites not 5.

The 3 school sites and the other sites have been evaluated. The school sites have been considered but they do not match current DfES requirements for site size.

Q. Do we want our children to breathe in fumes etc from Aspray's? Do we want to disrupt staff etc.

The sites have been suggested by Walsall planners.

Q. What about access to sites?

Sketch plans have been drawn up of the two sites to show how the new school might look.

Q. If the Fibbersley site was being considered, why have Walsall Council allowed Aspray to extend their premises? This is no good for children, with lorry fumes and added road danger. There will be an affect on childrens' health with the Fibbersley site, it cannot be an option because of this. Children can't be expected to put up with this. There will be an extra 250 staff on the Aspray site.

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The sites have been suggested by Walsall planners.

Q. There are brown field sites in Willenhall, unused factories and industrial land. There are problems with both sites suggested in the consultation document.

We are not sure if these sites are owned by the Council. We need to find a site that is accessible to all parents in area. Planners have identified possible sites in area.

Q. What would be the situation with option 2?

We would retain Little London and close one of the smaller schools. All present pupils could be accommodated in the two schools.

Q. If this is the case, would Clothier Street stay as it is? Why close Clothier Street as it has lowest surplus?

We would need to look at where children are to determine which school should close.

Q. Why retain Little London with no playing fields, why should the other schools close? Is Little London being kept because of its size rather than being the most preferred?

Little London has the space for the largest number of pupils. We would have to move lot of pupils of the school closed. The funding can only be drawn down for new build, not for any other reason.

Q. What criteria will be used to close Lakeside or Clothier Street?

Further consultation will be undertaken to decide which school should close. The bid process was very competitive and nationally, relatively few bids were awarded funding; our bid was scored against surplus place removal. We were not successful in our bid for Albion Road/Elm Street.

Q. Is there match funding for the site?

Walsall Council will provide funding for capital build. The land doesn't count as part of the match funding. The Council funding will come from existing DfES funding streams available to the Council.

Elaine Simpson opened the meeting and introduced the staff present. She stated that parental views would be reported back to the Cabinet and that notes of the meeting would be taken for this purpose.

Trevor Edinborough gave a presentation, highlighting Education Walsall's duty to deal with schools with large surplus places and the problems at Lakeside, Clothier Street and Little London Primary schools.

Questions, Comments and Education Walsall Responses

Q. Is the £1.7m for building work extra to school budgets?

This is extra money that comes to Walsall for building work and is outside the budgets allocated to schools.

Q. How much would new school cost?

The cost would be in the region of £3m.

Q. If you reduce accommodation at schools to reduce building surplus can you take out old parts such as wooden buildings at Clothier Street and the old Little London building?

It is not that easy to take out parts of buildings. The upside is that we retain schools, the downside is that there is still a cost for work needed on the schools. Funding for refurbishment would have to be found from local money, the funding for new build is government grant.

None of three school sites are suitable for a 2 FE school under current DfES regulations. The land at Lakeside raised at the meeting last night has been looked at. The land is unsuitable because of ground conditions: it is on a lower level than the school and is prone to flooding.

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Q. Lakeside shouldn't be considered as an option, the school has not succeeded with pupil numbers.

People will bring their own value judgements about schools/sites.

Q. The Fibbersley site is in Wednesfield, why build school there for Wolverhampton pupils?

The Fibbersley site is in the Walsall borough.

Q. The pupil numbers at Clothier Street are not falling the same as the other schools.

We need to look at all schools in the area, can't just look at individual schools.

Q. You are looking at 2 FE school with extra in some year groups. A 2 FE school will not big enough, we do not have figures for nursery numbers.

Birth dates have been looked at in forecasts and the number that will become pupils in schools. 60 will be enough for the new school, there will be extra room for children.

Q. It is unacceptable for children to go from small school to larger school of nearly 3 FE. It will be too big a change for the children.

Q. Parents want a new school for the Clothier Street children. Why can't a new school be built at Clothier Street.

The site at Clothier Street is not big enough for a new school. The building will take about two years to complete.

Q. Why have sites by busy roads (Aspray)? There are safety issues of a site by a busy transport yard. The Metro is planned to run by both sites.

We would have to look at traffic calming measures.

Q. We can't see what is wrong with Clothier Street school. It is not physically falling down.

We estimate that £560,000 needs to be spent over the next 5 years for urgent work at Clothier Street.
