Funding Report

1. Context

- 1.1 Following the change to the Council's Constitution in May 2013, Area Panels now have the responsibility for approving any project funding applications that are received through Area Partnerships.

The initiative is aimed at improving basic IT skills amongst older residents within the Palfrey area. The equipment purchased will also support homework classes for children and enable the long term unemployed to gain better access to training and career opportunities. Asian women for whom English is a second language will also have access to the facilities, developing basic IT literacy within a culturally sensitive setting. The project will operate an open door ethos, ensuring that the project is welcoming to everyone irrespective of race, religion, gender or sexuality. Newly arrived migrants can communicate with their loved ones overseas. We believe that actively promoting these activities particularly to ethnic communities within the heart of the community is imperative to support social cohesion. skills and experience. They want to move towards a greater participation and leadership by members of the group. This will involve the following: Develop use of IT by members of the group in order to access community information about events and funding schemes. They want to explore the possibility of developing a Facebook page for the group. Individuals could also access the internet for their own personal use eg benefits, job, education. The group via volunteer support will encourage and support members to access areas usually reserved for "staff members or leaders", i.e. attendance at seminars, fund-raising meetings. This will increase confidence and self-determination. We also see the group writing their own funding bids with appropriate support. To develop the leadership of the group through the appointment of a treasurer to take control of the (limited) funds of the group and through discussion plan their own trips and activities. To develop their skills in advertising the group and using networking opportunities Develop a pattern of peer support ie group members offering informal support to others in group eg

maintaining contact with those who cannot attend.
