Area Manager's Report

Updated Wednesday, 30 November, 2016

1. Purpose of the Report

- 1.1 This report seeks to inform Elected Members for the Walsall South Area Partnership of some of the work carried out within the local area. The information in this report was correct at the time of writing, Wednesday, 08 December, 2016.
- 1.2 Walsall Council strategic priorities are:
 - Safer Walsall: Creating safe, sustainable and inclusive communities
 - Children and Young People: Improving safeguarding, learning and life chances for children and young people
 - Business and Jobs: Supporting businesses to thrive and supporting local people in to work
 - Health and Well-Being: Improving health, including well-being and independence for older people
- 1.3 Walsall South Area Partnership has a number of key priorities which have been identified through work with Ward Councillors, partner agencies, Walsall Intelligence Network and the local community:
 - Tackling crime and anti-social behaviour
 - Creating cleaner and tidier neighbourhoods
 - Healthy Lifestyles
 - Remove the impact of sex workers and drug dealers
 - Improving educational achievement
 - Improving job prospects and employability
 - Improving roads maintenance and traffic flow

2. Safer Walsall: Creating safe, sustainable and inclusive communities

2.1 CCTV for Walsall South - Area Manager working with Surveillance Unit, currently have a camera deployed in South Street, Walsall. Unfortunately it was discovered that the camera which was deployed in Carless Street, was faulty and cannot be deployed. A request is in place to deploy the camera from South Street into Spout Lane, to help reduce the activities in this area.

2.2 Salon Saviours - Police in Walsall are teaming up with the town's hair and beauty professionals in a new scheme that will see staff trained to spot signs of domestic abuse among their customers.

Detective Chief Inspector Michaela Kerr, from the Public Protection Unit that leads on domestic abuse investigations, said: "There are hairdressers and beauty salons on every high street and each day staff are speaking to dozens of customers. Their position as one of the most trusted trades makes them well-placed to offer information and sound advice to survivors.

"Salon Saviours aims to break the silence that has historically surrounded domestic abuse. We want people to be talking about these abhorrent crimes as easily as we talk about car crime or burglary. We also want people to be holding us to account over our handling of domestic abuse cases with the same vigour as they do about other crimes."

Salon Saviours are all volunteers and will not be obliged to report cases to the police, Instead, they will have a direct hotline to detectives to share concerns about a customer or a customer's partner and provide a "listening ear and a source of information".

The Walsall launch of Salon Saviours took place on Wednesday 6 July at the Walsall Hub, Walsall College Wisemore Campus.

- 2.3 Walsall South Big Spring Clean – following on from the success of last year's event, when we held 9 litter picks around Caldmore, Palfrey, Primley Avenue Park, Queen Street Cemetery, Chuckery, Old Birchills, Pleck, The Butts and St. Matthew's, it is looking likely that there will be another event next year.

Throughout the week we removed many bags of rubbish, several lorry loads of fly tipping and had volunteers from a number of council departments and partners, including councillors, plus local residents and local businesses. Thanks to Clean & Green, Youth Support Services, Community Safety, Sustrans, Walsall Housing Group, Councillor Russell, Councillor Nawaz, St. Matthew's Church, St. Luke's Church, Friends of the Earth, Chamberlain & Hill, Caldmore Community Garden and Friends of Palfrey Park.

Keep Britain Tidy have announced that they will support a month of clean up action in March, 2017, with a particular focus on the weekend of the 3rd – 5th March.

- 2.4 Carless Street – there have been a number of initiatives at this location, such as new meshing put up by Community Safety to help prevent fly tipping, the deployment of a CCTV camera and a flashing LED sign warning that CCTV is in operation in the area. The school has also funded the erection of a wooden fence, costing in the region of £10,000, in an attempt to shield the pupils from the unsavoury activities taking place in the alley way. More recently the Caldmore Community House has installed security cameras and this seems to have led to a decrease in the issues in the alleyway, although we realise that there are still issues at the top end, by the Aaina Hub. Following on from the success of the Caldmore Community meetings, M&T have kindly installed lighting at the entrance to Carless Street from Caldmore Road.
- 2.5 Spout Lane – there have been a number of clean ups at this location, on several occasions Clean & Green have removed large amounts of domestic accumulations, especially cans and bottles. Also settees and white goods have been removed. There was a CCTV camera in this location, but despite this and the work of a number of partners, none of these initiatives appear to be making a difference to the behaviour of people frequenting this location. Following an increase in the activities of ASB and flytipping, the camera has been requested to be deployed again in Spout Lane (Nov 2016).
- 2.6 Task & Finish Group – through a multi-agency partnership, Cllr. Nawaz is chairing a group to look at the issues in Caldmore, with a remit to tackle the issues that are currently blighting the area, such as street drinking, litter, fly tipping, anti-social behaviour, houses of multiple occupation and highway issues. Partners from the council, West Midlands Police, West Midlands Fire Service, Walsall Housing Group, Caldmore Accord and Nash Dom are working

collaboratively on the Caldmore Action Plan, working on the issues prevalent in the area, in a transparent way through tasking of tasks.

