Subject: The School Funding Settlement 2011-12

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Purpose of the report: To inform Schools Forum of the national School Funding

Settlement for 2011-12 and highlight the local impact for

Walsall schools.

Recommendation: To note and comment on the local authority's

recommendations in respect of the proposed formula changes including those required to consolidate the former Standards

Fund Grants within the Dedicated School Grant.

1. Introduction

- 1.1 The government announced the 2011-12 School Funding Settlement on 14 December 2010, the full details of which can be accessed at http://www.education.gov.uk/schools/adminandfinance/financialmanagement/schoolsre venuefunding/settlement2012pupilpremium
- **1.2** This report will provide the Schools Forum with a summary of the changes introduced through the settlement and the impact of those changes at a local level.
- 1.3 The two major changes introduced from 1 April 2011 are the introduction of the Pupil Premium as a separate specific grant, and the consolidation of eleven current Standards Fund Grants into the main school grant, the Dedicated Schools Grant (DSG). The School Forum Formula Working Group met on 11 January 2011 to go through the new funding system in detail. A further meeting will be held on the 18 January, prior to the meeting of the Schools Forum, to review the impact of the sub group's discussions and the further work undertaken by officers.
- **1.4** The final formula changes, agreed in consultation with the Forum, will be recommended to Cabinet for formal approval on 9 February 2011.

2. The Pupil Premium

- 2.1 The Pupil Premium will be introduced from April 2011, paid to local authorities via a specific grant based on January 2011 census figures for deprived pupils in Reception through to Year 11. In the 2011-12 financial year, the premium will be paid to each pupil known to be eligible for Free School Meals (FSM) as at 20 January 2011. From 2012-2013 onwards the government are considering an extension of the coverage to pupils who have previously been known to be eligible for FSM.
- 2.2 The pupil premium has been set at £430 per deprived child in maintained schools and academies in the first year.
- **2.3** The premium will also be paid to deprived pupils in non-mainstream settings who are publicly funded:
 - Special Schools
 - Non-maintained Special Schools
 - Independent Schools
 - Not in School
 - Hospital Schools
 - Pupil Referral Units
 - 14-15 Year Olds in Further Education Colleges
- 2.4 Children who have been looked after for more than six months will also attract the pupil premium from 2011-12.

- **2.5** Finally a reduced premium of £200 per pupil will be introduced for children whose parents are in the armed forces.
- 2.6 The pupil premium will be phased in over a four year period. A sum of £625m has been earmarked nationally for the premium in April 2011, but this is set to rise to £2.5bn by April 2015.
- 2.7 Attached at Appendix 1 is an exemplar pupil premium calculation for maintained Walsall schools based upon the FSM data recorded in the October 2010 census. This exemplar calculation excludes all premium allocations for looked after or service children, and the amounts for pupils in non-mainstream settings.
- 2.8 The pupil premium will be paid as additional money over and above the funding that will be received through the Dedicated Schools Grant which will include former Standards Fund Grants.
- 2.9 The pupil premium is not ring fenced at school level, however, schools will be accountable for how they use the premium in a number of ways
 - New measures will be introduced in the performance tables that will capture the achievement of those pupils covered by the pupil premium
 - Schools will be required to publish online how they have used the premium to
 ensure that parents and others are made fully aware of the progress and
 attainment of pupils covered by the premium

3. The Dedicated Schools Grant (DSG) 2011-12

- 3.1 The current methodology for allocating the DSG to local authorities, will continue for a further year in 2011-12, in order to avoid any undue turbulence at a time when the pupil premium is being introduced. For Walsall this means that the per pupil Guaranteed Funding Unit (GFU) will continue in 2011-12 at £4,371.33 which is the same cash sum as received for 2010-11.
- 3.2 The significant change to the DSG is the inclusion of a number of Standards Fund Grants, which will in future become part of every schools mainstream budget and used to meet the priorities of each school, whatever those are, as all grant criteria and conditions will cease to exist once the money is included within the delegated budget share. The transfer of these grants into the DSG equates to a further £759.94 per pupil being added to the core funding of £4,371.33 per pupil, to give a total GFU of £5,131.27 for 2011-12.
- 3.3 The local authority, in consultation with the Schools Forum, must determine how to distribute the former Standards Fund Grants, using criteria permitted within the School Finance Regulations.

