Summary of report

This report presents to Cabinet the initial areas for action in each of the LNP Partnership Plans and details the process for taking these forward over the next 12 months in the 9 LNP areas.

Recommendations

- 4) Cabinet endorse the initial areas for action identified by the LNPs, as outlined in Section 2 and detailed in **Appendix 1** of this report.
- 5) Cabinet welcome the arrangements in place for LNPs to take forward these actions.

Resource and Legal Considerations

Budgetary provision has been made in the current year for set up costs of the new LNPs. In addition, financial resources are being set aside to assist the LNPs in implementing their partnership plans (detailed in a separate report to this Cabinet meeting). These resources will be linked to the local priorities set out in the plans and will pump prime longer term change at a local level.

Citizen Impact

The LNP Plans will capture local issues and concerns and prioritise areas for action, ensuring those likely to achieve a high level of impact in a short timescale are delivered quickly. The LNPs are bringing citizens and service providers together with a range of community leaders (for example, Councillors, headteachers, police inspectors, magistrates and youth workers) to agree on how best to deliver services at a local level to achieve the 2008 Vision. The LNP task groups and community forums, as well as the main LNP meetings, are engaging and involving local residents, community and voluntary groups and young people in deciding on priorities for their area.

Community Safety

The LNP plans contain a range of identified community safety issues and agreed actions to be taken forward over the next 12 months. All LNPs have participated in the recent crime audit, which has informed the updated Crime and Disorder Strategy. Clear links have been established across all 9 areas with the Safer Walsall Borough Partnership (SWBP). A representative from this partnership supports the work of the individual LNP crime task groups. In addition, the collation of crime data has been aligned to the LNP boundaries. This has facilitated joined up working at a local level with a range of partners and local residents.

Environment Impact

Initial priority areas for action will contribute significantly towards achieving a clean and green borough. The LNPs are delivering local environmental actions (such as clean ups, new open spaces, environmental awareness raising) and by involving local stakeholders are improving each area's opportunity to deliver sustainable solutions with longer term impact and benefit. The environmental issues and areas of concern also link to crime and community safety, housing and education. These areas incorporate the government's drive to create cleaner, greener and safer neighbourhoods.

Performance Management and Risk Management Issues

Each plan will be managed and monitored by the neighbourhood partnerships team with support from the Walsall Borough Strategic Partnership's (WBSP) Shared Partnership Information Resource (SPIR). This will evidence and track change in key targets covering LNP boundaries. Progress reports will be published annually and made available to the public. This will be consistent with the council's performance management arrangements.

Equality Implications

Discussions are continuing with the Community Empowerment Network and Walsall Voluntary Action, to look at different ways of engaging local communities, voluntary and community groups. In addition, an equalities impact assessment of the LNP Plans will be undertaken to assess how effectively they are working with and involving the wider community in supporting partnership activities and implementing the plans.

Consultation

Each LNP plan contains a calendar of activities detailing a range of events that will take place over the next 12 months. The aim of these events is to consult with different geographic, thematic and interest communities on the difference the LNP is making to their area and to seek their views on how to continue to develop the work of the partnership. Alongside this, the neighbourhood partnerships team is working with the core consultation group of the Council to join up consultation at a local level, aligned to LNPs, and to avoid duplication and consultation overload.

Vision 2008

The feedback from LNP consultation events and the tracking of improvements at a local level (through improved performance data) will gather evidence of how the Council is listening to what local people want and taking action in response to this.

The dialogue and joint working between service providers, Councillors and citizens at a local level will introduce a range of improvements to service delivery. The performance management system and links to the Community Plan will show how the LNPs are able to impact on a number of pledges and priorities in the 2008 Vision, in particular around safe and secure, clean and green, image and access to services.

1 Progress to date

At it's meeting of 19 January 2005, Cabinet noted and welcomed the progress made in implementing local neighbourhood partnerships (LNPs) and agreed that Cllr Zahid be authorised to consult LNPs on their emerging priorities. Cabinet also agreed that all LNPs should be encouraged to set up arrangements to consult and involve young people in their area.