2.7 Community Meeting – through the above “task and finish” group for the issues in Caldmore, we are now holding regular monthly community meetings to discuss the issues with the local residents and community leaders. The last meeting took place at 5.30pm on 25 November at the Caldmore Primary School, in the school hall and the next meeting will be scheduled for mid January, 2017 at the same location.

2.8 Glebe Centre – is a multifunctional hub for over 18's from where a variety of services are delivered that serve vulnerable adults in Walsall. Staff and volunteers work with a variety of individuals with differing needs such as:

- Homelessness
- Mental Health
- Drugs
- Alcohol
- Unemployment
- Prostitution
- Associated issues

Support workers are available to provide advice and information on health issues, training, employment and substance misuse issues and offer general support and advice on a 1-1 basis. We also deliver a condom service and needle exchange facility for injecting drug users.

We provide free hot/cold drinks all day and a free breakfast between 10-10.30am. Service users can also access a 2 course lunch that costs just 50p. Unfortunately we cannot provide this for free as we have to recoup our costs on the ingredients. However, when we have meals donated (people sometimes purchase the ingredients and we will cook them) we provide this for free. We have free male and female shower facilities. We provide all the products, such as razors, shaving foam, shower gel, shampoo, conditioner etc., which all come from donations. We also provide the towels.

Service users have access to our clothing room where they can get a free change of clothing. We get through quite a lot of underwear (both male and female) as well as socks, all of which are donated so, on the occasions when we don't have any underwear, unfortunately service users have to go without. At the moment we are experiencing this fairly regularly – especially with the ladies.

We have a laundry service whereby service users can wash and dry their clothes. We provide facilities so that service users have the opportunity to socialise and interact in a safe environment.

In the 2015/16 period, we had 10,421 contacts using our services. These are obviously not individual people but we currently have no system whereby we can look at the number of individuals who access our services annually as I don't have the HR capacity for this. We have approximately 490 people registered with us and these comprise of a 75-25 per cent split of men and women respectively. The youngest person to register with us is 18 and the oldest is 86. We see people from all nationalities and are a crucial service for many Eastern European people who have no recourse to public funds.

We usually request the following items if people ask us what they can donate:

- All kinds of personal hygiene products: shampoo, conditioner, shower gel, toothbrushes, toothpaste, shaving foam, razors, deodorants.
- All kinds of cleaning products: bleach, bleach spray, anti-bac spray, disinfectant, toilet cleaner, hand wash, washing up liquid, scourers and J cloths, dusters, large black bin bags, air fresheners, cream cleaner, disposable gloves, laundry detergent/softener, toilet roll, furniture polish, kitchen cleaner, etc., etc.
- Clothes: smaller sized men's and women's clothing, especially underwear.
- For cooking we are always short of tin foil, sauces/condiments e.g. mayonnaise, gravy, black pepper etc., and things to provide for dessert such as cakes, custard, etc., sauces in jars e.g. pasta sauces, curry sauces, casseroles mixes, etc. We hardly ever (due to transportation/storage issues and the cost of some of the items) get red meat, poultry, fish, cheese and eggs.
- We get through quite a lot of milk and cuppa soups – especially when the weather is not so nice.
- We also ask if people can donate smaller items that they have received as gifts but don't want so that we can use these as bingo prizes for our service users (we try and play bingo with them at least once a week). Additionally, we request arts and crafts items so that we can do activities, such as card making (especially at specific times of the year like valentine's day, Christmas, Easter etc.), which our service users really enjoy.
- We accept books, games and smaller household items such as mugs, plates, cutlery, towels, tea towels etc – some of which we use at the Centre as these things frequently get broken, lost or stolen or we provide them to service users who are in need of these things.

We rely on the help of local churches and other groups through their kind donations of food, cleaning products, toiletries, clothing, money, etc., in order to deliver our services and we wouldn't be able to continue to operate if it wasn't for the support that we receive.