3.4 The table below details the build up of the per pupil GFU for 2011-12

- The local authority met with the Schools Forum Formula Sub Group on the 11 January 2011 to consider the most appropriate methods of delegation of the former Standards Fund Grants through the local funding formulae in 2011-12.
- The School Funding Settlement 2011-12 is a one year settlement only. The White Paper 'The Importance of Teaching' set out in general terms, plans for the future funding system. The government intend to work with partners in 2011 to develop a spring consultation document covering the merits of a clear, transparent and fair national funding system based upon the needs of pupils. The consultation will include future arrangements for funding early years provision, SEN and academies.
- 3.7 The Minimum Funding Guarantee (MFG) will continue in 2011-12 to ensure that no school has a cut in its budget of more than 1.5% per pupil before any pupil premium

is added. The Schools Forum is able to set a higher guarantee if this affordable within the Individual Schools Budget (ISB). However, it is recommended that the Walsall MFG be set at the DfE guide line of 98.5% to allow for some minor realignment within the allocation of transferred grants.

- 3.8 The School Finance Regulations will be amended to allow local authorities (LAs) to mainstream the specific grants consolidated within the DSG as follows:
 - to allow LAs to use a formula factor which replicates part or all of the previous level of mainstreamed grants, either as cash amounts or using the grant methodology;
 - ensure that levels of mainstreamed grants are taken into account when applying the MFG;
 - allow the total of the mainstreamed grant allocations in 2010-11 to be added to the 2010-11 Schools Budget for each LA for the purpose of calculating the central expenditure; and
 - enable LAs to retain funding centrally within the DSG which supports schools in narrowing achievement gaps for under-performing ethnic groups and to meet the specific needs of the bi-lingual learners.
- 3.9 The DSG will be paid as a ring-fenced grant and will be subject to formal grant conditions, with a requirement to use the grant in support of the Schools Budget. There will be a provision for the Secretary of State to recover grant.
- 3.10 The recoupment methodology for adjusting DSG allocations for converting academies with predecessor schools will continue in 2011-12. New convertor academies will receive their delegated budget share, plus a proportion of the relevant sums included within the central expenditure limit of the DSG. The sum will then reduce the amount of DSG paid to the local authority.

4. Local Formula Implications

- 4.1 The Schools Forum Formula Sub Group met on the 11 January 2011 to consider in detail the implication of mainstreaming the grants detailed in Table 1, paragraph 3.4, of the report. Each grant was considered in detail and suggestions made on allocation methods. Officers agreed to consolidate this work in order that the sub group could reconvene on 18 January to review the overall impact of the funding changes.
- 4.2 Following this initial meeting of the Working Group, clarification was sought from the Department of Education (DfE) regarding the operation of the Minimum Funding Guarantee (MFG) in 2011-12. It has been confirmed by the Department that the Schools Forum power to make exceptions to the MFG where less than 50% pupils are affected will be removed, with effect from 1 April 2011. However, further guidance was issued on the 14 January 2011 by the DfE which gave specific information regarding the technical operation of the MFG in 2011-12.

- **4.3** A Schools Forum will have the power to approve some exception to the MFG as detailed below.
 - A variation to the coverage of MFG as per exceptions included in the regulations which has been previously approved by the Schools Forum or Secretary of State with no specified time limit;
 - A variation applied to implement the early years single funding formula only;
 - A higher level of MFG than -1.5%; and
 - A variation relating only to the diploma grant which has been paid to schools based on actual learner numbers, and the targeted elements of primary and secondary National Strategies grant, which were given to schools on a one year basis.
- Table 2 below summarises the proposed distribution methodology for each grant within the DSG and compares this to the existing methodology.

