



Residents Survey: More people are satisfied with their local area than the borough overall.




Satisfaction with borough/local area as a place to live


Those in the most deprived areas are happier with the borough but unhappy with the local area. The reverse is true for those who are least deprived.





Reasons for unlikeliness to recommend (Detractors)







A good place to live: Some of the most important features for a good place to live are also considered most in need of improvement











Streetscene: Having clean, safe streets are the most important factors in creating an attractive area, and the most in need of improvement



Concern over Climate Change




- Six in ten residents are concerned about climate change.


Priorities for making towns more appealing to visitors are similar across towns and revolve around more activities for children and more retail

Businesses highlighted similar issues to residents although often with a longer-term viewpoint

Partnerships: businesses want to work with public sector to add value

Communication: effectively set out our support offer to businesses Promotion: lots of local private sector and inward investment opportunities Skills: including apprenticeships, recruiting skilled staff and upskilling for the future Sites: challenges of making these available is limiting growth

Location: our connectivity and accessibility is a strength to be exploited

Public realm & safety: concern that centres are unappealing and declining – but should be key assets

Low carbon: offers opportunities, and some companies already very conscious of working towards net zero targets and improving sustainability

Why children like living where they do?



Enjoy places to visit Swimming pool and outdoor areas, good schools and libraries. There are a variety of supermarkets to buy toys.


Green environments to visit There are different parks and green spaces to visit.

What are we doing for children and young people?

- Holiday Activity and Food programme delivered by our Walsall Right 4 Children during school holidays provides:
 - Free healthy meals
 - Free sports activities
- Walsall Children & Young People Strategic Alliance regularly considers how lived experiences can be improved
- Education, skills and training via:
 - Pathfinder
 - Construction Skills Academy
 - Community Capital for VCS
- Funding to support the current SEND need within the Borough, grant of £10.4m falls short of the places needed
- Walsall is one of 55 Education Investment Areas, benefiting from levelling up funds