- 2.9 Caldmore Community Garden – is continuing the works on Caldmore Community House intended to be a community hub linked to the garden and accessible to schools and community groups in the area. In the summer months they have organised or hosted several Community Fun Days, including The Big Lunch, Walsall Kobar Garden Party and Eid Open Day, cinema evenings and much, much more. The house is now in use and is already hosting multi-agency meetings for the community.
- 2.10 Afghan Community & Welfare Centre – have been awarded a contribution of £2,000 from Walsall South Area Partnership to run the Kumak Project, a drop-in cafe for newly arrived communities into the Walsall area.
- 2.11 Transforming Communities Together – have been awarded a contribution of £500 from Walsall South Area Partnership to set up Places of Worship. Working with local community groups that want to set up as a place of worship can get help and support.
- 2.12 Park Hall Residents Association – have been awarded a contribution of £750 from Walsall South Area Partnership to promote civic pride and maintain the area around a local beauty spot.
- 2.13 Caldmore Community Garden – have been awarded a contribution of £2,625 from Walsall South Area Panel towards improving security around the Caldmore Community House in Carless Street. The improvements will see a new fence erected and improvements made to a wall, to deter perpetrators gaining access into the garden and causing damage and anti-social behaviour to items.
- 2.14 Friends of the Chuckery Corner Garden – have been awarded a contribution of £373 from Walsall South Area Panel towards the upkeep and maintenance of the Chuckery Pocket Park Community Garden.
- 2.15 Migrant Community Project – Slovak Club Birmingham CIC have been awarded a contribution of £2,500 from Walsall South Area Panel, co-financed by a further £2,500 from our Community Cohesion team within Walsall Council. This project will deliver opportunities to migrant families when they settle in Walsall, respond to cultural issues, signpost and support. There is an emphasis on Czech, Slovak and Roma communities.

- 2.16 Removal of town centre benches – Walsall South Area Panel has provided £200 to Walsall Council Town Centre management team to help with the costs of removing benches from the town centre, following issues with street drinking and anti-social behaviour in the Bradford Street area of town. Evidence showed that the benches were part of the problem, attracting street drinkers to this part of town, that then led to crime and anti-social behaviour.
- 2.17 Palfrey Park Friends & User Group – have been allocated £600 towards a project to work with volunteers to plant flowers in Palfrey Park, which will help to make the park a more attractive place to visit, as well as giving a sense of ownership and responsibility to park users and visitors.
- 2.18 Church Hill User Group – this group has now reformed at the request of Cllr Nawaz. We held our first meeting in November and will continue to hold the meetings every 2 months.
- 2.19 ASB in Birchills – this task and finish group has recently held its second meeting to discuss the issues around ASB in the Birchills area. The meeting brings together both Walsall South and North Walsall Area Partnerships, with representatives from local ward councillors, Walsall Council, West Midlands Police and other agencies working together to help tackle ASB in the area.

3. Children and Young People: Improving safeguarding, learning and life chances for children and young people

- 3.1 Walsall South's Youth Support Services - Over the past three months we have engaged and worked with four different groups of young people, Asian males 16 to 19, Asian males 12 to 15, mixed group white and dual heritage young people 12 to 15. And a large group of eastern European young people both male and female from 11 to 19 year olds.
- The diversity working in such an environment is very interesting but also complex especially with the vulnerability of the eastern European young people, language barriers, and lack of understanding for example recent sessions we have discussed the holy period of Ramadan and how to be mindful of other cultures and religions, especially around drinking of alcohol as this issue in particular as raised tension on a previous occasion very near to this location.
- There is also vulnerability with young Asian males been targeted by older youths to become involved in drug dealing?
- And there is vulnerability issue's with the mixed group white and dual heritage young people 12 to 15 getting involved in motor cycle crimes and the usage of illegal substances.

The detached teams aims in Palfrey Park :-

- The detach team aims to maintain the current level of community cohesion in palfrey park and surrounding area.

- Work with young across a range of issue through discussions topic based, such as Drinking substance misuse, and what is Anti Social Behaviour.
- Promoting and sign posting other positive activities for young people to get involved in.
- Deter and prevent any youth Anti Social Behaviour.
- Provide Hoppa provision and access to it resources.

