
I hope you find the Bulletin useful and informative and look forward to hearing your views.

Partnership News



The Walsall Crime and Disorder Reduction Partnership and Drug Action Team (collectively known as the Safer Walsall Borough Partnership) recognises its special responsibility for achieving the particular vision of ensuring that by 2008, all people in Walsall are safe and secure and that year by year, Walsall becomes a much safer community.

The Drug Action Team have many initiatives in place offering support to drug users, their families and people who work with users. This includes a comprehensive policy for schools incorporating guidance from the Home Office.

There are a number of diversionary programmes including sports based activities and drug information/education sessions exploring the link between drugs and music.

The Drug Intervention Programme (DIP) was launched in Walsall in November 2004 as part of the government's strategy for tackling drug use and offending behaviour.

This is an innovative scheme created to direct adult drug using offenders out of crime and into treatment. All those offenders identified as having difficulties with drug use can now be tested, assessed, and diverted into appropriate treatment programmes. The programme also seeks to re-engage people who have dropped out of treatment in the past.

The community should begin to notice a real reduction in crime, as realistic alternative options to change old habits will be on offer. Changes in the Criminal Justice Act mean that all offenders returning to Walsall, after serving a period in custody, will be offered the chance to stay drug free and take up the offer of ongoing support or treatment in the community.

The Borough Resource Allocation Group (BRAG) is a management group, who meet monthly, consisting of key partners and service providers who review and analyse current community safety data in a multi agency response. The group makes recommendations to the Partnership in order to meet the strategic objectives as outlined in the strategy.

Walsall Persistent Offender Programme (WALPOP) is a unique partnership approach to tackling crime in Walsall. The programme works closely with Probation, Police and drug treatment services.

WALPOP designs a bespoke programme for individuals following an initial visit to Prison or home, according to their needs. Offender Managers may offer help in areas of family support, drug intervention, homelessness, relationship issues, education/training and job searching.

There is little doubt that WALPOP is expanding and growing at a vast rate and is renowned as a unique enforcement tool due to the 'carrot and stick' approach. It is this pragmatic approach to offending that has build upon the Partnerships' success and has undeniably contributed to the reduction in crime across the Borough.

Anti-Social Behaviour Unit continues to target the most prolific perpetrators of crime and disorder and is strengthening its partnership arrangements with social landlords and statutory and voluntary sector bodies.

A priority of the unit is to get the message out to the public that for almost every ASB situation, an agency/service response for the problem already exists. All these bodies have the powers to apply for ASB orders in their own right. The unit does not operate as an 'initial response service' and as such all first time enquiries to the unit are being directed to the relevant service/agency.

In terms of outcomes, there are currently 71 active Anti-Social Behaviour Orders across the borough and reported breaches of ASBO's are now being more effectively managed. There are 8 current Dispersal Orders that have proved beneficial to the community. There are alcohol restricted areas in three town centres. Under new legislation, two houses dealing in Class A drugs have been closed (Crack House Closures). There are currently 7 of these orders in the West Midlands area, two of which are in Walsall.

West Midlands Fire Service in Walsall have four stations, Walsall, Willenhall, Bloxwich and Aldridge.

Much of the current work is aimed at prevention through education and advice. Partnership working has also been recognised as the best way forward and the Fire Service rarely embark on new projects without engaging with an agency such as the Police or local authority.

Fire fighters at every station have an arson awareness schools programme which fits into the National Curriculum. There are a number of intervention programmes in action and the latest drive is to visit homes and give free advice on home safety. Anyone can request a free home fire risk assessment. By telephoning our free phone number, 0800 389 5525, trained fire-fighters will then arrive at an agreed time to carry out this free fire safety check with the occupant.