Workshops were held in September and October with all LNPs at which they identified initial areas for action. Draft plans have been developed using the agreed template for LNP plans. The draft plans were agreed at the January and February LNP meetings.

2 Initial priorities identified by the LNPs

Initial priorities for each LNP have been identified through a range of mechanisms. The Shared Partnership Information Resource (SPIR) has provided local intelligence by LNP area that has been used to identify trends and patterns in relation to headline data such as education, access to services, health, crime and housing. In addition to this, super output area data (recently introduced by government) has been able to pin point particular issues in smaller areas within wards. Breaking statistics into smaller neighbourhoods has provided the LNP with a really good understanding of specific areas within their locality which may be in need of attention.

Existing consultation data (for example from the Health Action Zone Steering Groups and local committee plans) has also been fed into the draft partnership plans. This bottom up information has been updated and added to through workshops and other local consultation events.

The local issues and areas of need have also been linked into the existing plans and strategies of the Council and partner agencies such as the Police, Safer Walsall Borough Partnership and Education Walsall. The partnership plans, therefore, also reflect and include major initiatives planned through these agencies, for example Children's Centres.

At their meetings in January and February 2005, the LNP agreed initial priority areas for action broadly grouped as follows:

- Safe and secure
- Clean and green
- Listening to what local people want
- Access to services

Appendix 1 details those specific actions that LNPs plan to take forward over the next 12 months. Common actions include:

- Address problems of litter and grafitti, particularly in district centres and around local shops.
- Increase the provision and activities for young people.
- Address anti-social behaviour in identified hot spot areas.
- Strengthen enforcement measures flytipping, litter and alcohol.
- Increase car parking provision and improve existing car parks.
- Work with local employers to improve skills base in the area.
- Increase the presence of police/neighbourhood wardens to reduce fear of crime.

Over the next 6 months the plans will evolve and further detail and information added as the task groups become operational. Partner agencies are keen to work with LNPs at a local level to look at ways in which their headline targets (for example tackling obesity) can be tackled and delivered at a local level through the LNPs.

3 Implementing the LNP plans

A separate report to Cabinet on this agenda gives details of the £250,000 Council resource that is to be made available to LNPs in 2005/06. LNPs are currently prioritising quick wins from their initial list of actions that can utilise this resource over the next 12 months through their task groups.

All LNPs have established task groups linked to their key areas for action. Membership is initially being drawn from LNP members plus the emerging Community Forums in the area. Terms of reference will be agreed at their first meetings and they will report on their progress at each LNP meeting.

The primary objective for the task groups is to drive forward action in the key areas identified by the LNP. It will be important for the groups to link into the relevant service areas of the Council and other partners to ensure that solutions developed are linked into mainstream provision at the outset. The neighbourhood partnerships team is in the process of securing representation from a range of service areas and partner agencies to support the work of the task groups. A schedule of meetings for the task groups covering the next 12 months will be presented to the next round of LNP meetings.

The partnership plans will also come alive through the securing of external funding, such as that recently awarded to the Redhouse Estate in Aldridge. The separate funding report on this Cabinet agenda also details how the LNPs will be supported to attract external funding to deliver local priorities. A joined up approach will be taken through the LNP Chairs Forum and the LNP officer project team to avoid duplication and to introduce collaborative bidding and cross LNP working for the wider benefit of the Borough.

The plans will be a critical tool of influence of the Council's service planning process for 2006/07 and also of our partners through the Walsall Borough Strategic. It will be important for the plans to evolve into a tool that is fit for purpose, containing a balance of local issues linked to wider strategic priorities of the Council and other stakeholders. This way the LNPs will be able to achieve longer term sustainable change by influencing how the mainstream budgets are allocated across the Borough in order to address locally identified needs.
