1. Summary of report

This report is to inform Cabinet of the formal consultation undertaken by Pool Hayes Arts and Community School to progress their move from community to Foundation status and to seek Cabinet's approval for the transfer of assets and staff to the Foundation on 1 April 2009.

2. Recommendations

2.1 That Cabinet agree the transfer of assets and staff to the Foundation at Pool Hayes Arts and Community School on 1 April 2009.

3. Background information

3.1 Previous report

On 4 February 2009, Cabinet considered a report about Building Schools for the Future that contained information about the strengthening of the governance of some of Walsall's mainstream secondary schools.

In this report, Cabinet was informed that Pool Hayes Arts and Community School were considering Foundation status. The report outlined the major differences between Foundation and community schools, these being:

- Foundations managing their own assets including lands and buildings;
- Foundations employing their own staff; and
- Foundations setting their own admission arrangements within the Schools Admission Code of Practice.

3.2 Informal consultation

On 3 November, the school informed the authority that they had started informal consultation on becoming a foundation school. A copy of this letter is attached (**Appendix 1**).

3.3 Formal consultation

In January, the school started formal consultation on the change of status. A copy of the consultation document is attached (**Appendix 2**).

4. Resource considerations

4.1 Financial:

Pool Hayes Arts and Community School will continue to be maintained by Walsall Council and will therefore continue to receive its funding directly from Walsall Council, using the locally agreed school funding formulae.

4.2 Legal:

It is inevitable that almost every issue that pertains to a schools change of status has the potential to have legal ramifications, should there be a failure to implement the changes correctly. Therefore a change in status must be effected in accordance with The Education (Change of Category of Maintained Schools) (Amendment) (England) Regulations 2006 and any other enabling regulations together with the published guidance.

Other pertinent considerations such as finance and staffing are already addressed in this report. Therefore focussing on the transfer of assets, when a school changes to Foundation status, any land held or used by the Local Authority for the purpose of that school is automatically transferred to the Governing Body on the implementation date (1st April 2009) without any payment or compensation to the Local Authority. The land is held 'on trust' for the purposes of the school. The governing body become responsible for ensuring adequate insurance cover is in place.

Land can be excluded from the transfer to the governing body by prior written agreement during the implementation period. For example, where a site is shared between a school and a community facility such as a library or sports centre intended for wider use, the school and LA may agree that freehold of that facility should remain with the LA. Any rights the school has held to use land or facilities owned by another party, such as a swimming pool or community sports hall, continue to apply after the change of category. If a Foundation school subsequently closes, the land and buildings (or their value) revert back to the Council.

If the Foundation wishes to consider disposal or change the use of a playing field they would require the consent of the Secretary of State.

Any Walsall Building Schools for the Future proposal for Pool Hayes that involved a site move would require negotiations over a land swap with the Foundation.

Legal implications relating to staff is set out in paragraphs 4.3 below.

4.3 **Staffing**:

The staff in Community Schools, such as Pool Hayes Arts and Community School, are employed by the Local Authority, although many of the responsibilities for staffing matters are delegated to the governing body. In a foundation school the staff are employed by the governing body, who must take on additional responsibilities, e.g. setting conditions of service, issuing contracts of employment, ensuring staff fitness to teach / work with children. The new governing body will need to make arrangements to fulfil these obligations. Like a Voluntary Aided school, the Local Authority remains the compensating authority.

It will be noted that the Governing Body of the school will technically be the employer of any staff, but the LA will retain legal responsibility for any costs arising from any employment dispute with the school.

However, this financial/legal safety net that the LA provides will not apply where there is a good reason (s37 (5) Education Act 2002), i.e. for example:

- (a) there is a failure to follow advice from the LA/ agents;
- (b) acting illegally;
- (c) acting in breach of procedures;
- (d) acting improperly/ unreasonably or otherwise perversely, etc. (This is not an exhaustive list).

It is also worthy of note that despite the above, it is ultimately the LA that may have to intervene to assist the school in the event it has insufficient resources to satisfy any legal award made by a Court/ Tribunal arising from an employment dispute. Of course any assistance could be subject to conditions.

As a consequence of the change of status there will be a need for the employment of staff at the school to transfer to the Governing Body on 1 April 2009. Paragraphs 49 to 55 of Schedule 3 to The School Organisation (Prescribed Alterations to Maintained Schools) (England) Regulations 2007 provide for all rights, powers, duties and liabilities to transfer from the LA to the governing body. The effect of these provisions is to protect an individual's employment rights on transfer. Any agreements entered into by the LA or governing body before this date, in respect of an individual's terms and contract of employment must therefore be honoured by the new employer. Equally, if any action is being taken by an employee against the former employer in respect of a liability, duty etc of that employer before a school changes category, the liability transfers to the new employer.

These provisions in effect mirror TUPE transfer obligations when transferring staff from one organisation to another, so it must be sensible best practise to follow the same approach as taken on staff transfers under a TUPE situation.

The position of Local Authority employed catering staff working on the school site will be unaffected by the change of status, but will be subject to any future decisions by the governing body in relation to school meals provision.

5. Citizen impact

The Local Community Association, that has charitable status, uses the school building extensively.

Under the Foundation proposals, the Community Association will continue to have full access to the school premises and are to be included in the Trust arrangements as one of the partners in the proposed Trust.

The Headteacher of Pool Hayes is one of the Community Association Directors.

6. Community safety

None directly as a result of this report.

7. Environmental impact

None directly as a result of this report.

8. Performance and risk management issues

8.1 **Risk**:

There are no risks to the Council resulting from this report.

8.2 **Performance management**:

Standards at the school remain the responsibility of the school supported by Walsall Council.

9. Equality implications

In a Foundation school, the school must continue to be part of the authorities' coordinated admissions arrangements and are bound by the Government's Code of Practice on School Admissions, providing equality of access to all pupils.

The proposed alteration is to Change School Category from Community to Foundation from 01 April 2009.

The governing body also views this as the first step towards Pool Hayes Arts and Community School becoming a Trust School which will also be the subject of formal consultation in due course.

The school and governing body are committed to exercising this autonomy within the framework of fair funding and fair admissions. The school's relationship and collaborative working with feeder primary schools and other partnerships will continue in the same way but may additionally be strengthened further by the acquisition of Trust Status. Governors believe that they have the experience and expertise to use the additional autonomies of Foundation status to continue the development of the school and raise standards further. Governors believe that the school will be able to work more closely and develop better links with the local community and to use the additional freedoms to provide excellence for young people and staff. It is further envisaged that essential material improvements to the fabric of the school will be more readily attainable.

There is an expectation from government that schools will take a lead in delivering the Every Child Matters agenda, be instrumental in promoting Social Cohesion and facilitating the vision of Extended Schools. The additional freedoms open to Pool Hayes Arts and Community School as a foundation school and the school's commitment to co-operation with other agencies will, governors believe, be an important component in the school's development of such initiatives. The fundamental reason for this change, and its guiding principal, is to improve the quality of education we are able to provide for our pupils in our desire to raise standards.

- (b) a statement that the school will-
 - (i) have a foundation established otherwise than under SSFA 1998; or
 - (ii) belong to a group of schools for which a foundation body acts; or
