



Demographic data has been taken from the 2018 mid-year population estimates. A slightly lower proportion of children looked after are from BME backgrounds compared to the Walsall Child and Young Person population. The current children looked after population has continued to increase since December 2019 – from 641 to 691 at the end of June 2020 The current rate per 10,000 remains below that of our statistical neighbours but is still considerably higher than the 2018/19 England and West Midlands averages. We currently have 35 children placed at home on full care order, this has decreased from 37 at the end of guarter 4 2019/20. 24 of the 35 have been placed at home for over a year. Work is continuing with the courts to revoke care orders for children who are placed at home where appropriate.

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
Trends for placements with in house foster carers have remained consistent throughout the reporting period, despite a dip during March 2020. Currrently Walsall has 307 in house foster carers. This has increase from 284 at the end of quarter 1 2019-20, But is lower than the 2017-18 figure of 321. Walsall has 206 independent fostering agency placements. This figure has seen an increasing trend during the last 12 months and is higher than the 2018-19 outturn of 145.

Just over 13% of Walsall's CLA are placed 20 plus miles from their home address and 9.1% of the CLA population have had 3 or more placements within a year. Both figures have increased compared to the 2018-19 outturn, but are lower than West Midlands and Statistical Neighbour averages for the same period. 65 of Walsall's CLA are placed in a residential setting. These include children's home, residential accommodation or NHS/Health establishments providing medical or nursing care.

**Statutory Visits and Reviews** 



The proportion of CLA where a statutory visit has been undertaken to timescale in accordance with the child's plan is 90.1%, with 95.5% seen within 6 weeks of the previous visit or coming in care. There were 2 CLA with no visits recorded at 30th June 2020

96% of reviews have been undertaken within timescales. This is higher than the 2018/19 out-turn of 91%. 96.7% of current children looked after have had a review within the last 6 months. 1.3% (9) children currently have overdue reviews.

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**Statutory Visits and Reviews** 



The child's views were recorded at 100% of CLA reviews. This is comparable to 2018/19 and higher than 2017/18. In 2019/20, 55.6% of children attended their review. This is lower than the out-turn of 57% in 2019/20. The number of children experiencing a change of social worker has increased slightly compared to the previous year. The number of CLA who have remained with the same social worker for the past 12 months is 354 compared with 357 last year.

### CLA with an up to date ePEP

The proportion eligible CYPiC with an up to date Electronic Personal Education Plan (ePEP)

The proportion of ePEP's completed at the end of thes summer term is 98%. CLA overall absence, Persistent Absence and Unauthorised Absence are currently all below both Statistical neighbour and England averages. The percentage of CLA attending Good or Outstanding schools is 75%, whilst this figure rises to 97% for Early Years pupils.

#### Methodology

Attainment in English and maths (9-5) From 2017, this measure looks at the percentage of pupils achieving a grade 5 or above in both English and maths. Pupils can achieve the English component of this with a grade 5 or above in English language or literature. There is no requirement to sit both exams.

Attainment 8 - Attainment 8 measures the average achievement of pupils in up to 8 qualifications including English (double weighted if the combined English qualification, or both language and literature are taken), maths (double weighted), three further qualifications that count in the English Baccalaureate (EBacc) and three further qualifications that can be GCSE qualifications (including EBacc subjects) or any other non-GCSE qualifications on the DfE approved list.

Progress 8 - Progress 8 aims to capture the progress a pupil makes from the end of key stage 2 to the end of key stage 4. It compares pupils' achievement – their Attainment 8 score – with the average Attainment 8 score of all pupils nationally who had a similar starting point (or 'prior attainment'), calculated using assessment results from the end of primary school.

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

### Strength and Difficulties Questionnaire (SDQ)

The Strengths and Difficulties Questionnaire should be completed for every child looked after for at least 12 months and aged 5 to 16 years-old.



Number of children looked after for at least 12 months aged 5 to 16 with an SDQ score




The percentage of children looked after with an initial health check and dental checks has increased in quarter 1, compared with the 2019-20 out turn. It was anticipated that this would increase as data continues to be loaded onto system throughout the year. Significant work has been undertaken, and continues to be taken in partnership with health to improve the processes and accuracy of data recording in relation to health assessments and to ensure that children and young people receive their assessments on time. The results of this began to be seen during the second half of the 2019-20 reporting period and have continued to have a positive effect during the latest quarter. The proportion of SDQ's completed and recorded has seen small fluctuations during quarter 1, following increases between January and March 2020. The average SDQ score is currently 13.5. This is slightly lower than the previous quarter, where the average SDQ score was 13.8 and much lower than the average for quarter 1 during 2019-20 (15.4). 89 children currently have an SDQ score that suggests there is cause for concern in their emotional and mental well-being based on the answers they gave to the questionnaire

Care Leavers aged 17-21




The percentage of care leavers in education, employment or training for the 19-21 and 19-25 cohorts continues to decrease. 53.8% care leavers aged 19-21 are in Education, Employment or Training con to 56% for 2019-20 and 63% for 2018-19. Managers expect this figure to continue to decrease during quarters 2 and 3, as the government's furlough scheme comes to an end.

84.10% of care leavers are available to work - excluding those not available for the labour market (NALM) due to illness, disability, pregnancy or being a young mother or because they are in custody. 16 Walsall's care leavers are currently in custody. The proportion of care leavers in suitable accommodation remains stable at 90.07%. The proportion of care leavers in touch with the council is currently at which is below the 2018/19 out turn of 97%, but in line with regional and national averages for the software period.

### Adoption and Permanency



In 2019/20, 16 were children were adopted. This is a reduction of over 50% compared with 2018/19. Children had a shorter wait in 2019/20 between receiving court authority to place and finding a match - this was 238 days compared to 252 days in 2018/19. 58% of Children wait less than 14 months between entering care and moving in with their adoptive family. This is lower than both 18/19 and 17/18. Between April and June 13 Children have ceased to be looked after due to special guardianship orders and 3 due to child arrangement orders.