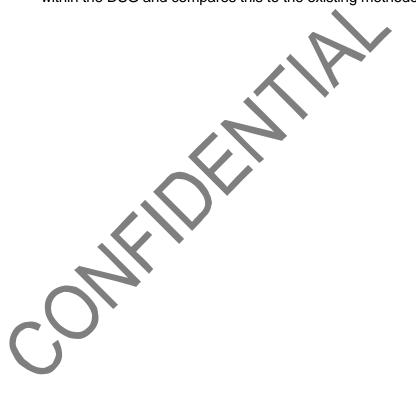

School Development Grant

- This grant comprises a number of former individual grants many of which were distributed using Free School Meals as a measure of deprivation. There have been controls in place to prevent local authorities from eroding the deprivation elements within the total grant. In addition the former Excellence Cluster, Behaviour Improvement Partnership and Advanced Skills Teacher funding is included within this consolidated grant, which makes the per pupil funding across the schools very varied.
- The original grant allocations have been protected at a per pupil level in every school and inflated in line with the Minimum Funding Guarantee.
- This grant provides 30% of the grant funding to be transferred to the DSG.
 Any redistribution of the funding through an equalisation process is not possible because of the potential cost of the Minimum Funding Guarantee which will be set at the DfE base line of 98.5%.
- The funding for ASTs is included within DSG allocations. The AST programme is well established and effective in Walsall and it is recommended that this continues under the current arrangements.
- A new lump sum factor will be created to pay AST funding schools which can be adjusted should an AST leave Walsall or move to another school.
- A small sum of £10,000 will be retained within Central Expenditure Limit to manage the AST scheme.
- The remaining SDG grant will be allocated to schools using 2010-11 cash values.
- This proposed methodology is based upon the current grant methodology and is permitted within the new financial regulations

 There will be no financial turbulence using this methodology as it replicates the existing grant distribution methodology.

4.4 Appendix 2 of the report summarises the impact of the proposed grant funding changes. However, there may be further changes to the methodologies applied following the discussions at the next School Forum Funding Sub Group. Verbal feedback from this meeting will be provided at the Forum meeting.

5. Other Formula Changes

- 5.1 The government has expressed a wish to limit financial turbulence for schools in 2011-12. A 98.5% Minimum Funding Guarantee will allow some limited movement to take place, but any major formula changes will need to be approved by the Secretary of State.
- 5.2 It would not be sensible to create significant financial turbulence for a one year period in the mainstream funding formula. The government may introduce further school level funding changes in April 2012, making it difficult for schools to plan ahead or operate efficiently.
- 5.3 One existing formula element that the School Forum has aked the local authority to review is the Free School Meals (FSM) factor. The current formula distributes funding on the basis of the take up of FSM. For those schools buying in the council's catering service the amount generated from this factor is returned to the council as part payment for the meals service.
- A revised funding model has been produced which allocates FSM funding on the basis of the number of pupils eligible for FSM rather than the take up of FSM. For the majority of schools the financial impact of the change is small, but a handful of primary and secondary schools could generate some MFG protection.
 - The financial impact of this proposed change on the catering Direct Service Organisation is minimal as the small net gains and losses across the schools buying in this council service are balanced.
- Any increase in the number of pupils eligible for FSM since the last refresh of formula data must be funded from within the total 2011-12 Individual Schools Budget (ISB).
- 5.6 It is recommended that for the 2011-12 the FSM factor within the Walsall school funding formula be amended to reflect FSM eligibility rather than FSM take up.

6. Other Budget Pressures

- At the time of writing this report there are a number of potential budget pressures that may create additional budget pressures on the 2011-12 Schools Budget.
 - YPLA allocations for post 16 provision in secondary schools, maintained special schools and non-maintained special schools are still unknown. It is expected that there will be a reduction in the YPLA allocations to schools and local authorities.

- Increase in the number of places to be provided in maintained special schools.
- Increase in the number of primary school places required in reception in September 2011.
- Impact of Central Expenditure Limit recoupment for new and converer academies, including the University Technical College opening in September 2011.
- Potential cost of the Carbon Reduction Commitment.
- Swimming pool proposals.

7. Summary of recommendations