3.2 Sure Start Palfrey Children's Centre –

3.3 Walsall Council Park Fun Days – Walsall Council offered a number of fun days again this summer. All events run from 10.30am – 4pm and offer inflatables, charity stalls, music, children's rides, storytelling, refreshments and face painting. All events are free entry, however, charges do apply on attractions. The fun day in our area was in Palfrey Fun Day on the 30th May.

3.4 Walsall Bangladeshi Association – have been awarded a contribution of £1,500 to run cultural events to promote community engagement around young people in the St. Matthew's area.

3.5 Guru Nanak Sikh Temple – have been awarded a contribution of £1,500 to run music classes, to improve the participation in music classes in mainstream schools and also to improve confidence and self esteem, especially for the Asian pupils in the St. Matthew's area.

3.6 Gurdwara Nanak Sar Guru Nanak Sikh Organisation – have been awarded a contribution of £2,700 to run a health, drugs and grooming awareness course for children in the Walsall South area, educating over 200 children in the dangers of grooming and drugs, through a series of workshops, which is also educating on health and well-being.

3.7 Sikh Hunters Football Club – have been allocated a contribution of £1,268.75 from Walsall South Area Partnership to set up a new under 7s team to compete in the league this season. They now have 3 youth teams (u7s, u11s and u15s) as well as an adult team, and the club promotes fitness and discipline with professionalism and enjoyment.

- 3.8 Keep Safe Assembly Project – Street Teams have been allocated a contribution of £1,675 from Walsall South Area Panel to run a new project, going into school assemblies and talking to children aged 10-11 and 11-12 to explain the risks and dangers associated with running away from home/care and child sexual exploitation.
- 3.9 Palfrey Park Table Tennis Project – Walsall Council's Clean & Green team have been allocated a contribution of £1,500 from Walsall South Area Panel to purchase and install an all-weather, vandal-proof table tennis table in Palfrey Park. This free activity will be used as an activity to provide the young people of the area with something constructive to do in the park.
- 3.10 Kick Start Football Project – Birchills Sports Academy have been allocated a contribution of £2,500 from Walsall South Area Panel to help transcend barriers of gender, nationality and ethnicity to address issues such as gang violence, lack of education and poor health practices. Through an interest in football, this project will engage young people from Walsall South to provide them with focus and direction. The project will tackle anti-social behaviour, health, social cohesion, activity for under 10s and raise aspirations.
- 3.11 Canal & River Trust – have been awarded £600 to run free canoeing sessions for local school children. We are working in partnership with Louise Worton and hope to host the canoe sessions at the Arboretum in the new year.

4 Business and Jobs: Supporting businesses to thrive and supporting local people in to work

4.1 Walsall Town Centre Regeneration (Andrea Jones) –

Under Construction

Jhoots Pharmacy Head Offices – 100 new people in town including 30 new jobs, due for occupation the end of 2016

Co-op Store – 20 new jobs – no timescale at the moment but just fitting out

New cinema at Waterfront – construction phase will be complete in October when the unit will be handed over to the operators to fit out – opening expected early Spring 2016

5 x new leisure outlets at The Waterfront – Chiquito, Pizza Express, Bella Italia, Hungry Horse are confirmed and TGI Friday has just applied for a premises licence

Advanced Planning Stage

Norton and Profitt / St Modwen's site, Digbeth / Market Square – Demolition is due to start early 2016 to make way for 11 new, modern retail units, B&M have currently signed to be one of the tenants – completion is expected in 2017. We

are currently looking at either painting or installing artwork over the boards to make them look a little better.

Old Square Phases 2 – 4 – the existing walk-in centre is due to move to Bridgeman Street in December. This will make way for Old Square Shopping Centre to expand forwards into the area currently occupied by market stalls creating 2 – 3 new units plus a new glazed entrance. This work is also due to commence in 2016.

New Market – planning permission and funding is in place to relocate all market stalls to The Bridge, the market will benefit from new stalls, a food court area plus public realm improvements. Work was originally expected to start around now but due to upcoming works from Network Rail in Park Street it will now be carried out sometime in 2016.

I'm pleased to report that Saddlers Centre will very soon have 100% occupancy as does Jerome Retail Park and Crown Wharf – the Victorian Arcade have told me that they also have tenants lined up for all of their vacant units as have Park Place (all units on one side of the centre). I'm working with Old Square Shopping Centre to help improve their occupancy but unfortunately although the unit sizes are perfect for new small businesses the service charges and business rates often excludes them from opening up there. Within the past 6 weeks we have seen over 12 new businesses opening in the town which along with all the regeneration is a very promising sign.

