Post-16 Provision in Walsall

1. Aim

To update Members on the Post-16 provision in Walsall.

2. Recommendations

2.1 Members to note quality and impact of Post-16 provision.

3. Report detail

Under Raising the Participation Age (RPA) legislation all young people in England are required to continue in education or training until at least their 18th birthday. Local authorities have a statutory duty to 'assist, encourage and enable' young people aged 13-19 (and young adults with a learning difficulty and/or disability up to the age of 25) to participate in education or training. Local authorities are also required to ensure sufficient education is available to meet the needs of the population in their area.

3.1. Information Advice and Guidance (IAG)

Schools are responsible for delivering Careers Education, Information Advice and Guidance against the 8 Gatsby Benchmarks identified as the core priorities within a good careers and enterprise programme in schools. They are:

- A stable careers programme
- Learning from career and labour market information
- Addressing the needs of each pupil
- Linking curriculum learning to careers
- Encounters with employers
- Experiences of workplaces
- Encounters with further and higher education
- Personal guidance

Walsall Schools are now outperforming the national average against 6 of the 8 benchmarks.

The latest Ofsted inspection framework has an increased focus on Careers Education Information Advice and Guidance in schools and this will be reflected in future local authority inspections. Walsall Council was also successful in a bid for the European Social Fund/Youth Employment Initiative (ESF/YEI) Impact Project which supports young people aged 16-29 to access education, employment or training. This provides non statutory support and guidance for school leavers.

All of the activity above should lead to children and young people staying in education, employment or training. If they do not sustain this they are known as NEET (Not in employment, education or training).

As of December 2019, 0.9% of young people are NEET in Walsall, this is better than National and all Statistical Neighbours.

Data shows Walsall is performing well in supporting young people in education or training.

We track young people whose destination is Not Known. We arrange home visits for these young people. The percentage of Not Known, 2.8%, is lower than National.

The percentage of young people In Learning (i.e. in education or training) is 94.8% which is also above National and Statistical neighbours.

Funding for the European Social Fund/Youth Employment Initiative (ESF/YEI) Impact Project ceases in July 2021.

3.2. Post-16 Provision and Attainment

The majority of our Post-16 cohort remain in school sixth forms, or attend Walsall College.

We have 19 Secondary schools, 16 Academies and 3 maintained. One of the maintained schools and one academy does not have Post 16 provision.

Latest Post 16 attainment data from Walsall College is not yet available but Walsall schools data shows we are achieving below national expectations in most areas. Of the 2 maintained schools with Post 16 provision, one is achieving in line with national. We are addressing the other through our Schools Causing Concern process.

We have raised our concerns with Academy achievement with Ofsted Senior HMI and also the Regional Schools Commissioner (RSC), who has responsibility for standards and outcomes in Academies.

Reducing Inequalities

IAG services in the local authority and the Impact Advisers specifically support vulnerable young people aged 16-29 with co-located staff in teen pregnancy, youth justice, transition and leaving care teams.

Essential to support young people to remain in education and training as health inequalities are affected by poor education.