As Town Centre Manager I am currently working with PFRA (the authority responsible for managing street collection companies) to implement a site management plan to control the number of chuggers who operate in the town which will dictate when and where they can work, I am also working with key retailers such as M&S to help try and improve the general town centre environment, including litter and general appearance, meetings for both these issues are taking place on 8th October. We are also going for becoming a dementia friendly town which will help support anyone with the condition to shop in the town, this has already made both local and national news.

Christmas event will take place on Thursday 3rd December between 4pm – 6pm in St Paul's Square. It will be a Harry Potter / Christmas Tree Festival themed event and we will be switching on the lights on the main town's tree.

An A5 booklet promoting the town is due to be printed in November – they will be distributed round doctors, dentists, garden centres etc. This publication is free to the council and public and is paid for by advertising – 7,500 copies will be produced per year for the next 2 years.

- 4.2 Walsall Black Sisters Development & Sustainability Project – Walsall Black Sisters have been awarded a contribution of £1,500 from Walsall South Area Panel to help enhance the role that the organisation can play in the local area,

helping overcome social barriers, such as culture, language, low self-esteem and working with people who lead chaotic lifestyles.

5 Health and Well-Being: Improving health, including well-being and independence for older people

5.1 Physical Activity – Lifestyle Services Team offer a variety of services across Walsall South including smoking cessation, exercise sessions and healthy diet advice. For more information please visit their website www.lifestyle.walsallhealthcare.nhs.uk/lifestyle-services.aspx or phone the team on 01922 444044

5.2 Aspire2Engage Project – working in partnership with Walsall Football Club Community Programme, we are developing a new project called Aspire2Engage. The idea of the project is to link in local community groups with the football club, who have a responsibility set down by the Football League Trust to help deliver activities that promote, engage and develop the local community in 4 strategic priority areas, which are 1) Participation 2) Education 3) Health 4) Inclusion. The Community Partnership team are working with us on this project, themselves a registered charity, and a separate entity to the commercial arm of the football club. From a speculative email back in December, to date we have held 2 events at the football club, engaging with over 50 people from the local community. The incentive we offer to local groups to engage with us is up to 30 free tickets for a Walsall FC home match, including press coverage and publicity on the day to raise awareness of the group and the work they do within the local community.

We had a borough-side Community Showcase event on Monday, 27th June. This showcase promoted over 100 local community groups and organisations that offer activities, events and volunteer opportunities to the residents in the borough. It is hoped that by showcasing the good work that the community & voluntary sector offer, local businesses will commit to helping these groups through their corporate social responsibility policy, with a community grant scheme the ultimate end goal. Thanks to the support of Barclays Bank, utilising their “Pound for Pound” community scheme, every pound we raised through raffle ticket sales will be matched by Barclays, meaning that we raised over £1,500 at the event.

5.3 Walsall Gala Baths - Work has finished at Walsall Gala Baths to improve facilities as part of a £1 million refurbishment project. Improvements include a state of the art family changing village, installation of a boom in the gala pool to create a 25m pool and a separate warmer learner pool, a remodelled reception and a new sauna. 5.4 Place of Refuge Community Church – have been allocated a contribution of £1,000 to set up an allotment. The group have been donated an allotment, so Walsall South Area Panel have provided some funding to help the group grow their own vegetables, gain basic cooking skills, raise awareness around health eating and include physical activity and active lifestyles through the gardening element.

5.5 Over 50s Showcase Event – Area Partnerships are hosting an event at Walsall Town Hall on Wednesday, 16 November, between 2-6pm. The event will showcase 50 organisations who will have stalls, with information, advice and guidance that will be useful for anyone over the age of 50. The event is free for anyone to attend and will have several special guests, including the Mayor of Walsall, and Doreen Tipton, who is opening the event and doing a stand up routine too! There will be afternoon tea available from the restaurant (£3 per person) and a raffle.

5.6 St Paul's Friendship Group – have been awarded £600 from the Walsall South area panel to help their group, who welcome anyone to join them to reduce loneliness and social isolation and provide a group who promote well being.

5.7 Caldmore Men's Shed – Mark Webster has set up a men's group that operates from the Caldmore Community House/Garden. The Caldmore Men's Shed is open every Monday and anyone is welcome to pop down and join in. Caldmore Men's Shed in Caldmore Community Garden is a place for all men.

A place to meet others and follow an interest or learn some new skills.

We meet weekly to plan and carry projects in Caldmore Community Garden, but also to meet, chat and have a laugh.

We have built the shed but it's still needs a lot of work. Come and see the shed, get involved and help us develop it and decide what activities we can carry out as a group.

5.8 Nash Dom – have been commissioned by Lynne Hughes to do some specific work in Caldmore linked to crime reduction. Additionally Nash Dom have been commissioned to undertake specific work around fact finding to develop a richer picture around the European migrant communities of Walsall and to develop some details analysis and case examples of both service provision and service needs to help improve service delivery and engagement with European Migrants. This work was highlighted in the Cohesion Working Group recommendations.

5.9 Cervical Screening in the Workplace

Recent research conducted by Jo's Cervical Cancer Trust has identified that 26% of women would be more encouraged to attend if their company was more flexible and they didn't have to take holiday for an appointment. Also, one in three 25-29 year olds, where screening attendance is at its lowest, are too embarrassed to talk to their employers about screening.

Time to Test is a campaign for every industry with the aim of increasing accessibility to cervical screening, and ultimately saving lives. As part of the campaign, Jo's Cervical Cancer Trust is asking businesses to raise awareness of cervical cancer and

how it can be prevented amongst their employees and to ensure they know vital information such as symptoms and where to get support.

Women working for Walsall Council have been offered the opportunity to screen at work and since October there have been monthly screening sessions to which women are being encouraged to attend. It is really noticeable that by being able to speak to women directly they are more likely to attend the appointment which only takes 7 – 10 minutes.

6 Other Important Information

6.1 Near Neighbours - The programme offers small grants of between £250 and £5,000, as seed funding for local groups and organisations working to bring together neighbours, and to develop relationships across diverse faiths and ethnicities to improve their communities.

Our grants *include* the following criteria. Projects should:

- **Bring together peoples of two or more different faiths and/or ethnicities**, to build friendships and develop relationships of trust.
- **Work locally**. We want to see people who are living very locally (i.e. in the same street, estate or neighbourhood) come together.
- **Work sustainably**. We want to see long term and natural relationships grow, that will last beyond the period of funding.
- **Work to improve the community**. We want to see people working to make their communities a better place to live.
- **Involve diverse people in planning and implementation**. People from more than one faith group and/or ethnicity are involved in planning and implementing the proposal.

6.2 Aaina Hub

Safer Walsall: Creating safe, sustainable and inclusive communities

Aaina have received funding from Peoples Health Trust to deliver a Inter-Great project that encourages community cohesion amongst women in the locality who are from diverse communities and emerging communities to break down barriers and address issues that concern them about their neighbourhood.

Monthly events take place linked to seasonal festival and cultural celebrations to improve understanding and relations.

Over 500 women have participated since the project started in May 2016

Children and Young People: Improving safeguarding, learning and life chances for children and young people

Iqra Supplementary School and Youth Provision delivers afterschool, weekend and holiday activities for children aged 5 years to 19 years. The project received five years funding and commenced in April, and delivers positive pastime activities that focus on Healthy Living, Community Cohesion, raising aspiration and achievements and Volunteering opportunities for young people aged 14 years to 19 years to reduce NEETs. Over 300 children have benefited from the project since it commenced in May 2016.

Business and Jobs: Supporting businesses to thrive and supporting local people in to work

The Aspire and Achieve Project is now in its second year and is supporting more women aged 25- 55 to become work ready. We are focusing on providing basic skills that enable women to progress on to accredited qualifications that link into transferable skills in the service industry. Over 150 women have registered on courses and activities since September to up skill and improve their access to life enhancing opportunities.

The project also provides volunteering placements for women with limited work related skills in areas of administration, customer care, housekeeping, and facilitating workshops.

Health and Well-Being: Improving health, including well-being and independence for older people

Aaina is funded through the Big Lottery to deliver a life enhancing project for women aged 55 + who are at risk of being isolated and excluded from mainstream service provision. The project delivers community based activities

at Aaina and the Seed Hut in Palfrey that focus on improving health and wellbeing, intergenerational projects, volunteering and befriending opportunities, and exercise and yoga.

Over 100 older women benefit from the project each week through active engagement and participation.

Aaina also deliver advice and support surgeries to women around welfare and housing.

6.3 Community Food Connection with FareShare FoodCloud

I wanted to let you know about an exciting programme called Community Food Connection that we are introducing at Tesco Walsall, along with several other Tesco stores across the Central Region.

We want to make sure any surplus edible food we have is donated to local charities and community groups working to feed those in need. To help us with this, we have partnered with FareShare FoodCloud.
